Assessors Claim Trailer House Tax Law 'Unworkable'

Salem (UP) — A group of Oregon county assessors complained Thursday that the state's new Trailer House Tax Law is "unworkable." The return of trailer tax authority to the counties was suggested but no action taken.

The assessors' legislative committee headed by Lincoln County Assessor Robert Kline met with Robert Holland, assistant attorney general with the State Motor Vehicles Department.

The department administers the law, effective six months ago, collecting license fees from trailer house owners in lieu of a county ad valorem tax.

Money To Counties
The money goes back to the counties for redistribution to taxing districts where the trailers were located.

Some counties have protested that addresses of trailers are often inadequate—a post office box only, for instance — and when a trailer moves from a taxing district, it is difficult to determine in which district the trailer tax money should be applied.

The five counties that make up the committee are Lincoln, Marion, Multnomah, Lane and Clatsop. Linn county is not a member of the committee but its assessor also appeared.

Kline said if the issues cannot be worked out with the state, the counties will propose new legislation.

Sen. Scott Claims Kennedy 'Ruthless', Single-Purposed

Washington (UP) — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) has been described as "cold," "ruthless" and "a single-purposed young man" by a fellow Senator and defended by another as "the leading figure in the United States Senate."

Sen. Hugh Scott (R-Pa.) said that Kennedy in his pre-convention campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination "abrogated his duties and his responsibility as a Senator, pursuing coldly and ruthlessly... his desire to be President of the United States."

"This is a very cold young man, and a single-purposed young man," Scott said.

Sen. William Proxmire (D-Wis.) countered that Kennedy was "the leading figure in the United States Senate."

"Jack Kennedy was the leading figure in the Senate in fighting for the minimum wage program this year, and he has done a good job," Proxmire said. "He has brought it right to the verge of passage..."

"In terms of fighting and planning for bills on the floor (of the Senate) there are few who have a record as good as that of Jack Kennedy," Proxmire said.

Proxmire said Kennedy is "the only man since Woodrow Wilson who in advance of the election has set forth his ideas of what he thinks a President should do and has emphasized the importance of strength and vision in the presidency."

Scott said that Kennedy "has not been in the Senate this year more than for one out of every four (roll call) votes." Scott expressed the hope that "his conception of the powers of the presidency is a little more in the interests of the public than his conception of his responsibilities as a Senator."

Proxmire pointed out that the late Sen. Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) was absent from the Senate many times during his campaigns for the Republican nomination in 1948 and 1952. He said "nobody criticized him (Taft)."

State Commodity Budgets Approved

Salem (UP) — A \$646,320 total budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1 has been approved for eight Oregon commodity commissions.

The new budgets are up from last year when they totaled \$500,000.

The Oregon Dairy Products Commission has the biggest budget, \$202,455.

Other state commodity commissions and their new budgets include:
Wheat \$181,330, Potato \$86,970, Chewing Fescue and Creeping Red Fescue \$30,062, Fryer \$49,000, Beef \$32,500, Filbert \$26,348, and Highland Benigrass \$17,655.

The commissions are self-help farm groups.

Ike Signs Road Building Measure

Washington (UP) — President Eisenhower Thursday signed a \$2,089,500,000 road-building bill which continues for two more years the present level of federal aid for primary and secondary roads and urban extensions.

The measure authorizes aid at the present annual rate of \$925 million for the two-year period starting July 1, 1961. The administration had recommended a cutback to \$900 millions a year.

The federal government pays half the cost of these roads, which are separate from the 41,000-mile super-highway program with bigger federal subsidies from gasoline taxes.

It also authorizes \$239.5 million for roads in federal forests, parks and other public lands and Indian reservations for the two-year period starting next July 1. The amounts are the same as currently provided, except for a \$15 million increase for forest roads and trails and a \$500,000 increase for public lands roads.
