### Veteran Dies While Friend Attempts to Obtain Assistance

A 68-year-old disabled veteran died at the Rex hotel Sunday afternoon while a friend was making futile attempts to get help from the White City domiciliary.

Henry C. Herzog, domiciliary manager, told the Mail Tribune that records at the domiciliary showed that the telephone operator there had received a telephone call about 2 p.m. Sunday reporting a man ill at the Rex hotel.

Herzog explained that the telephone operator only had access to the locator cards of present members at the domiciliary so Rea's name would not have been listed.

He added that if the caller thought that the man was seriously ill he should have asked for a physician at the hospital.

The manager added that telephone calls to the domiciliary regarding sick persons are not uncommon. He said that in many cases friends will call from local taverns to report someone ill.

Herzog stressed that Rea had applied at the domiciliary July 7 for readmission and was strongly advised at that time that he should be admitted immediately. Rea told the domiciliary registrar that he had to return to Medford for some personal belonging.

Dead is James Albert Rea, a resident at the Rex hotel. A doctor attributed his death to an apparent heart attack.

Othel Walker Russell, also of the Rex hotel and a friend of Rea, told the Mail Tribune that he personally called the White City hospital twice in an effort to get help for Rea, but he was refused both times.

Rea died at 2:30 p.m. Russell said he called the Domiciliary once at 1:30 and a second time at 2:10 p.m.

Russell said he was sure Rea belonged at the Domiciliary because he always picked up his mail there.

When Rea started having difficulty breathing about 1:15 p.m., Russell said, he could tell he was in "bad shape" so he left the hotel to get to a telephone.

When he called the Domiciliary, Russell said, he told the man on duty that there was a man at the hotel who was in need of medical assistance and he was sure he belonged at the Domiciliary.

Russell said the attendant said he couldn't find the man's record there and could not help him.

Thinking that he may have made a mistake about his belonging at White City, Russell went back to the hotel and double-checked. At this time, he said, Rea was much worse.

With a DAV card in his hand Russell again called the Domiciliary and this time pleaded with the attendant saying: "This man needs help, I know he belongs here."

Again he was refused assistance, Russell said the attendant told him that because he couldn't find Rea's record he wouldn't bother the officer of the day.

Not knowing what else to do, Russell said he then called Medford police. No attempt was made to contact any of the other hospitals, he said.

Elizabeth Phebus, manager of the Rex hotel, said Rea had been in the Domiciliary until about a year ago, when he was discharged.

However, Mrs. Phebus said Rea told her recently that he had been cleared for readmission and could go back any time.
