Coast Loop To Resume Full Slate

All eight Pacific Coast League teams will answer the cry "play ball" tonight, marking the first time since Monday that the entire league has been in action.

League leading Spokane goes against Seattle. Sacramento hosts San Diego in the second game of their series. Tacoma is at Salt Lake and Vancouver travels to Portland.

Two games were played Wednesday night, as Seattle wound up a split four-game series at Vancouver losing to the Mounties, 6-5, and Sacramento muffed its chance to pick up a half-game on front-running Spokane with a 5-1 loss to San Diego.

Tie Broken
Charlie White snapped a 5-5 eighth inning tie to lead Vancouver to its win when he laced the ball 380-foot over the right field fence. Walter Bond also connected for a Mountie four-bagger.

Seattle scored single tallies in each of the first five innings for its runs and Vancouver spiked the plate with two in the third, one in the fourth and two in the sixth to knot the count.

Three big runs in the top of the sixth frame pushed San Diego in front of Sacramento, 4-1, for the win. Both clubs had scored a lone run in the first. Stan Johnson put the icing on the cake with a homer in the eighth.

The Sacramento tally was on J. W. Porter's 15th round-trip blow of the season. What actually proved to be the winning run for San Diego came home on a single by Johnson.

1957 Victor In Publinx Tops Foes

Honolulu - UPI - Don Essig III, the 1957 champion of the National Amateur Public Links Golf tournament, looked today as though he was the man to beat for the 1960 crown.

Essig, a Louisiana State University senior from Indianapolis, Ind., defeated two highly regarded players in the first and second rounds

of match play Wednesday over 36 holes.

In the first 18, Essig took the measure of Tommy Jenkins, Jacksonville, Fla., 2-1. He came back in the afternoon to mow down Ray Borseth, 5-1, Minneapolis fireman who stayed off pre-tourney favorite Dave Bettencourt of Honolulu on the 20th hole of first round play.

Leading the way into the lower half of today's quarter-finals among 16 surviving golfers was Frank H. Huff, 34, insurance man from Phoenix.

Huff eliminated James Evenden, Seattle, in the second round, 3-2, after disposing of Charles Beyer, Fargo, N.D., earlier in the day, 2-1.

County Lakes Hold Up Well

Portland - UPI - The weekly fishing report, compiled by the State Game Commission: Southwest: Troup angling in North Umpqua between Winchester and Boulder creek is good. Some catches of salmon are being taken in Winchester bay by morning anglers. Tenmile lakes should be fair for trout and catfish. Loon lake is good for all species.

Fish and Squaw lakes in Jackson county are holding up well. In the Rogue district, fair to good catches are reported.

Central: Anglers at Blue

lake in Jefferson county are taking limit catches of rainbow. Good catches of kokanee, brown and rainbow are reported from Wickiup reservoir. The Deschutes river above Bend is still producing good catches. Elk lake is still producing eastern brook and small kokanee. Crane Prairie reservoir continues to produce catches in the tributary channels. Diamond lake is fair with fish up to 5 1/2 pounds. Lake of the Woods is good, mostly kokanee, and with some rainbow up to 3 1/2 pounds. Fourmile lake has improved for small rainbow and eastern brook up to 13 inches.

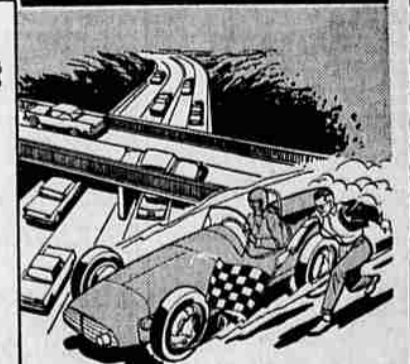
