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Completion Of Freeway Set in 1963

The new Pacific freeway through Medford and the entire Rogue valley is tentatively scheduled to be completed by 1963—portions of it earlier. Final drawings of the two freeway interchanges with Medford were in the hands of city officials Tuesday.

Tom Edwards, state highway department engineer in Salem, told the Mall Tribune that the freeway from Central Point to Ashland should be completed in 1962. It will be done in three sections, he said, at an approximate cost in excess of \$10 1/2 million.

Russ Vetoes Upset Neutral Nations

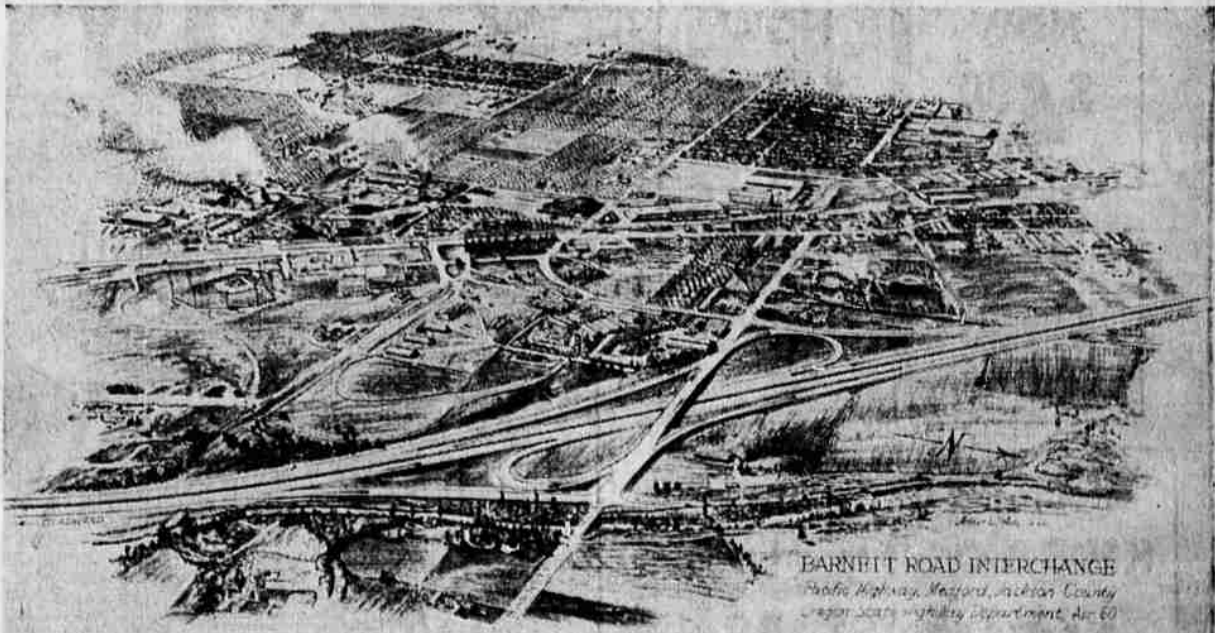

CRATER LAKE HIGHWAY INTERCHANGE - One of two interchanges connecting the city of Medford with the proposed Pacific freeway is located at its intersection with Crater Lake highway in north Medford. State highway department officials said the contract for the section of the freeway from Seven Oaks rd., north of Central Point to Jackson st., including construction of the above interchange, shall be let later this year. A stipulation in the contract will require that the freeway to the Crater Lake interchange be completed in 1961. The rest of the section to Jackson st. will be completed in 1962. The Crater Lake interchange will require the partial relocation of both the Medco Logging railroad and Biddle rd. Medford City Manager Robert Duff said the "looping" access road from the freeway to Biddle rd., is something the city administration had been working for. There will be two exits from the freeway and two entrances.



BARNETT ROAD INTERCHANGE - The second of the two interchanges between Medford and the new freeway is located at Barnett rd. This interchange will be included in the section of the freeway from 12th st. to North of Ashland. The contract for this section will be let sometime in 1961 and will be scheduled for completion in the fall of 1962. In the lower left of the drawing may be seen the partial relocation of the Bear creek channel which will be necessary when the freeway is constructed. This interchange will have two exits from the freeway and four entrances. Medford City Manager Robert Duff said that these drawings are final. They were prepared by the state highway department and represent more than two years of negotiations between the city and the department. Duff terms the interchanges "satisfactory" to the city administration.

Goldwater Pulls Out Of White House Race

Chicago - (UPI) - The last wispy trace of opposition to Richard M. Nixon evaporated today and the Republicans prepared to shout him into nomination for President at tonight's climactic fourth session of the GOP National Convention.

Only the question of Nixon's running mate remained to be settled and there was little doubt he would be Nixon's own choice - Henry Cabot Lodge, U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations.

It had been Nixon for President all along, but supporters of Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, most vocal spokesman of the party's conservative wing, had planned to put him in nomination.

Today Goldwater said, "He asked the Arizona delegates to keep him out of it and to cast their 14 votes for Nixon."

He said he couldn't muster enough votes for a real contest and that he was afraid his certain defeat would be taken as a defeat for conservatism.

GOP National Chairman Thurston B. Morton of Kentucky appeared to be the only man with even an outside chance to getting the vice presidential nod over Lodge.

But Nixon wants Lodge and President Eisenhower wants Lodge. The vice president said, however, that he would not make his final choice until he consults with 25 or 30 party leaders after his own nomination tonight.
