12,000 Fans Likely

Eugene—UPI—A capacity crowd of more than 12,000 fans will turn out Saturday for the U.S. Olympic intrasquad track and field meet at Hayward Field here, tournament officials predicted today.

The meet will be a climax to an intensive training session of prospective U.S. entrants in the Olympic Games at Rome this summer.

University of Oregon officials said all reserved seats at the school's famed Hayward Field had been sold, more than 4,000 of them.

Starting today, 8,000 general admission tickets went on sale at nearby McArthur Court. Dave Edstrom, the Webfoots' decaathlon hopeful, is recuperating from a sore groin muscle and will not appear in Saturday's meet.

But officials said Daryl Burleson, the 1,500 meter qualifier from Oregon, and Bill Dellinger, ex-Oregon star who will represent the U.S. in the 5,000 meters, should be at their running best Saturday.

More than 80 athletes, including alternates are at Oregon, temporary Olympic track and field headquarters.

The meet starts at 3:30 p.m. Chicago—UPI—The Chicago Cubs have announced the signing of Jim Hegon, former star catcher with the Cleveland Indians, as a coach.

The Cubs had released Hegon as an active player earlier this week.

ner have pretty much monopolized the headlines for the Pittsburgh Pirates this season but they'd be the first to admit the 29-year-old shortstop and ex-Duke basketball star is the guy who makes the club click. He's the glue that holds the infield together and the steady rat-tat-tat of his hits has kept Pittsburgh rallies going all season.

Groat demonstrated again how he comes through under pressure Wednesday night when he lashed out three hits, scored three runs and drove in one to lead the Pirates to a 7-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Pirates Increase Lead
 The win enabled the Pirates to sweep a three-game series with the dangerous Cardinals and rebuild their National league lead to 1 1/2 games over the Milwaukee Braves, who suffered a 5-0 loss to the San Francisco Giants.

The Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Cincinnati Reds, 2-0, and the Philadelphia Phillies, beat the Chicago Cubs, 7-5, in other National league games while the Chicago White Sox ripped the Boston Red Sox, 10-4, and the Washington Senators scored a 5-4 15-inning victory over the Detroit Tigers in American league action.

Groat hasn't hit a single home run this season but his three hits Wednesday night raised his average to .317. He has scored 60 runs and driven in 31. Rivals say he "hits with a sting" and he did just that Wednesday night, contributing a hit to three Pittsburgh scoring innings.

Sadecki Suffers Defeat
 George Witt, Earl Francis and Joe Gibbon all failed for the Pirates before Fred Green came on to pitch the last four innings and allow the Cardinals only one hit while striking out four. Ray Sadecki suffered his fifth loss compared to four wins for the Cardinals.

Jack Sanford, who seems to be "real good or real bad," pitched a four-hitter for his sixth shutout and ninth win behind an eight-hit San Francisco attack that included a two-run double and two singles by Orlando Cepeda. The Giants kayoed Lew Burdette in six innings and tagged him with his sixth defeat against 10 wins.

Rookie Jim Maloney shut out the Dodgers for six innings in his big league debut but Maury Wills singled home a run to snap the scoreless tie in the seventh and the National league champions added another run in the eighth when reliever Bill Henry wild-pitched with Jim Gilliam on third. Don Drysdale struck out six and pitched a four-hitter to win his ninth game for the Dodgers.

Six Straight Defeats
 Bobby Del Greco and Pancho Herrera hit homers and Johnny Callison and pitcher Gene Conley struck key doubles for the Phillies, who handed the Cubs their sixth straight loss. Conley went 7 1/3 innings to win his seventh game while Seth Morehead lost his seventh decision.

The White Sox feasted on Boston pitching for the second straight game with a 12-hit attack that featured a homer by Sherman Lollar and doubles by Jim Landis, Minnie Minoso and Nelson Fox. Turk Lown picked up his second victory although Gerry Staley shut out the Red Sox for the last three innings. Ted Williams and Gary Geiger homered for the Red Sox.

Bob Allison's 15th inning single broke up a four-hour and 48-minute marathon, also delayed 15 minutes by fog, in Washington. The Tigers scored three runs in the ninth to send the game into overtime after the Senators built up a 4-0 early lead with the help of homers by Jim Lemon and Pete Whisenant.

900 Tags Issued For Antelope

Portland—About 50 sportsmen of some 4,000 who applied were on hand Monday morning at the game commission's Portland office to witness the drawing for the antelope tags scheduled for August 29-31.

A total of 900 tags was issued for the six antelope hunting areas. Best chance for success in drawing tags was in Area 1 where 303 nimrods applied for the 100 tags to be issued. A total of 381 hunters applied for the 100 tags in Area 6 and 439 for the 150 tags in Area 5. Nimrods submitted 725 applications for 150 tags scheduled to be issued in Area 3, and 825 submitted applications for the 250 tags on the schedule.
