

# Berra Hits Grand Slam Homer As NY Snaps Four-Game Loss Streak

Yogi Berra, one of five Yankees plagued by a virus, hit the eighth grand slam home run of his career Saturday to lead New York to a 11-2 victory over the Detroit Tigers.

Berra's blast came in a five-run, sixth inning. He also drove in New York's first run with a fourth-inning single as the league-leading Yanks snapped a four-game losing streak.

A virus which caused stomach disorders struck Berra, Tony Kubek, Hector Lopez, Whitey Ford and Ryne Duren. Jim Bunning held New York hitless until the fourth and was staked to a quick 2-0 lead when Charley Maxwell lined his 14th homer of the year off Bob Turley after a walk to Eddie Yost in the first.

**McDougal Breaks Spell**

Gil McDougal broke Bunning's spell with a leadoff double in the fourth and scored on Berra's two out single.

McDougal also touched off the winning rally in the sixth with a single to center. Elston Howard then singled and Mickey Mantle doubled to score McDougal.

Detroit elected to walk Roger Maris intentionally to load the bases and bring up Berra. Yogi lined a 2-1 pitch off the facing of the upper deck in right for the first grand slam homer by a Yankee this season.

New York added five more in the ninth on singles by Cletus Boyer, Bobby Richardson and Howard, a double by McDougal and a home run

## Bucs Edge Redlegs; Cards Dump Chicago

Dick Stuart climaxed Pittsburgh's up-hill drive with a ninth-inning homer Saturday that enabled the Pirates to edge the Cincinnati Reds, 6-5, and snap a two-game losing streak.

Pittsburgh set the stage for Stuart's 13th homer of the season with a two-run eighth-inning rally that tied the score at 5-5.

Cincinnati used three pitchers in an attempt to stem the surge, but to no avail as Don Hoak clobbered a double with the bases loaded for the tying runs.

Dick Groat started the inning with a walk off starter Jay Hook. Joe Nuxhall relieved to get Rocky Nelson on a liner to Frank Robinson at first. Jim Brosnan came in, struck out Roberto Clemente but walked Smokey Burgess intentionally to fill the bases.

Hoak then came through with Pittsburgh's patented garrison finish.

McMillan's triple and Hook's sacrifice bunt, made it 5-2, but Bill Mazerowski closed the gap with his ninth homer in the Pirates half of the seventh.

George Crowe set a new major league record with his 12th pinch homer as the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Chicago Cubs, 2-1. The blow came in the eighth inning with Curt Flood on base and

handed Glen Hobbie his 11th setback of the season. Lindy McDaniel pitched 1/3 of an inning and won his sixth game.

Stan Williams widely spaced nine hits in Los Angeles' 6-1 victory over San Francisco that sent the Giants to their seventh defeat in the last eight games. Four giant errors helped Williams to his ninth win. He struck out seven.

Del Crandall blasted two of Milwaukee's four home runs off Robin Roberts that beat Philadelphia, 6-4, and kept the Braves within three games of first place Pittsburgh. The homers were Crandall's 13th and 14th of the year. Eddie Mathews walloped his 18th for Milwaukee and Chuck Cotler hit his second. Cal Neenan and Bobby Del Greco homered for the Phillies. Joey Jay won his third game and Roberts lost his ninth.

## Dodgers Roll To 6-1 Win Over Giants

San Francisco—Big Stan Williams rolled to his ninth win of the season Saturday by pitching the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 6-1 victory over the deflated San Francisco Giants.

The third place Dodgers completely outlasted San Francisco while taking their eighth decision in the last 10 starts. Four errors were tossed into the pot by San Francisco and two of these miscues led to scores.

Jack Sanford, who sustained his seventh defeat and was taken out for a pinchhitter after five innings, helped wreck himself by committing a balk which brought home Charlie Neal with a tally in the second.

The 6 foot 5 inch, 230 pound Williams, who now has a 9-2 record, struck out seven and gave up only one pass while mastering the Giants for the third time this season. Earlier this year he turned them back with a two-hitter and a three-hitter.

This time they got to him for nine hits, but some fine fielding held them to only one run. In the fourth inning shortstop Maury Wells grabbed Willie Kirkland's wind-blown double in short left field and threw out Orlando Cepeda who was trying to score from second.

Two frames earlier Williams deflected a hard smash by Ed Bressoud with men on first and second. And second baseman Neal crawled after the ball to retrieve it in time to force Hobie Landrith at second base for the third out.

A throwing error by first baseman Willie McCovey, John Roseboro's double and Sanford's balk accounted for the two unearned runs in the second. Duke Snider had walked with one out and was safe at second when McCovey's throw to Ed Bressoud on an attempted force play pulled the San Francisco shortstop off the bag. Neal was safe at first on the same play.

## Dallas Cowboys Start Training At Oregon Camp

Forest Grove, Ore. — (UP) — A total of 38 National Football league veterans are expected to be on hand at the Dallas Cowboys training camp here today for physical checkups.

Most of the veterans arrived Saturday. Prior to the arrival of two large groups totaling 31 aboard two flights into Portland's International airport, veteran defensive end Gene Cronin, formerly of the Detroit Lions, former Los Angeles Ram guard Duane Putnam and linebacker Jack Patera, obtained from the Chicago Cardinals, reported in separately, as did Gene Babb, former 49ers fullback.

The arrival of Eddie Lebaron, recently picked up in a trade with the Washington Redskins, gave the Cowboys four quarterbacks in camp.

**First Cut Made**  
Rookies Don Meredith of SMU and John Talley of Northwestern have been here all week, as has veteran New York Giant signal caller Don Heinrich, who came in early to help head coach Tom Landry. Heinrich and veteran Lions end James Darrin reported to camp along with the rookies to end work with the newcomers during the first week.

The first cut made by coach Landry turned loose halfbacks Jack Spicer and Clive Bullian, end Greg Altenhofen of Oregon, and centers Billy Brown and Bob Griffin. Spicer of Oberlin, Altenhofen, and Brown of Wiley college were all first-year rookies.

Saturday's cuts were the first made by Landry. Previously three rookies had left voluntarily. The departures through Saturday leave 65 on the roster, 27 rookies and 38 veterans.

## ASU Favors New Loop

Tempe, Ariz. — (UP) — Arizona State university's board of athletic control has voted to endorse affiliation of ASU with a proposed new "Great Western" conference of eight schools from the Border, Skyline, and old Pacific Coast conference.

The new conference would consist of Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young university, Utah, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington State, and New Mexico.

Arizona State and Arizona now are members of the Border conference but have been looking for a stronger alignment.

The athletic board of control said it expected to recommend unanimously to Dr. H. D. Richardson, acting ASU president, that the university become a member of the new conference.

The board heard a report by athletic director Clyde Smith on meetings of representatives of the various institutions held in San Francisco last month.

Further talks are scheduled in Salt Lake City in October, presumably to begin official organization of the new loop.
