

Market Recovery Runs Out of Gas

New York - (UPI) - The stock market's one-day recovery ran out of gas today.

The market was noticeably lower from the standpoint of the averages. Du Pont topped more than 4 points, Allied Chemical more than 2, Westinghouse a point and United Aircraft more than 1. Rails also were hard-hit. Baltimore & Ohio, Atlantic Coast Line, Louisville & Nashville, Illinois Central and Nickel Plate all dropped a point or more.

Soviet officials said they assured Mrs. Powers that they would notify her "immediately" when they receive word from the Soviet Union on her application.

Troops, Police End 3-Day Rioting in South Rhodesia

Bulawayo, South Rhodesia—(UPI)—Armed troops and police stormed through Bulawayo's Negro settlements today and stamped out the last flickering resistance of a three-day riot that took 11 lives.

Assassins Wound Cova, Castro Aide

Caracas, Venezuela - (UPI) - Unidentified assassins early today shot and seriously wounded Andrea Cova, chief of the Fidel Castro 28th of July movement in Caracas.

Five bullets hit Cova. His condition was reported as critical at the Central University hospital.

The assassination try came less than 12 hours after violent outbreaks in downtown Caracas between rival groups of pro-Castro and anti-Castro sympathizers. Police arrested at least 30 persons in an investigation to determine responsibility for the incidents which ranged from fist fights to exchanges of gunfire.

More than 360 Africans were arrested, including 41 found looting today by troops who moved through the black belt to mop up the last of the trouble makers. Police recovered big piles of loot including radios, refrigerators and sewing machines.

Charges Against Papers Dropped

Portland - (UPI) - Charges of unfair labor practices against the Oregon Journal and Oregonian filed by the American Newspaper Guild have been dismissed by the regional office of the National Labor Relations board.

Regional director Thomas P. Graham, Seattle, said there is insufficient evidence of violation and he is refusing to issue a complaint in the matter.

The charges were filed about a month ago against the two Portland dailies.

in the Negro settlements that were turned into a shambles of bent metal, wrecked buildings, spilled garbage cans and looted beer halls that left thousands of rioters drunk.

A ring of troops still protected the European quarters where whites were bitter at slowness of troops to act to quell the drunken rampage in which 60 or more persons were injured.

The worst of the violence appeared to have subsided as supplies ran out in looted beer halls but roving gangs of Africans kept the city tense.

Five Africans were killed Tuesday by police who fired into a menacing mob in an attempt to restore order.

Authorities said they were the first Africans to die at the hands of police in Southern Rhodesia since 1894.

One native was battered to death by a gang of hoodlums Tuesday and three Africans were killed Monday night by whites defending their stores in the settlement area.
