

Browns To Meet SF At Portland

Portland — Football's most successful coach, Paul Brown, brings the Cleveland Browns here for their first appearance Sept. 3 in a National Football league pre-season game with the San Francisco 49ers.

Brown's all-time record reads 275 victories, 50 defeats, 11 ties.

Cleveland won four straight championships in the defunct All-American conference, moved to the National Football league, won the world's championship the following season and two more later.

In 14 years, the Browns have failed to capture their division title only three times.

Casey Stengel fears no one — and neither would you with a pair of musclemen like Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris around.

Stengel's strategy is simple but effective. He merely stations Mantle and Maris in front of the door and tells them to give the bum's rush to anyone who tries invading the Yankees' first-place privacy.

The Cleveland Indians, trailing only by 1½ games, had exactly such a notion Monday night. But when Mantle and Maris got through with them, the Indians were dumped to third place and the Yankees increased their American league lead to two games with a 9-2 victory.

Mantle did his handiwork with a three-run homer, his 22nd of the season, to climax a five-run rally off Dick Stigman in the fourth inning. Maris applied the clincher with his 29th homer at the expense of reliever Barry Latman in the ninth.

Ford Wins Sixth

Mantle and Maris made it easy for southpaw Whitey Ford, who gave up eight hits in posting his sixth victory. Johnny Romano accounted for both Cleveland runs with a homer in the second inning and a sacrifice fly in the fourth.

Piersall Fined For Horseplay

Cleveland, Ohio — The question of whether to coddle Jimmy Piersall or punish him was settled today when Manager Joe Gordon fined the Cleveland outfielder a day's pay for his actions in the bullpen during Sunday's doubleheader.

Gordon levied the fine against Piersall because he had tossed baseballs into three gloves he had laid out on the ground for the amusement of right field patrons.

In addition, the Tribe manager set up an automatic \$500 fine for each time Piersall is thrown out of the game by an umpire for the remainder of the season.

Gordon's action came shortly after General Manager Frank Lane had said Piersall "needs sympathetic handling."

"I think Jim needs sympathetic handling," Frank Lane, Cleveland's Indian general manager, told the Sigma Delta Chi journalism fraternity annual baseball luncheon Monday.

"I just hope Joe Gordon has enough patience—or an iron fist when necessary—to get the most out of Piersall."

Held Placed On Disabled List

Cleveland — Cleveland's pennant stock took a sharp nose-dive today when hard-hitting shortstop Woodie Held was placed on the disabled list with a broken finger that is expected to keep him on the sidelines from three to five weeks.

The Indians immediately brought up shortstop Mike de la Hoz to replace Held. De la Hoz was batting .312 with Mobile of the Southern association.

Held suffered the injury on his right hand during the first inning of Monday night's game against the Yankees while taking a throw from second baseman Johnny Temple on an attempted force play.

Philadelphia will start John Buzhardt (4-6) tonight against the Giants. The San Franciscans have thumped the Phils nine times out of 11 this season, but have been in a baffling slump of late.

Dyrol Burleson Runs To Win

Track ace Dyrol Burleson, one of Oregon's entries in this year's Olympic games and holder of the American record for the mile run, said in an interview for a Eugene magazine that he runs only to win and lets the records fall where they will.

"I never run for time," Burleson said to Kris Stokes, a writer for Old Oregon magazine, the University of Oregon's alumni publication. "A fellow could run four minutes every week if he ran for time."

"There's no limit to what I can do," Burleson said with confidence. "I can improve until I'm 30."

Burleson said he would like to postpone his military obligations as long as possible. He said he would like to remain at Oregon three more years to pick up a master's degree. Burleson went on: "Although I'm still running well, the service is the best place to train. No outside problems."

At the university Burleson ran the mile in 3:58.6 seconds for an American record.

Satellite Blamed for Model Plane Crashes

Portland — The Portland Buckeroos today announced that they have selected Estevan, Saskatchewan, as their training site for the 1960-61 hockey season.

General Manager Harry Glickman said Estevan was chosen because of its excellent rink and its nearness to Winnipeg, where the Buckeroos open the Western Hockey league season Oct. 17.

The camp opens Sept. 28. Coach Hal Laycoe expects between 20 and 24 players to train.

Title Contest Is Rescheduled

New York — The again-postponed Archie Moore-Erich Schoepner light heavyweight title fight may be coupled with another fight for a theater-TV doubleheader sometime in October, Bill Fugazy disclosed today.

Monday night the fight between world champion Moore and Germany's Schoepner, European titleholder, scheduled for Toronto, Ont., on Aug. 8, was postponed "temporarily" for lack of television facilities.

Fugazy, president of Feature Sports, Inc., said today: "We hope to have something worked out by Wednesday night. We're trying to make a doubleheader. No. 1 can't mention the name of the other bout under consideration."

He added that if negotiations for the doubleheader failed, Feature Sports would try to arrange a new date and possibly a new site for the Moore-Schoepner fight on a home-TV basis.

Dallas Gridders Start Training For 49er Game

Forest Grove — The Dallas Cowboys buckled down today to intensive workouts as they get ready for their Aug. 8 exhibition game with the San Francisco 49ers in Seattle.

Head Coach Tom Landry indicated he was satisfied with the condition of the veterans who checked in during the weekend and that he thought the combination of established National Football league players plus some promising rookies would give the Dallas team a solid nucleus to build on for its first year in the loop.

Observed Landry: "Being able to have a group of 38 veterans will make us a bit stronger than one would normally expect of a first year team." He was referring to such standouts as Eddie LeBaron, Don Heinrich, L. G. Dupre, John Gonzaga and Duane Putnam. He added: "I thought our rookies did a good job last week, and I was mighty pleased to see the condition in which the veterans reported."

The veterans got a chance to show just what shape they are in by running the famed Landry mile this morning. The Landry mile is a test of their condition, a test that the rookies went through last week. Landry had written to the players a month ago and told them to be ready to run the mile in six minutes.
