## U.S. Women Fail To Meet Olympic Tests

Abilene, Tex.—(UPI)—American women's Olympic track hopes still appear to be far short of even Olympic minimum requirements in at least four of the nine events. Going on the basis of preliminary heats of the women's final Olympic track and field trials here Friday night, even the best of this country's performers in the discus, javelin, 80-meter hurdles and the new event—the 800-meter run—will have to improve to meet the games' standards. That won't be true, however, in the 100 and 200-meter dashes where Wilma Rudolph of Tennessee state reigns supreme; the shot put, where husky Mrs. Earlene Brown of Los Angeles stands to be a contender at Rome, and the broad jump where little Willye White of Chicago is making signs of reaching the Olympic record. In the discus, Mrs. Brown and Olga Fikotova Connolly—the 1956 Olympic champ while she was a citizen of Czechoslovakia, and P. Ann Kurrell of San Francisco have bettered the Olympic minimum at one time or another this year. They finished 1-2-3 in last night's prelims with Mrs. Brown No. 1 with 156 feet, 6 inches, Mrs. Connolly with 152-9 and Miss Kurrell with 144-11. The games standard is 157-6. Miss White accounted for the only new American record in the preliminaries when she leaped 20 feet, 4 1/2 inches to best the old mark of 20-3 1/4 set by Margaret Matthews of Memphis, Tenn., in 1958. Mrs. Brown's shot put toss of 48-8 1/4 and her discus toss were two of eight new Olympic trials records posted. Miss Rudolph accounted for two more when she led her heats in the 100 and 200-meter dashes in 11.7 and 24.2 seconds, respectively. The other best performances—none of which met the Olympic minimums—include Karen Oldham of San Diego, Calif., in the javelin with a toss of 158-4 1/4, Billie Pat Daniels of San Mateo, Calif., in the 800-meter run with a 2:16.6 time, and Shirley Crowder of Tennessee state in the 80-meter hurdles with a time of 11.6 seconds.
