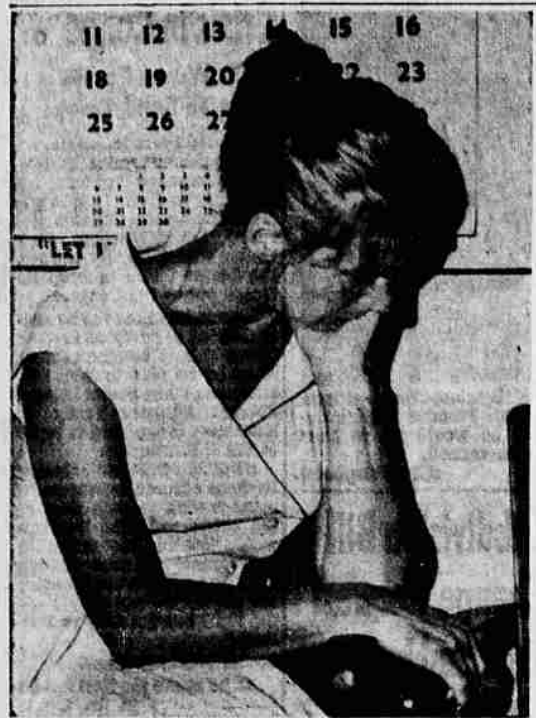

## Stocks in Ninth Straight Decline

New York (UPI)—Blue chip industrialists paced stocks in their ninth consecutive decline today—the longest downslide string of the year.

The week's sharpest decline of the week but reflected individual corporate developments rather than any general sell-off.

General Electric touched off a decline in its group, dropping more than 3 points as management representatives walked out on contract negotiations with the union. Westinghouse, yet to begin its talks with the union, fell nearly three.

## Homes Damaged, 2,000 Persons Forced To Leave

Los Angeles (UPI)—Six major fires burned wildly out of control today in heat-blasted Southern California. The blazes destroyed or damaged 26 homes and cabins and forced the evacuation of more than 2,000 persons. One man was killed.

The major fires had charred more than 70,000 acres of brush, timber, and other watershed. Additional small fires many of them started by lightning, kept the more than 2,500 fire fighters on the run for the fourth day of a smothering heat wave. The temperature climbed over the 100-degree mark for the fourth straight day in many of the fire areas.

There was no immediate hope of containing any of the major fires, four of which were in Angeles National Forest, a 590,000-acre range of mountains as big as Rhode Island separating the populous Los Angeles area from the Mojave Desert.

**Close To Hearst Castle**  
The major fires were:  
—San Simeon, 200 miles north of here, where a 30,000-acre blaze moved to within a mile of the famed Hearst Castle.

—San Gabriel Canyon, 30 miles northeast of here, which had burned over 10,500 acres of valuable watershed. This blaze began Sunday from a carelessly discarded cigarette or match.

—San Dimas, 35 miles northeast of here, where more than 6,000 acres had been burned.

—Magic Mountain, about 20 miles north, where a 19,000-acre lightning-started blaze temporarily threatened Nike anti-aircraft missile sites.

**Youth Camps Evacuated**  
—Big Pines, 70 miles northeast of Los Angeles, where a 1,750-acre blaze forced the evacuation of two youth camps near Big Pines and Jackson Lake.

—Mt. McKinley, 70 miles northeast of the San Bernardino National Forest, where more than 1,000 acres had been charred by a fast-moving new blaze, in addition 31 new blazes, started by lightning, sprang up overnight in the heavily timbered forest.

All of the blazes except the San Simeon blaze were in the mountains surrounding the Los Angeles area.

## Motion Filed To Restore Lumber Shipment Ruling

Portland (UPI)—A motion to restore an Interstate Commerce Commission ruling aimed at in-transit delays of lumber shipments was filed Wednesday afternoon in U.S. district court here.

The motion would reverse a present court order that sets aside the ICC ruling.

The motion was filed after 19 lumber companies, including Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. and Georgia Pacific Co., first filed another motion asking to intervene as defendants with the ICC against 104 other lumber companies and the Chicago and Northwest Railroad.

**Crux of Dispute**  
Crux of the dispute is the railroad practice of granting up to a 15-day free delay en route for lumber shipments by "transit" lumber dealers who ship lumber and find a customer while the shipment is en route.

Banning of the practice came from the ICC on the grounds that the railroad did not grant the same privilege to other customers.

District Judge John F. Kennedy signed a temporary restraining order on the ICC ruling after the railroad and the 104 lumber companies protested.

**JOHNSON RELAXES**  
Acapulco, Mexico (UPI)—Democratic vice presidential nominee Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson relaxed with his family and key staff members here today. The party, which arrived Wednesday, for a stay of several days was lodged at the seaside villa of former Mexican President Miguel Aleman.

# Kennedy Says He'll Visit Every Section of Nation During His Campaign; First Stops Will Be Alaska and Hawaii, Symbols of 'The New Frontier'

Hyannis Port, Mass. (UPI)—Sen. John F. Kennedy announced today he will open his 1960 campaign for the presidency in Hawaii and Alaska around Sept. 1 and then make a "vigorous" stumping tour of every section of the nation.

The Democratic standard bearer said in a statement that he had chosen the 49th and 50th states as starting points

for his campaign because "they are in a sense symbols of the new frontier" which he has taken for his campaign theme.

"These two states represent the continuing prospect for growth and vitality in America," Kennedy said. "The spirit of adventure which drove men to Alaska and Hawaii must be awakened again in the American people if we are to maintain our position as a leader in the free world."

Kennedy said he and his running mate, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, will "wage a vigorous campaign aimed at returning control of the executive branch of the government to our party in November."

"I plan to visit every section of our country," he added.

This implied he would do some campaigning in the South, sections of which have been aroused over the Democratic platform's strong civil rights plank. It was thought when Johnson was nominated for vice president that the Texan would bear the heaviest burden of campaigning below the Mason-Dixon line.

Additional posts were filled, meantime, in upper echelons of the seasoned strategy crew which Kennedy has assigned to steer him to victory in the election.

John M. Bailey, Democratic state chairman of Connecticut and a veteran of almost 30 years in politics, was named as Kennedy's personal liaison

man to deal with the party's state, national and county organization leaders.

Bailey, who played a large part in Kennedy's climb to the Democratic presidential nomination, has been working with the senator and other aides in shaping up a campaign timetable. He said Kennedy would carry his campaign into "as many states as time will allow," and that he would travel wherever Kennedy goes.
