

Carey Junior Boys Champion In Southern Oregon Tourney

John Carey, Cottage Grove, who found the back nine holes of Rogue Valley Country club to his liking during two days of competition, topped the field in the annual Southern Oregon Junior Golf championships and garnered the junior boys first place hardware.

Carey carded a one-over-par 73 Tuesday, adding it to a Monday 76 for a 149 in the 36-hole medal play contention at the Medford links. His score was five strokes better than that of his nearest rival.

Four other champions were crowned. They were Chuck Allen, Medford, boys; David Glenn, Coos Bay, pee wees; Sue Lance, Glendale, Calif., junior girls; and Mary Saunders, Grants Pass, girls.

Graham Bruner, Tillamook, 1959 titlist in the boys division, was runner-up in junior boys this time. He had 78-76-

All-Comers Meet Here Saturday

Medford on Saturday will be host for the first time this year to the summer series of Southern Oregon all-comers track and field meets.

The event will be at the senior high stadium. Junior events are set for 10 a.m. and high school and open activity for 5:30 p.m.

The meet will be the third this summer for the Rogue valley. The two previous affairs were conducted in Ashland. Meets are sponsored by Southern Oregon college, Ashland high school and Medford city recreation department and the competition is being rotated among the college and two high school tracks.

Junior division contests are for boys and girls through 16 years of age with four separate age divisions each for boys and girls.

Entry blanks can be obtained at various city recreation offices in the valley but pre-entry is not absolutely necessary. An athlete may register on the day of the meet.

A small entry fee is charged.

New Selection Plan Proposed For Fame Hall

Chicago (UPI)—The Baseball Writers association of America has proposed that a new method be adopted in the selection of players to the Hall of Fame.

Intended to add more baseball greats to the hall, the plan is said to have appealed to baseball Commissioner Ford Frick. The association deemed it necessary to change the rules because, since 1956, no baseball figures have been elected to the hall.

Presently, player candidates can be elected only on 75 per cent of the votes cast on a single ballot.

Under the new rules, the top 30 candidates on the first ballot would be placed on a second ballot, providing there were no first round winners. Also, each voting writer would be limited to only five selections on the second ballot instead of the usual ten.

Scattered first ballot voting in past years has been generally responsible for the seeming lack of additions to the hall. As an example, in the most recent election 167 players received votes.

Elections by the writers association are held every two years. Those who are voted on are taken from a list of players who have retired within the past 30 years.

Under the new setup if one or more players were elected on a first ballot, no second ballot would be held. To rule out a possible avalanche of players gaining admittance, only one can be elected on a second ballot, and he would have to have 75 per cent of the votes.

Ladies Swim Class Registration Asked

A two-week beginners swimming class for women will open Monday, July 25, at Hawthorne park pool.

Registration is scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday, from 1 p.m. until the pool closes each of the three days.

There is a \$2 registration fee, except that there is no charge for women who have season tickets. Ladies with season tickets, however, must register during the three-day period.

Continental Loop Faces Showdown

Los Angeles (UPI)—A showdown meeting at which the proposed Continental league will say if it is prepared to meet the standards for a third major league was being arranged today with representatives of the two operating major leagues.

The invitation for such a meeting was extended by Walter F. O'Malley of the Los Angeles Dodgers as chairman of the National league's expansion committee who said he was inviting American league representatives to attend.

The proposal drew the assent of Branch Rickey, president of the Continental league who suggested the meeting be held in New York next week. O'Malley, a Democrat, had no objections but he said some Republican members of both the National and American league committees might want to wait until after the GOP convention in Chicago next week.

Rickey in a prepared statement in New York said that by its action the National league belatedly renewed recognition that expansion was necessary for major league baseball.

Marichal Has Auspicious Pitching Debut for Giants

They say only a miracle can revive the San Francisco Giants but perhaps that's the best way to describe Juan Marichal.

A Class D pitcher-only two years ago and brought up from Tacoma of the Pacific Coast league just before the All-Star break, the 21-year-old fastballer from the Dominican Republic gave the Giants a shot in the arm Tuesday night with one of the most astonishing debuts in big league history.

All Marichal did was strike out 12 batters and pitch a one-hitter to give the Giants a 2-0 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies and revive, at least for the moment, hopes of a San Francisco comeback. Marichal had a perfect game for 6 1/3 innings and a no-hitter until pinch-hitter Clayton Kopp singled cleanly with two out in the eighth.

