

Jones Pitches Two Verdicts In Relief

Sherman (Roadblock) Jones doesn't qualify as a starting pitcher, but what a lulu of a relief hurler he is.

Jones has turned the trick ten different times for Tacoma this season in Pacific Coast league play. Sunday he did it twice winning both the opener and nightcap against Sacramento with both games going extra innings.

But what's more, the wins were numbers nine and ten in a row for Jones and he hasn't lost a decision yet—that's right, his record is 10-0, all in relief.

Tacoma won its games, 2-1 and 3-2. In other action Spokane opened its big guns to blast Vancouver, 13-0; San Diego took two shutouts from Salt Lake, 1-0 and 2-0; and Seattle split with Portland, losing the first game, 4-2, and winning the second, 6-3.

Willie McCovey was Jones' jack-in-the-box of the first Tacoma-Sacramento game. The former San Francisco Giant popped his first RBI, homered over the fence in the 13th frame to end the contest. During the five innings Jones worked, he struck out five, walked one and allowed three hits.

The strong-armed fastballer came on in the ninth stanza of the second game and faced six men in the next two innings. Jose Pagan's single drove Danny O'Connell home in the 11th to score the winning run. Three of the batters to face Jones struck out. The game had been tied, 2-2, since the eighth.

Eighteen hits off starter Chet Nichols and three relievers told the story at Spokane where Ray Semproch hurled a four-hit shutout to gain his fourth victory against no defeats. Nichols, the winningest pitcher in the league, suffered the loss.

Ron Fairly led the Indian attack with two home runs, a double, and a single good for three RBIs. Willie Davis also had four hits for the Spokane. Tony Roig started the victory march with a three run circuit blast in the first inning.

Back-to-back shutouts by San Diego's Frank Barnes and Ken McBride snapped the jinx Salt Lake has held on the

Padres since the season began. Prior to the double defeat, Salt Lake had won 10 of the 11 games between the two teams.

Barnes picked up his winning run in the sixth frame and coasted from there on out. The Bees connected for only two bingles in the game. McBride got his backing in the first inning of the second contest when two runs came home. He gave up but five hits in the contest.

The double win came on the heels of an announcement Saturday by Padre manager George Meikovich that he was giving up his position but would stay on with the club until his successor was named.

Seattle snapped Portland's five-game winning streak in the nightcap game with moundman Ted Wiandt doing most of the work. Wiandt allowed but four hits in recording his third win against two losses. Seattle had two runs in the first, three in the third and one in the sixth. Portland had two in the third and one in the fifth.

Portland's Noel Mickelson scattered but six hits in the first game while going the distance. The Rainiers tied the game at 1-1 in the fifth and 2-2 in the sixth but couldn't keep the Beaver pace. Don Taussig had the game's only homer, a solo clout for Portland in the fifth.

Other loop contention saw Roseburg whitewash Grants Pass 12 to 0 on Saturday night and tip GP again on Sunday 8 to 5. Roseburg's White Sox thereby pulled even with Ashland again at the top of the standings and Grants Pass dropped into the cellar. The Ashlanders won 6 to 0 from the Klamath Falls in a non-leaguer.

Lee Templeton had four hits in four times up and scored four runs for Crescent City in the 3 1/2-hour fray. His smash which bounced over the fence in deep right field for an automatic double was actually the longest blow of the day. Les Gooden and newly-married Bunky Peterson each added two hits for California in the slugfest and Peterson had three runs batted in for the game.

For Medford, Kay Vaughn slapped three hits in four trips and four RBIs. Bill Anhorn, who yesterday made the switch from Junior Legion to semi-pro ball, Dick Durante and George Ice each socked two safe wallops and Bob Pond and Ken Knapp drove in two markers apiece. Medford outlit the Crescents 13 to 12. The difference was the 12 free passes that CC got to the Pin Lanes nine and the eight to four advantage in miscues.

Pitchers Duel
Saturday night's session was pretty much a pitcher's duel with two of three California runs unearned. Medford almost didn't field a team. Not enough players were immediately on hand. But, once the keggers had sufficient numbers and took the field in somewhat makeshift manner, they turned in a creditable performance. Crescent City was a bit sharper in the field in a style pleasing to Manager Bob McChesney.

