

# Medford Rifle Club To Host Central Pacific Region Shoot

For the first time in the history of the sport in southern Oregon, Medford Rifle and Pistol club will be host to a national regional championship match of the National Rifle Association.

Central Pacific regional 22 caliber rifle contention will be conducted on Saturday and Sunday, July 16 and 17, at the Medford club's outdoor range on East Villas rd, near

the Crater Lake highway Four Corners.

The region is one of 12 and reaches from Canada to Fresno, Calif. Winners of the NRA regionals, along with other leading shooters, will vie for national championships next month at Camp Perry, Ohio.

A great array of distinguished shooters is gathering for the regional event. Len C. Living, New Westminster, B. C., one of Canada's lead-

ing shooters, will participate.

**Bells Entered**

Elinor Bells, Santa Monica, will be another entrant. She has won in regionals in past years in Arizona and southern California. Her husband, James, is a master shooter and also will be a leading crown contender. An entry from a distant point will be Don Baker, expert rifleman from Anderson, Ind.

California participants will include master shooter, Conrad Rasmussen, Oakland; Johnny Russell, Daly City; E. L. Fielding, Whittier; Frank Patterson, Sunnyvale; Manny Camillo, Sacramento; George Hendricks, Etna, and Ray Jones, Yreka. Richard Nelson will come from Seattle, Wash.

## Woods, Water, Wildlife

It is somewhat satisfying to note that the fact-finding committee appointed by the county court to investigate the pollution of Bear creek has come up with a report stating that the creek is polluted. The committee also has made several recommendations that would remedy the situation and it is hoped that the county court will find the means whereby the recommended steps can be put into effect.

**WATER AND AIR**

One of the questions on an IQ test asks what water and air are similar. The best answer is that they are necessary for life. Our problems concerning water and air have to do with their purity, rather than their availability. It seems somewhat paradoxical that man louses up two of his basic necessities in his attempts to provide other necessities. We are all aware of the filthy condition of Bear creek but the filthy condition of our air becomes apparent when we go to the edge of the valley and look back to the center. This is man-created and can be man-cured.

**NO JACKS**

There are some anglers who still believe jack salmon are legal to catch, providing they are under 20 inches. Page 27 of the angling synopsis clearly states that salmon and jacks have the same season and bag limits. Other anglers are of the belief that jacks have no part in the spawning of the larger salmon and that they are wasted when denied to the angler at this time of the year.

**JACK INSURANCE**

According to the man who knows, the jack has a definite place in the reproduction of the chinook salmon runs. He is insurance that no female will go unattended during the spawning period. Biologists have observed large females far up tributary streams with small jack salmon in attendance. It was further observed that as the stream flow lessened, no large male salmon was able to make it through the low water to the female. However, since the jack was sexually mature, he was well able to perform the task of fertilizing the eggs of the female.

**TIME MARCHES ON**

We are closer to the actuality of having a streamside rearing pond in southern Oregon. The game commission is asking for bids for the renovation of the Medco pond and installation of outlet facilities. They are asking that bids be submitted only by those contractors who can start immediately. The success of this

undertaking may shorten the time it will take to reverse the declining trend in our migratory fish runs.

**MORE FISH**

The game commission will complete the final planting of 23,000 hatchery fish by the end of the week. The plants will be made in those sections of the watershed that receive the heaviest fishing. These fish should be 10 inches to a foot long and will provide plenty of sport at that size.

**FOR FISH LAKE**

There should be a few smiles elicited by the news that 40,170 eastern brook trout were put into Fish Lake on July 7. They came from the Fort Klamath hatchery and averaged 2 1/4 inches long. They will probably become available to the angler by next year and will be a welcome addition to the good fishing at the lake.

Before you pack up for a fishing vacation that may keep you too long, better make application for the antelope tag before July 18. And if you want to get in on one of the controlled deer seasons, better make application by Aug. 1. Applications for management unit deer seasons will not be accepted after Aug. 8. The early bird gets the tag.

**Diamond Lake—Fishing is fair.** Best catches made using single eggs in deep water. Nymph flies are producing in the evening. Lots of yearling fish are showing up in the catches.

**Fish Lake—Is still good.** FF&F, FF&W or FF&W are producing for the trawlers. Lots of limits still fishing with eggs or worms.

**Four Mile Lake—Limit catches of kokanee and rainbow are being made.** The kokanee by stillfishing in deep water and the rainbow by trolling with 31 or flatfish. Best fishing is in the evening.

**Klamath Lake—Good catches being made** at the mouths of Harrison and Crystal creeks. Best bet is trolling flies by their lonesome, white or gray hackle. Size number 10.

**Lake of the Woods—Is very good.** Plenty of foot-long kokanee caught on FF&W or FF&F. Eggs are best for stillfishing. Rainbow and brook trout are becoming more available.

**Willow Creek—Still just fair.** Stillfishing is picking up a few with single eggs or cheese.

**Upper Rogue—Single eggs, grasshoppers, and flies are finding some sport.** Small lures in the deep holes find a few water is still cool but fish are moving out of shallow, smooth stretches.

Mathews doesn't hit many home runs off left-handed pitchers, but the one he delivered against southpaw Harvey Haddix in the Milwaukee Braves' 4-0 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates Thursday night was a beaut.

The blast cleared the right field grandstand roof at Forbes Field in Pittsburgh and

made the Braves' All-Star third baseman the first player ever to turn the trick twice. The list of those who have done it once includes the immortal Babe Ruth.

Although the 100-foot-high Forbes Field stands were erected in 1927, no player cleared them until Ruth did it on May 25, 1935.

**Against Friend**

Since then, Ted Beard, Bob Skinner, Wally Moon, Mantle and Mathews have accomplished the feat. Mathews did it for the first time last season against Bob Friend.
