Skyline Conference Regarded as 'Dead'

Salt Lake City (UPI) - The Skyline conference is dead. Presidents of the eight universities in the mountain loop held a 10-hour wake for the conference Tuesday in Salt Lake City.

But they adjourned Tuesday night without setting a date for the funeral.

Instead, the boss men of Utah, Utah State, BYU, Denver, Colorado State, Montana, New Mexico and Wyoming universities issued an involved statement that emphasized none of the schools has withdrawn from the Skyline - yet. They did admit a realignment soon is "indicated."

They added that "final consideration" of the league realignment has been deferred until the next meeting of the presidents' council. The retiring chairman, President William Morgan of Colorado State, said this was "regularly scheduled" for December. It could come earlier.

Utah, BYU and New Mexico met a few weeks ago in San Francisco with Washington State, Oregon, Oregon State, Arizona and Arizona State to outline plans for a new five-state loop. This would leave the others hanging as independents, or looking around for new athletic colleagues.

Marshall Draws Praise; Will Kirkland Benched

San Francisco (UPI) - Willie Kirkland is scheduled to sit this one out today when the red-hot Milwaukee Braves resume their series at Candlestick Park with the luke warm San Francisco Giants.

"Kirkland is real bad," manager Tom Sheehan of the Giants roared Tuesday night following their 3-1 defeat by the Braves. "So I'll put Felipe Alou at his spot in right field, return Orlando Cepeda to the lineup in left and keep Jim Marshall at first base."

Marshall, in Sheehan's words, "played like hell" and smashed a home run in the ninth inning that averted a shutout. But Willie Kirkland looked at a called third strike with two aboard in the sixth inning as his batting average continued to whittle out.

Sam Jones pitched one of his finest games of the season in vain. The West Virginian fanned 11 Braves with his fast ball and curve. He didn't give up a hit until the sixth inning. Yet he came out a loser to Carlton Willey, who started to wobble in the ninth and needed a helping hand from Ron Piche.

The Braves, who now have won 11 out of 13 and are dogging the first place Pittsburgh Pirates by a half-game got the first run of the night in the seventh when Lee Maye cracked Jones' stone wall for a base hit, stole second and tallied on Johnny Logan's hit.

Two more Milwaukee runs tallied in the eighth after Ed Mathews had walked and Henry Aaron singled him to third. Joe Adcock laid own a

sacrifice bunt to bring in Mathews and Aaron completed the circuit on the same play when Marshall threw the ball to second and it went into left field for an error.

Jim atoned for this mishap with his second homer of the season to lead off the ninth. Then Willey gave the ball to Piche after Alou singled. Piche retired Hobie Landrith on an outfield fly, got pinch-hitter Dave Philley to hit into a fielder's choice than had Dale Lon, another pinch-swinger, ground out to end the game.

"I had good stuff," Jones said in his philosophical way. "But somebody's gotta lose."

SO Title Super-Modified Race At Klamath Falls

Super-modified autos converge on the Klamath County fairgrounds 1/2 mile dirt race track Sunday, July 31, at 1 p.m. for the first running of the Southern Oregon championships, destined to become an annual affair.

The long straightaways of the fairgrounds track will allow speeds of more than 100 miles an hour and the thrills that are associated with such high speed.

Race entries have been coming in from all over the country as the \$1,500 guaranteed purse and the chance to win a four-foot trophy are attracting the cream of the super-modified crop. This will be one of the largest purses paid for hardtop type cars in the northwest.

This race marks the return of Jack McCoy of Ashland to local racing. He will be driving the entry of Southern Oregon Speed and Marine of Medford. This car will be powered by a Chevrolet Impala engine and should be very potent.

Ed Brown of Willows, has entered. Ed has made two appearances at Ashland this season and both times won his heat and the main event. His car is a very fast Chevrolet. Brown and McCoy both

are veterans of late model stock car racing and both are experienced on long dirt tracks such as the fairgrounds oval. Both drivers also are well known to southern Oregon racing fans.

The championship event will begin with time trials at 1 p.m., with the first heat race to start at 2 p.m. Main event will be for 50 laps.

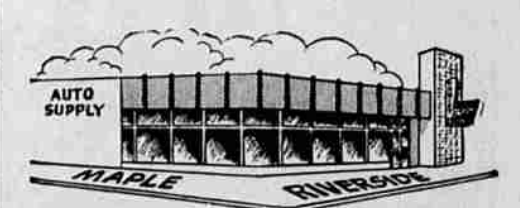
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