Medford's Don Sanford and the coast team's Terry DeGross each heaved six-hit ball. Sanford whiffed 12 batters and his mound opponent six. DeGross allowed three free jaunts to the base paths and the Medford twirler four.

Crescent City got one Saturday run in the sixth inning on an error, a sacrifice bunt by Les Gooden on which runner Bill Sullivan went all the way from first to third base and a sacrifice flyout by Templeton. In the ninth frame for insurance two runs crossed on a base on balls, a sacrifice by Peterson, an error and hits by Sam Wigley and Sullivan.

Medford got a runner as far as third base only once on Saturday eve. Runners reached second on five other occasions. Sullivan for the visitors and Chuck Marchant for the Pin Lanes each had two hits. Fielding gem of the night was the shoe top high snare of Don Wendt's hot liner by first baseman Templeton.

Yesterday, to win, Crescent City broke a 12-all tie with two runs in the ninth inning. Gooden led off with a high fly to right field and scampered all the way to third base when the ball popped out of Medford Manager Pete Hale's glove. Templeton walked and Gooden tabulated on a passed ball. Templeton moved to third on a DeGross groundout and came home on a single by Larry Howard.

Crescent City started off with five markers in the opening canto on the homer by Moore, a single by Peterson, three errors, three walks and two passed balls. Medford gained two tallies in the third on singles by Durante and

Death Ends Secret of Race Driver

Salerno, Italy (UP) — Jean Saveniers was the mystery man of European auto racing. To thousands of fans, he was plain Jean Blanc of Belgium. He adopted that assumed name when he first started competing in races because his wealthy parents disapproved of the sport.

But Jean's secret finally was revealed Sunday — after he died in the flaming wreckage of his sports car.

Saveniers was killed and 19 spectators were injured when his Cooper hurtled off the course and caught fire during the running of the seventh Salerno circuit race. Married and the father of an 18-month-old son, Saveniers was the business chief of a chain of snackbars in Brussels and Antwerp owned by his parents. Because they opposed his interest in auto-racing, Jean competed in a select number of races in Europe — ones which he figured would not be mentioned in the Belgian press.

Piersall On Carpet

Boston (UP) — Jimmy Piersall, whose disputes with the umpires already have led to six ejections and heavy fines this season, was called on the carpet by American league President Joe Cronin today.

The fiery Cleveland Indian outfielder was ordered to report to Cronin and bring along his wife, Mary, for a discussion of his continuing disagreements with the arbiters.

The order came with a \$100 fine assessed by Cronin for Piersall's latest major dispute, a one-sided argument Saturday with Umpire Ed Hurley. Distracting Batter

Hurley said he was trying to warn Piersall against running back and forth in center field and thereby distracting the batter.

But when Hurley started out to give Piersall the warning, Jim raised both arms over his head and made a derogatory, pushing gesture at Hurley while they were still 150 feet apart.

Hurley swung up his thumb and Piersall was launched in his latest personal furor. Manager Joe Gordon and Coach Mel Harder followed Piersall to the showers by minutes.

Open Won By Rawls

Worcester, Mass. (UP) — The Women's Open golf tournament here were grim competitors on the course but full of advice and consolation around the club house.

Winner Betsy Rawls of Spartanburg, S. C., with a four over par 292 for four rounds, enthusiastically told newsmen that she learned to play the key shot of the tournament from Mickey Wright of Chula Vista, Calif.

Rawls sailed into her fourth U.S. Open championship with a four under par 68 in the semi-final round.

Miss Wright, who led for the first two rounds in seeking her third consecutive U.S. Open victory, said she was helped in her early rounds with a tip from another tournament player, Peggy K. Bell of Southern Pines, S.C. Mickey finished fifth with 299.

Joyce Ziske of Waterford, Wis., finished one stroke behind Miss Rawls.

Mrs. Marlene Bauer Hagge of Crystal River, Fla., finished third with a four-round total of 298 to tie Mary Faulk of Sea Island, Ga.
