

Friend, Skinner Star as Pirates Trip St. Louis; Regain NL Lead

Cincy Comes From Behind To Top Cubs

A couple of Bobs helped the Pittsburgh Pirates bob back into the National League lead. Pittsburgh, ousted by Milwaukee on Sunday for the first time since May 29, regained its top rating over the idle Braves by two percentage points Monday night as Bob Skinner completed a home run cycle and Bob Friend won his second straight from the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-2.

Skinner's blast gave him at least one homer against each of the other seven clubs in the league this season. His .395 batting average against the Cardinals has kept him in the top 10 with a .301 mark. Friend's triumph was his third in a row over St. Louis, including one carried over from last year. He needed help to get the last batter out after Alex Grammas and Carl Sawatski had singled in the ninth. But Elroy Face was equal to the task as he came in to retire pinch hitter Ken Boyer for the final out and preserve Friend's 11th victory.

Cincinnati defeated Chicago, 6-5, in the only other National League game. There was no action in the American League.

Skinner's home run in the eighth inning broke a 2-2 tie and Roberto Clemente tied it with a tremendous blast into the bleachers for the Pirates' final run in the ninth.

Musial Homers
Stan Musial put St. Louis in front when he led off the second inning with his fifth homer this month. Bill Virdon evened the score in the sixth on a home run, and the Pirates moved ahead, 2-1, in the seventh as Rocky Nelson singled, moved to second on Clemente's sacrifice and scored on a single by Bill Mazerowski.

The Cards tied it again in their half of the seventh as Daryl Spencer singled, moved up on an infield out and scored on pinch hitter George Crowe's single.

Ronnie Kline, who relieved starter Larry Jackson in the eighth, was charged with his eighth loss of the season. The defeat also halted a four-game Cardinal winning streak.

Cincinnati scored all its runs in the last three innings to overcome a five-run deficit and break a four-game losing streak. The Reds moved to within 5-4 in the eighth with the help of Frank Robinson's double, Wally Potts sacrifice fly and Gordon Coleman's single.

They won the game in the ninth on singles by Leon Cardenas, Gus Bell and Vada Pinson and a pair of sacrifice flies by Eddie Kasko and Harry Anderson.

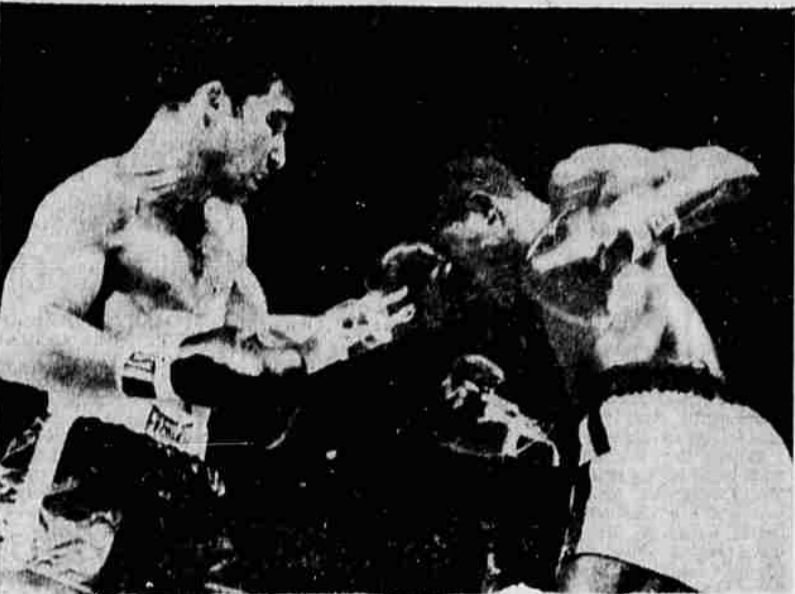
Chicago tallied a run in the third and George Altman climaxed a four-run rally in the fourth when he hit his seventh homer of the year with two on. Jim Brosnan faced only one batter in the eighth and picked up his fourth win. Don Elston was tagged with his fifth defeat.

Tacoma Win Streak Broken by Beavers

One winning streak fell by the boards and another was continued in Pacific Coast League action Monday night.

The Tacoma Giants had their string broken at six when they were beaten by Portland, 7-3. The San Diego Padres stretched their skein to three with an 8-2 win over Salt Lake. They were the only games played last night.

All eight teams will be in action tonight. Portland is at Tacoma again, Seattle moves into San Diego, Spokane stops at Salt Lake and Vancouver visits Sacramento.

Don Taussig drove in four runs with a homer and a single to lead Portland past Tacoma. The circuit clout came in the fourth with two on and the single came during a two-run rally in the ninth.

Griffin Gets Win
Southpaw Bill Griffin took the win, his fourth, although he needed help from Bill Kennedy and Larry Jansen. Eddie Fisher, first of three Tacoma pitchers, suffered his ninth loss in 19 decisions.

An eight-inning relief job by Ed Hobaugh paced the Padres in their win over Salt Lake. Hobaugh gave up only five hits after relieving starter Don Ferrarese to record his eighth win. Camillo Carreon homered for the Pads while Chick King had a four bagger for the losers.

Banks Stays In Lineup
Chicago—UPP—The Chicago Cubs will have Ernie Banks back in the lineup today for his 589th consecutive game at shortstop.

Banks was carried off the field on a stretcher in the second inning of Monday's game with the Cincinnati Reds after Don Newcombe hit him in the left knee with a fast ball.

The slender shortstop, who has captured the National League's Most Valuable Player award for the past two seasons, spent two hours at a hospital undergoing X-rays ice-pack treatment.

Doctors said the ball hit him on the side of the leg, just missing the kneecap and there was no evidence of a fracture.

Medford's city swimming team, which finished fourth in the Southern Oregon Invitational championships at Roseburg last week end, will journey to the Chronicle AAU Open in Spokane this week end.

Medford Recreation Supervisor Ken Lyons said 10 swimmers will make the trip. He said the meet may be entered by as many as 30 teams representing nearly all of the western states and British Columbia.

North Bend won last week end's meet with 294 points. Eugene came in second with 214 points, followed by Roseburg with 205 and Medford with 202.

Other scores were Grants Pass 169, Bend 135, Sweet Home 41, Springfield 27, Reedsport 19 and Klamath Falls 16.

Medford's three Hesses each gained first places in the Sunday finals. Linda in the 15-16 year old girls' 100 yard breaststroke and 160 yards individual medley, Bruce in the 13-14 boys' 100 free stroke and 160 medley and Rhonda in the 11-12 girls' 40-yard backstroke. Rhonda was second in the 40-yard butterfly event.

The Medford 15-16 girls 160-yard medley relay team of Linda Hess, Linda Wilkes, Roberta Willette and Nona Donahue won that event.

The meet was sanctioned by the Amateur Athletic Union and was billed as the largest swim meet slated in Oregon this year.

Melbourne, Australia—UPP—Herb Elliott, world record holder for the mile, has started his final phase of training for the Olympics in which he hopes to compete in the marathon as well as the 1,500 meter. Elliott runs 13 miles a day in his training grind and also does some weight-lifting.

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
