**Writer Says Ike Could Have Been Renominated, If Not for Constitution**

Chicago — If it weren't for the 22nd Amendment, Richard M. Nixon would be running for vice president again and Dwight D. Eisenhower would be nominated by the Republicans for a third term, even at the age of 69.

That, at least, seemed to be the emotional message the party sent showering over the chief executive and his wife, Mamie, Tuesday night as the Republican Convention went on a sentimental binge cheering the man who broke the Democratic grip on the White House eight years ago.

Eisenhower was a little emotional too, as he made his last appearance as titular head of the party. There were tears in his eyes as he thanked the delegates in convention hall for their thunderous ovation when he was introduced.

Catch in His Voice  
And there was a catch in his voice as he joined the delegates in singing "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" to Mamie at the end of the evening.

With the certain presidential nomination of Nixon by the convention tonight, Eisenhower becomes truly a lame duck President, but there was no suggestion of that Tuesday when all Chicago joined in "Ike Day."

An estimated one million persons, visiting delegates and just plain citizens, jammed Chicago's loop to smother the President in confetti as he paraded slowly from a small helicopter port beside Lake Michigan to the GOP convention hotels.

Eisenhower called the reception "astounding," but the big jolt was still to come. When he entered the convention amphitheatre Tuesday night and gazed again upon the scene of his first nomination eight years ago, a mighty thunder of tribute shook the building.

Sure, a lot of it was pre-arranged, like the girls who distributed strips of red, white and blue cloth to the delegates before the President arrived; the signs saying "Well done, Ike and Mamie!" and "We like Ike!" had to have been painted well ahead of time.

Din Rocks Building  
But when the waving cloth turned the arena into a fluttering riot of color and when the men and women thronging the aisles with signs began to leap up and down in shrill excitement, it was the party saluting the hero who slew the Democratic dragon in 1952.

For eight minutes, the din rocked the building. Eisenhower stood in the center of the high rostrum, the smoky blue spotlights stabbing down on his sun-ruddy bald head. He grinned, he laughed, he threw his arms high over his head in a characteristic gesture cheered by millions from New Delhi to Santiago.

There was a brief lull, he fished his reading glasses from the breast pocket of his Oxford grey business suit, and placed the text of his speech on the rostrum.

The applause erupted again and the President shook his head in amazement. He took off his glasses and in the spotlights, there was moisture clearly evident in the corners of his eyes.

**Crime Prevention Chief Warns Vacationers of Summer Hazard—Burglaries**

Salem — Summer is a wonderful time for vacations and house burglaries.

A tough little ex-police chief from Tillamook with a Bostonian accent has the job of letting you know just how related they are.

He is Philip G. Averill, 43, head of Oregon's new crime prevention program, with the state justice department in Salem his headquarters.

Burglars 'Invited'  
The point is, many people "invite" burglars to raid their homes, especially when they go on vacation.

Sobering FBI statistics show that for a six-year period starting in 1948, in urban areas Oregon had the fifth highest burglary rate in the country per 100,000 population. On top of this, not all crimes are reported to police.

Averill is a short, solid man who smokes a pipe and wears black-rimmed glasses. Burglary prevention is but one phase of his work, and he's just getting his sleeves rolled up.

There are many ways, he says, in which a vacationer can unwittingly indicate to a burglar that the home field is clear for ripe pickings.

Among the more obvious are forgetting to shut off deliveries of milk, newspapers, laundry and the like. Admittedly, not many people have

**Iran Announces Break With UAR**

Tehran — U.P.I. — Iran announced Wednesday it has broken off diplomatic relations with the United Arab Republic and ordered the U.A.R. Ambassador to leave the country within 24 hours.

The crisis was precipitated by a speech by U.A.R. President Gama' Abdel Nasser who attacked Iran for granting de facto recognition to Israel.

Nasser Tuesday night also announced he was severing relations with Iran and denounced the Shah of Iran for "betraying" the Arab cause and "selling himself cheaply to imperialism and Zionism."

**CONTINUE SAME POLICIES**  
Tokyo — U.P.I. — Prime Minister Hayato Ikeda Wednesday told Koichiro Asakai, Japanese ambassador to the United States, to follow the policies set forth by former Premier Nobusuke Kishi. Asakai, who will return to Washington early next month, received assurances from Ikeda that Japan would continue its policy of close ties with the United States.
