

Auer Iron Sights Aggregate Champ in Region Rifle Meet

Victor Auer, Sherman Oaks, Calif., gained the all-metallic sights aggregate championship yesterday in the Central Pacific regional .22 caliber rifle shoot of the National Rifle Association.

Auer, who is 23 and will be a senior this fall at UCLA, fired a 1590-111x total in the event at Medford Rifle and Pistol club's outdoor range on East Vilas rd. west of Crater

Lake highway. Elinor Bell, Santa Monica, Calif., was runner-up with 1593-105x and her husband, James Bell, was third high overall with 1591-100x.

The shoot concludes today with scope sight events. Firing begins at 7 a.m. Today's and Saturday's scores will be combined to determine grand aggregate winners.

Wall Fires New Mark; Leads Open

Detroit—The 1959 golfer of the year is back on the glory trail.

Art Wall Jr. hung the specter of a second straight trouncing over his rivals when he fired a course-record 66 Friday to move into a two-stroke lead at the halfway mark of the 57th annual Western Open with a 137 total.

The reduced field of 82 was determined to put the brakes on Wall before he started a stampede similar to the one that carried him to a six-stroke victory in last week's Canadian Open.

That should prove a formidable challenge. Wall's six-under-par round Friday was his seventh sub-par performance in a row and clearly established him as the hottest golfer now on tour.

Tough Luck
After his mighty laurels last year when he won four major victories, including the Masters, the slim 36-year-old Pennsylvanian ran into a streak of tough luck last February. A kidney and knee infection put him out of action for nine weeks and prevented Wall from defending his Masters championship.

But the game, silent competitor from Pocono Manor, Pa., rejoined the tour in April and launched a comeback drive that reached a peak in last week's 17-under par effort in the Canadian Open.

Wall's closest challengers were Pete Cooper, Stan Leonard, Jim Ferree and Tommy Jacobs who shot rounds in the 60's to finish in a tie for second at 139. None of the four have won a major tournament since 1958.

Cooper and Leonard fired 69's to go with opening day 70's while Ferree and Jacobs had 68's.

Rogue Valley Country club's 32nd annual Southern Oregon Golf Tournament is still 1 1/2 months away but entries already number slightly more than 100, a good start toward equalling 1959's record total of 336.

The tourney opens Aug. 31 and continues through Sept. 5, Labor day at the Medford links. Competition will be for men's senior men's and women's crowns. Aug. 24 is entry deadline.

C. L. Brown Jr., Coos Bay, is another one-handicapper among the early signers and Harry Millette and Dr. Robert Buck, Rogue Valley, and Glen Schanback, Oswego, are a trio of two-strokers who'll participate.

Jerome Ties Race Record

Saskatoon, Sask. — (UPI) — Harry Jerome, 19-year-old sprinter competing in the 100 meter race at the Canadian Olympic Track and Field trials Friday, covered the distance in 10 seconds flat.

Jerome, a freshman at the University of Oregon and a native of Vancouver, B.C., was clocked by three timers and became the second man in the world to cover the 100 meter race in 10 seconds.

The world record of 10.1 is held by several U. S. sprinters, including Ray Norton, Ira Murchison and 1956 Olympic sprint king Bobby Morrow.

On June 21 at Zurich, Switzerland, Armin Hary of West Germany also ran the distance in 10 seconds flat. Jerome's win assures him a place on the team Canada will send to the Olympics in Rome in August.

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
