Mary is married to playwright John Osborne, one of London's leading exponents of angry youth, but the blonde newcomer is not as angry as she is frustrated. Nine of ten actresses complain they are tired of movies and want to fulfill their dramatic appetites by appearing in the "theatrical." Not our girl Mary. She wants to make movies. "I've made four pictures in England," she said, "but no one has ever asked me to work in a Hollywood film. And I assure you, it is impossible to become an international star without making Hollywood movies. "Some of our greatest performers at home have not become great international stars simply because they've worked only in Europe. "Take Paul Scofield and Peggy Ashcroft—two of our greatest performers. I don't believe anyone over here ever heard of them." Even Broadway can't produce the worldwide magic of the flicks, according to the slender English beauty. She recently completed a stand in New York with "Duel of Angels," in which she now will co-star with Vivien Leigh in Los Angeles and San Francisco. Producer Jerry Wald is anxious to sign Mary to a contract and a new picture as soon as possible, so she may become a temporary resident of Hollywood. Her most recent movie, "Sons and Lovers," made in England for Wald, promises to be a smash hit. "I'll take pictures every time," Mary continued. Market's Ten-Day Decline Almost Hits Low for Year

New York — (UPI) — Stocks rounded out 10 days of steady decline in the week ended Friday and all but set new lows for the year. Railroad issues made the poorest showing with their average at the lowest level since mid-September of 1958. The drop, which in two weeks wiped out more than \$10 billion in value of all listed stocks was accompanied by low volume—not a single three million share session in the 10 days. Lack of demand rather than liquidation brought prices down steadily to levels where some Wall Street experts felt the list was entitled at least to a technical recovery. None looks for a runaway advance although the predictions of a recovery after some recent declines have been quite wrong. The general feeling is that from here on the market may have a considerable period of narrow movement with trading dull. Many Causes Cited Many reasons are advanced for the erosion of prices, an erosion which has brought out the usual belief that the decline has been overdue. The foreign situation is rated as a big factor, but of more importance, according to the experts, has been an erosion of profits—a profits squeeze reflected in many reduced corporate earnings reports for the second quarter. Added to these are an excess capacity for industry resulting in heavy supplies of goods which in turn presses down prices; excess inventories which preclude new buying as supplies are worked off, and competition from the bond market which, aided by easier money, is attracting investors. Big stock traders such as mutual funds and pension funds were said to be out of the market, except for some switching operations. This helped bring dullness. Lack Incentive A 10-day decline for the industrials is the longest one this year. Utilities fell in eight out of the 10 past sessions, and falls in nine of them. The worst previous industrial loss was in seven sessions from Feb. 29 to Mar. 8 when this group fell 32.90 points to a new low since Feb. 19, 1959 at 599.10, a low that has not been broken. Business news failed to provide incentive to new buying, although most of the statistics showed gains and were sharply higher than a year ago when a giant steel strike brought down many lines. Steel operations rose to 54.6 per cent of rated capacity from 51.8 per cent the week before and 42.2 per cent in the recent holiday week. Coal output rose sharply after the miners returned from vacations. Car loadings rose but comparisons with last year were distorted by the steel strike. Electricity output gained and retail trade held its own. Auto output rose on the week but was under last year. The market ignored such favorable items as a rise in the annual rate of personal income to more than \$400 billion for June; higher farm income; record high cash dividends for June and the first six months; a formal action to merge Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads. Earnings Down More attention was paid to lower earnings reports by Du Pont, General Electric, RCA, and Johns Manville and dividend cuts by Sinclair and Louisville and Nashville. Few stocks were spared in the decline. Defense issues were the best performers and even these at times met selling. Blue chips were hard hit and so were some of the recent glamor issues. The Dow-Jones industrial average closed the week at 609.87, a new low since May 12, off 20.37 points from the previous week, and off 37.04 points in the past two weeks. The rails closed at 135.84, a new low since Sept. 15, 1958.
