Home Ownership in U.S. at Highest Position in History

New York—Home ownership has risen to the highest position in the nation's history, according to the United States Saving and Loan League. That organization in its annual savings and loan fact book finds that 61 per cent of all nonfarm families—some 28 million of them—own their homes. That contrasts with 53 per cent a decade ago and 45 per cent in 1930. Home owners are financing these houses with \$131 billion of mortgage debt which is 11 per cent higher than at the end of 1959. Aggregate mortgage recordings in 1959, according to the fact book, amounted to \$32.7 billion. Of this total the savings and loan associations led with \$13,074,000,000 or 40.6 per cent. Home mortgages recorded in 1959 totaled \$3,782,000, 10 per cent higher than in 1958 but 3 per cent under the peak year of 1955. Savings Near 12 Billion Not only did the savings and loan associations lead other lenders in mortgages but also they attracted the bulk of national savings. Over-the-counter net savings for all institutions amounted to \$11.6 billion for 1959. Of that amount savings and loan associations attracted \$6.7 billion or 58 per cent of the total. While the associations' savings rose above rates of the past, the gains of commercial banks and mutual savings banks were reduced. The fact book ranked 1959 savings gains in seven selected media as follows: savings associations, \$6.7 billion; commercial banks, \$2.7 billion; mutual funds, \$2.7 billion; and credit unions, \$600 million. United States savings bonds fell by \$1.9 billion for the fourth year in a row, and deposits in postal savings banks shrank \$200 million for the 11th consecutive year. Last Year Was Big The principal reason for the trend of savings to the associations was the higher rate of return provided, it was pointed out. The only yields on savings exceeding the average of 3.7 per cent paid by loan associations was in U.S. bonds and AAA corporate bonds. High grade municipal bonds equaled the association rate. The associations reported a big year all around for 1959. Their assets reached a record high of \$63,472,000,000, up \$8.4 billion or 15 per cent compared with 1958. All savings of the nation reached \$156,126,000,000 at the end of 1959, the fact book noted. New York led with \$32.3 billion; California was second with \$17.3 billion followed by Illinois \$10.4 billion; Pennsylvania \$9.8 billion; Ohio \$9.6 billion; Massachusetts \$8.2 billion and New Jersey \$6.6 billion.

Baseball Announcer Vince Scully Is Hollywood's Most Listened-to Man

Hollywood—UPI—Jack Benny fired off the first fan letter in his long career to the most listened-to man in Cinema City—a celebrity who has stars and moguls hanging on his every word. Outside of Southern California and Brooklyn this imposing figure is almost entirely unknown. But he can break up concerts, stop shooting on the sets and commands fan mail on the grand scale. He's Vince Scully, the man who announces the Dodgers baseball games. An 11-year veteran with the ballclub, Scully has made Southern Californians a sect of transistor radio fanatics. When Dodger games are in progress, movie sets, TV stages and the streets are filled with semi-conscious listeners with wires running from tiny radios to their ears. Delighted With Popularity Scully, an engaging Irishman with a shock of fire-red hair, is delighted with his popularity among movie-town's bigwigs. "I guess my biggest fan is producer Mervyn Leroy," Vince said. "He gave me a small role in one of his pictures just for the heck of it. Benny sent me a telegram

of congratulations for the job I'm doing. He said it was the only fan letter he'd ever written. Kirk Douglas also sent me a nice letter." During games in the Coliseum fans can hear Scully's account of the action clearly—there are that many transistor radios blaring throughout the crowd. "I think that's because so many Californians are unfamiliar with major league baseball," he explained, "and they like to understand what is happening out on the field." Part of Show Business Scully considers his broadcasting job a part of show business. "There is always excitement and drama in a ballgame, and I depend a great deal on the roar of the crowd to give it punch. "There have been complaints from the Hollywood Bowl and theaters in this area that people can't hear what's going on because of the radios smuggled into performances. Even the actors can keep up with the games by listening from the stage between lines." One performer was embarrassed in a restaurant recently when the approached a patron wearing an ear phone to inquire about the Dodgers' score. It turned out the man he had asked was wearing a hearing aid. "We're all mighty happy that the club is so welcome here," Scully concluded. "Underneath it all, Los Angeles fans are almost exactly the same as the ones we left in Brooklyn."

Ike Keeps Hands Off V.P. Issue

Newport, R.I.—UPI—President Eisenhower today took an official hands-off policy toward selection of a Republican vice presidential candidate but pronounced the GOP platform plank on defense a "pretty good" one. In the face of published reports that a preference for U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge as a running mate for Vice President Richard M. Nixon, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty pointed out that the convention, not the President, picks the party's candidates. He insisted earlier he had not heard the President express any preference for the vice presidential spot. The President is known, however, to have great respect and affection for Lodge.

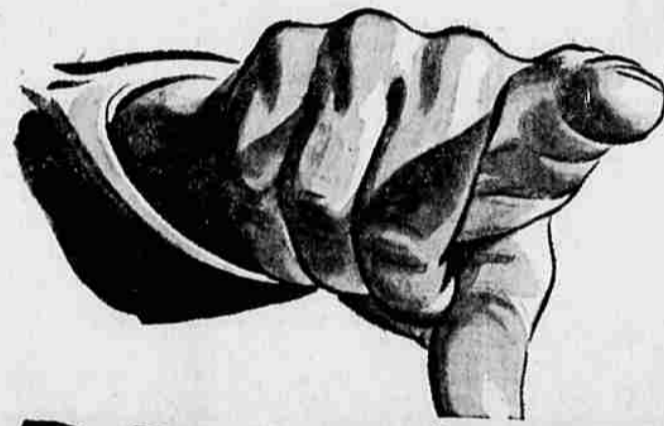
