New York—(UPI)—Industry's direct labor cost per dollar of sales was unchanged last year from the postwar high reached in 1958, according to Standard and Poor's Outlook. The effects of widespread economies instituted during the recession tended to wear off as the year progressed and it was largely through increased sales that industrial firms were able to offset the continuing rise in wage scales, Outlook points out.

Reynolds and Co. says Pacific Finance Corp., fourth in size among independent auto finance companies, is one of the quality concerns in its group. It is an investment type issue noted for the quality of its earning power and the clearly defined growth trend of its business, the advisory firm points out.

International Statistical Bureau looks for a further decline in the cost of money from current levels. Another dip in the discount rate, which is likely, would be reflected in lower prime rates, the bureau adds. "This is likely in view of the lack of dynamism in the economy even though it is tending slightly higher."

Festival Cast Performs Aply, With Spirit in Opening Play

Ashland—The threat of an unusual summer rain matched Kate's blustery attitude as Shakespeare's shrew was tamed again last night before a southern Oregon audience. But as the evening progressed, the weather, like Katharina's mood, cleared to provide a perfect setting for a rollicking first night performance of "The Taming of the Shrew."

The 29-member cast performed aptly and with spirit, making the humorous, often-bawdy comedy trip right along. However, the play failed to measure up to the Oregon Shakespearean Festival's own standards in one respect.

Costumer Douglas A. Russell and Director Robert B. Loper seemed to be caught with their homework undone. Like a small boy who caught the seat of his Sunday pants on a nail, their costume errors seemed to blush through the gaudy outer covering of an otherwise excellent production.

Small sin that it was, Costumer Russell failed to read the play before designing the costumes. Although excellently done, in at least two or perhaps three places, they failed to match with Shakespeare's lines.

After Katharina and Petruchio are wed and about to arrive at Petruchio's home, Shakespeare paints a verbal picture of the servants, in blue and white stockings, scurrying about to make ready for the arrival.

But when the servants finally appear, they are dressed in brown with no stockings visible at all.

And later in the play, Lucentio's vivid green cape is called scarlet by his aged father—a rather remarkable event, unless the poor old gentleman is suffering from red-green color blindness.

Only other disquieting technical note was a scene between Katharina and her sister, Bianca. Katharina drags her sister out on stage at the end of a lasso, while the poor girl, whose hands are not bound, keeps crying for her sister to unbind her hands.

Effective Business
But it was an effective bit of business and may be an improvement on the original.

It was a toss-up to name who turned in the best performance. Both Ann Hackney, as Katharina, and Gerard Larson, as Petruchio, did outstanding jobs.

Miss Hackney convincingly stormed, screamed and cried her way through the play until finally subdued by Larson, who, unlike his natural self, was the perfect pre-emptory, pig-headed shrew-tamer.

Last night's play was an excellent example of the Festival's unusual company system. The cast members all deserve individual laudatory comment. Special mention should be given, however, to Graham Woodruff and his

portrayal of Petruchio's servant. The familiar story begins with a drunken Christopher Sly, William Livingston, being thrown out of the tavern by the hostess, Diane Sonder-skov.

But it seems that no one will marry Katharina's sister until Katharina, the eldest daughter, is married. Fresh from Verona comes Petruchio and his servant, Graham Woodruff, looking for a wife. And in the madcap meriment that follows, boy meets girl, boy tames girl and everyone lives happily ever after.

Completing the cast were Charles Taylor, William Nye, Milton Fuchs, Ted Lawson, Fred Strange, Shirley Cox, John Ruppel, Michael Pierce, William Curtis, Will Mackenzie, Edgar Vandevort, Anthony Christlieb and Don Essary.—J.B.
