

# Kennedy Shakes Up Women's Department of Demo Group

Los Angeles (UPI) — Sen. John F. Kennedy, the Democrats' presidential nominee, deftly shook up the women's department of the Democratic national committee last week, but no one is out of a job.

Kennedy picked Mrs. Margaret Price of Michigan to replace Mrs. Katie Louchheim as vice chairman of the committee in charge of women's activities.

But he made it up to outgoing Mrs. Louchheim by putting her on his campaign team. Kennedy told the committee that Mrs. Louchheim will assist his brother Robert, who is his campaign manager. Her title will be announced later.

Mrs. Price, a tall attractive 47-year-old brunette, told reporters she was "surprised" to learn of her appointment. She said Kennedy called her Friday morning and urged her to accept it. She promptly agreed to take the job and said it was a "high honor" which she hoped she "could live up to."

**Intimate Role**  
Kennedy said that Mrs. Price had played an intimate role in building the Democratic organization in Michigan and he had come to know her work.

"I don't think we can get a finer woman," he added.

Earlier, Mrs. Louchheim expressed bitterness and disappointment at her removal from the committee's top female post. She had headed the women's division for eight years and had served as vice chairman since 1956.

She noted that the Michigan delegation had given ardent support to Kennedy and the vice chairmanship was a plum in return. Mrs. Louchheim also had supported Kennedy's candidacy.

But she changed her tune and brightened considerably on learning that she was not out of the political picture and that Kennedy was counting on her.

**'Very Flattering'**  
"This is a very flattering assignment," blond dynamic Katie told reporters. "I would say Bobbie Kennedy is the super strategist of this campaign. It will be the greatest experience of my life."

Sen. Kennedy spoke to Mrs. Louchheim when they met during the national committee's final meeting. His reassurance to her was "warm and generous," Mrs. Louchheim said.

Mrs. Price, who is close to Michigan Gov. Mennen Williams and his family politically and personally, denied that Michigan had put any pres-

sure to win her the post.

A wealthy woman, she is the wife of Hickman Price, the general manager of Mercedes Benz in Brazil. She runs two households — one in Ann Arbor, Mich., which always will be home to her, and another in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

She has two sons, Hickman III, 17 and Marston, 15. They attend St. George's school at Newport, R. I. She has served as national committeewoman since 1952. She ran on the ticket with Williams in 1952.

# FBI Chief Says Student Riots Could Happen Here

Washington (UPI) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover warned Sunday that student riots led by Communist agitators can happen in America too.

Hoover said this is exactly what happened in San Francisco last May when college demonstrators broke up a hearing of the House committee on un-American activities.

The FBI director, in a report issued by the congressional committee, said the incident revealed "how it is possible for a few Communists, using mob psychology, to turn peaceful demonstrations into riots."

Hoover sadly described the

San Francisco riot "as the best thing to happen to the benefit of the Communist party in years."

He said it illustrated the effectiveness of Communist efforts in making college and university campuses a prime target for infiltration and recruitment.

**Governments Topple**  
"Throughout the world today," Hoover said, "governments are toppling with stunning rapidity. Whether large or small, the role Communists are playing in these events must not be discounted."

Pointing to the recent riots in Japan and other parts of

the world, Hoover warned that the "growing strength of our nation over the years has not proved a deterrent to the restless efforts on the part of the Communist party, U.S.A., to destroy our security and prepare our nation for a similar fate."

He said the "Communist success in San Francisco in May of 1960 proves that it can happen here."

**Serves as Warning**  
Hoover said the incident also "must serve as a warning that their infiltration efforts aimed not only at youth and student groups, but also at our labor unions, churches, profes-

sional groups, artists, newspaper, government, and the like — can create chaos and shatter our internal security."

The FBI chief said two Communists — Archie Brown and Merle Brodsky — played important roles in inciting the students to riot. Hoover described Brown as a former member of the Communist party's national committee and Brodsky as an "active leader in Communist party affairs in California for more than 20 years."