That blow spoiled Marichal's bid to match Bobo Holloman's feat of pitching a no-hitter in his first major league appearance for the St. Louis Browns in 1953. But it didn't bother Marichal, who retired the final batter in the eighth and then pitched a perfect ninth to wrap up the win.

The Milwaukee Braves ran their winning streak to six games with a 9-5 decision over the St. Louis Cardinals, the Los Angeles Dodgers nipped the first-place Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-4, and the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Chicago Cubs, 4-1, in other National league games.

The New York Yankees rallied for five runs in the ninth inning to beat the Cleveland Indians, 13-11, and retain their two-game lead, the Chicago White Sox beat the Boston Red Sox, 6-0. Pedro Ramos' one-hitter gave the Washington Senators a 5-0 victory over the Detroit Tigers, and the Baltimore Orioles scored a 10-inning, 9-3 win over the Kansas City Athletics in American league action.

Marichal, acquired by the Giants for a mere \$500 bonus, got the run he needed when Jim Davenport singled home Orlando Cepeda in the second inning. Willie Kirkland singled home Willie Mays with the other San Francisco tally in the fifth.

The Braves equalled their longest winning streak of the season with a 10-hit attack featured by a homer and a single by Hank Aaron and two hits each by Del Crandall, Ed Mathews and Johnny Logan. Rookie Ron Piche shut out the Cardinals for the last 2 1/3 innings to end their four-game

winning streak. Stan Musial, Curt Flood and Julian Javier homered for St. Louis.

Sherry Wins Seventh

Norm Larker's two-run seventh-inning homer, his third hit of the game, enabled the Dodgers to give Larry Sherry his seventh triumph and dealt Pittsburgh's Fred Green his fourth defeat. Bill Virdon drove in three Pirate runs with two doubles and a homer.

Frank Robinson's two homers drove in three runs and Jim O'Toole pitched a six-hitter for the Reds, who handed Don Cardwell his ninth loss. The win squared O'Toole's record at 8-8.

Bill Skowron's three-run double was the big blow of the Yankees' ninth-inning rally that climaxed an uphill struggle. Skowron also hit two homers and Roger Maris hit his 30th and Yogi Berra his 10th. Maris is two games ahead of Babe Ruth's record 1927 pace, the Babe hitting his 30th homer that season in the Yankees' 83rd game of the campaign.

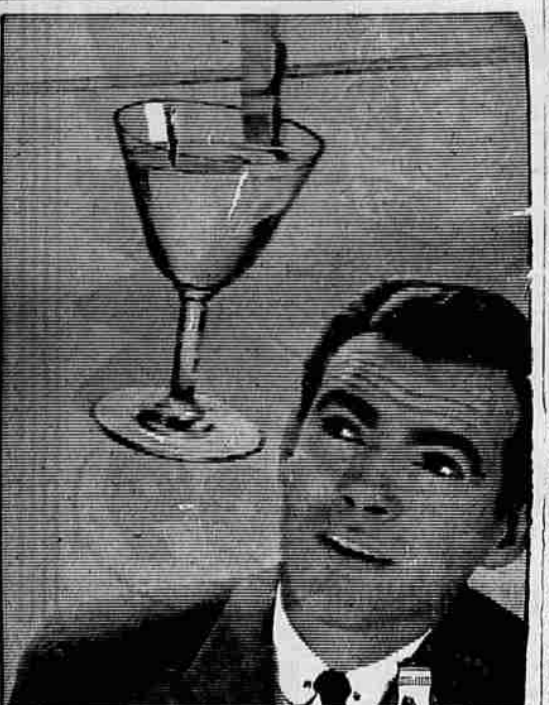
Billy Pierce pitched a four-hitter for his eighth win and Luis Aparicio cracked a three-run homer for the White Sox, who ran their winning streak

to four games. Pierce retired the first 13 batters, did not walk a batter and did not allow a Boston runner to reach third base.

Colavito Spoils No-Hitter

Ramos lost his bid for a no-hitter when Rocky Colavito singled to lead off Detroit's eighth inning but went on to win his sixth game against 10 losses. Billy Gardner and Harmon Killebrew homered for the Senators as they hung a seventh loss of the year on Don Mossi.

Bud Daley, seeking his 13th win, wild-pitched home Baltimore's tie-breaking run in the 10th and hits by Gene Woodling, Jim Gentile and Mary Breeding produced five more runs. Hoyt Wilhelm, who shut out the Athletics over the last 3 1/3 innings, picked up his seventh win while Daley suffered his sixth loss.
