

Minoso Leads Sox Into First Place, 7th Straight Win

Minnie Minoso personally led the Chicago White Sox into first place Saturday and to their seventh straight victory with four hits and three runs batted-in for a 5-3 decision over the stumbling New York Yankees.

It marked the first time the White Sox took over the American league lead since May 24 and also the first time the Yankees moved out of it since June 26.

Minoso was chiefly responsible for both accomplishments with a double and three singles.

He tied the score at 1-1 in the fifth inning with a single, then produced a two-run single during a sixth-inning four-run rally that clinched the game for the Sox.

Bob Shaw, with relief from Gerry Staley in the ninth inning, recorded his ninth victory although roughed up for 10 hits, including Bill Showers' 18th homer with the bases empty in the eighth. Whitey Ford, who was knocked out in the sixth, suffered his sixth loss against the same number of victories.

A crowd of 28,402 watched the Yankees drop their ninth game in their last 12 starts.

Senators Beat A's
The Washington Senators beat the Kansas City Athletics, 8-3, with the aid of the first triple play of the American league season. With Bill Tuttle and Jerry Lumpe on base via singles, Ramos grabbed Whitey Herzog's liner and threw to Julio Becquer at first to double Lumpe. Becquer then fired to the shortstop as Tuttle had no chance getting back to second.

Harmon Killebrew drove in two Senators runs with his ninth homer. Norm Siebren and Herzog connected for the A's. Chuck Stobbs stemmed a Kansas City rally in the fourth to pick up his seventh win, while Bud Daley was tagged with his seventh loss.

Cleveland's Jimmy Piersall was thrown out of another game, but the Indians backed Jim Perry's 11th victory with a 4-2 triumph over the Boston Red Sox. Mike de la Hoz drove in two Tribe runs with his first major league homer and a sacrifice fly. Boston's runs came on Ted Williams' 16th homer of the year and 508th of his career, and Willie Tasby's fourth of the season.

Detroit and Baltimore split a two-night doubleheader, the Tigers winning the opener, 4-1, on Hank Aguirre's three-hitter and the Orioles taking the nightcap, 4-3, as Clem Labine walked Jim Gentile with the bases loaded and two out in the ninth inning.

Frank Bolling drove in two runs with his seventh homer of the year and scored another in the first game. Eddie Yost powered his ninth homer for added insurance. Aguirre pitched his first complete game of the year and chalked up his first victory since May 22. His shutout was ruined by Dave Nicholson's third homer.

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MARKS FALL IN JUNIOR TRACK TEST

Rick Lewis led an assault on the records in the events held at the all-comers track meet at Medford High school yesterday morning. Rick broke four of the 13 records that were bettered.

Lewis bettered marks in the 75-yard dash, the low hurdles, the high jump, and the broad jump, in the 10 and under age group.

Another record broken was in the 10 and under boys 220, by Jay Corey, Ashland. In the 11 and 12-year-old boys group Jim Cox knocked a second off the low hurdles standard and Jack Mullen and Dennis Bolz improved the pole vault record by three inches.

In the 13 and 14 age group Sperm Kiger of Gold Hill tied the record in the 75 and in the 15 and 16 class Don Garrison set a new top at 5-11 in the high jump.

The girls also shattered marks with Valerie Corey, Ashland bettering her own leap in the high jump and Pam McCay tying the low hurdle record. Both girls were in the 11 and 12 year old group.

Sanders Larrups Into Lead Of Third Round PGA Tourney

Hits Pace Setting 210 Total Score

Akron, O.—Convivial Doug Sanders, a modern Walter Hagen on and off the course, laughed and larrups his way to the third round lead in the P.G.A. Gold championship Saturday with a two under par 32-37-69 and a pace-setting 210 total.

The young man from Miami Beach took a one-shot lead over second round leader Jay Herbert, 48-year-old Slammin' Sammy Snead, and 45-year-old Jim Ferrier in a day of torrid action over the sun-baked acres of the Firestone Country club.

Another shot away at 212 as they elaborated this treacherous 7,165 yard par 35-35-70 course came Don January of Dallas with Doug Ford and Fred Hawkins back at 214; Dave Marr of Houston and Doy Finstlerwald at 215, among those at 216 was golden boy Arnold Palmer who stumbled Saturday in his apparently thwarted bid for "triple crown" victory.

Sanders stepped out on the head end with a blazing front nine in which he played "unconscious" golf after a gay evening of early celebration on the 27th birthday he observes today.

"Maybe you ought to be home in bed because you're only two shots back of the lead," he was told. "The rest of the leaders will be sleeping."

Uses Old Hagen Line
That's when young Doug gave them an old Hagen line. "They may be in bed," he grinned. "But they ain't sleeping."

Young Doug didn't do any sleeping out there Saturday as he battled the wire-tough rough and split some or most of those thread-needle fairways. For on the front nine he shot five birdies against one double bogey and when all the divots stopped flying he was riding on the head end by one slim shot. Yet, still ahead.

Ferrier fired a course record 34-32-66—breaking the first round 67 which Palmer split in the first round and Herbert matched in the second round—to move into hot contention for the crown he won 'way back in 1947. That put him at 211 along with Snead, who had a 37-33-70 and Herbert, who shot 35-37-72.

It was a scorching, sultry day of torrid developments which included:
—Palmer's eyebrow-raising collapse as he finished the last three holes with a triple bogey and two bogeys to fall six shots off the pace and only 18 holes between him and his hopes of a fabled triple as he sought to add the P.G.A. to his U.S. Open and Masters victories.

—With a score of 224 necessary to survive the cut to the low 60 and ties for tomorrow's final round, the elimination of Ben Hogan with a 78 for 225, as well as defending champion Bob Rosburg and former Open king Jack Fleck.

—The calling on the carpet of Cary Middlecoff, where he was censured for slow play after requiring four hours and 20 minutes to complete a round in which two three-somes played through.

—Announcement of a record payoff purse of \$83,130.

Reds Recall 3rd Baseman

Cincinnati—The Cincinnati Reds announced Saturday night they have recalled third baseman Cliff Cook and pitcher Jim Maloney from Nashville of the Southern Association and first baseman Gordon Coleman from Seattle of the Pacific Coast league.

Coleman may arrive in time for Sunday's home game against St. Louis, while Cook and Maloney will join the club in Chicago on Monday.

Doug got one shot back on the 13th when he missed a 25-foot birdie but then missed the green to bogey the 18th and finish it up with a 37. He was two over par on that nine but it was good for one of those scrambling Hagen scores out of the past which carried the old master to five of these P.G.A. titles.

Next came two rock steady pars and on the eighth he hit them with another birdie by ramming home a curling 50-foot putt. Another par and he was out in 32. The journey home—as in the shades of morning—was a rough one. It took him three shots to get on the short 12th for a bogey and he three-putted the 13th for another bogey.
