Fish Appetizers
Hot appetizers are always popular with tall cool drinks. Fish samplers are easy to prepare because they can be arranged on skewers a few hours ahead of serving and held in the refrigerator. Thaw a package each of frozen fish sticks, clam sticks and clam balls. Reuther Endorses Choice of Kennedy
Los Angeles — Auto Workers President Walter P. Reuther today "enthusiastically" endorsed Democratic presidential nominee John F. Kennedy over Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Reuther announced his choice after visiting Kennedy with a delegation of union leaders who congratulated the Massachusetts senator on his Democratic convention triumph.

The UAW chief said he was speaking personally and not on behalf of his giant union or the AFL-CIO.

PCL Sets Later Opening Date
Spokane — The mid-year meeting of the Pacific Coast League adjourned here this week with all the clubs represented expressing a "lively optimism" for the 1961 season.

Major action at the meeting saw the league officials vote to open the 1961 season on April 21, one week later than this year's opener. The 154-game schedule will conclude on Sept. 17.

The league directors asked President Dewey Soriano to devise and offer a split-week schedule and an alternate combination of split-week and seven-game series schedules. Final action on the 1961 schedule will be taken at the annual post-season meeting.

The PCL All-Star game will be continued in 1961 with the league-leaders on July 4 being the game's host.

Nikita Told To Stay Out of Latin America
Washington — The United States today again bluntly told Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to stay out of Latin American affairs.

Eisenhower Signs Public Works Bill
Washington — President Eisenhower today signed a bill authorizing almost \$1.5 billion worth of public works in every part of the country.

Russian Spy Ship Near U.S. Charged
Washington — The United States, smarting under Russian spy plane accusations, has struck back by charging that a Soviet espionage ship disguised as a fishing vessel came snooping within 12 miles of the mouth of Chesapeake Bay April 27.

The 600-ton trawler Vega, bristling with 11 radar and radio antennas, is the same Russian ship that was reported earlier to have spied on the nuclear submarine George Washington during exercises off Long Island, N.Y., April 26.

Women's AAU Nat Test Opens
Indianapolis, Ind. — The National AAU Women's Swimming championships, a final tune-up for the U.S. Olympic trials for some but ignored by others, opened today with California's Santa Clara Swim club favored for the team title.

Nearly 200 contenders for national and Olympic berths will compete in the four-day water carnival in Broad Ripple's 50-meter outdoor pool.

Four defending individual champions were on hand, led by the phenomenal Chris Von Saltza, the standout freestyler from the Santa Clara contingent and one of Uncle Sam's strongest hopes for Olympic swimming honors in Rome.

Other defending champions on hand included Becky Collins, Indianapolis, butterfly; Ann Warner, Santa Clara, breast stroke; and Sylvia Rusk, Berkeley, Calif., 1,500-meter freestyle.

Methodists To Boost Number of Bishops
San Jose, Calif. — The Western Jurisdictional Conference of the Methodist Church, by a 3-1 margin, has decided to increase the number of its bishops from four to five.
