

Hearings Scheduled By Interim Group On Labor Practices

Salem - Residents of Oregon's fourth congressional district will have an opportunity to discuss their views on unfair labor practices and workmen's compensation with an interim committee of the state legislature at Bend and Eugene early next month, according to the committee.

Chairman Harry Boivin, Klamath Falls, of the legislative interim committee on labor-management relations announced that the group will hold hearings at Bend Aug. 8 and Eugene Aug. 9 and 10. All of the meetings will begin at 9:30 a. m. in the Marion county courthouse. The public is invited to participate.

The hearings at Bend Aug. 8 and Eugene Aug. 9 will center on 15 sections of a suggested labor-management relations bill which the committee has been analyzing for 10 weeks. Boivin said the measure "is not a committee bill but is simply a focal piece for discussion of possible state legislation by representatives of the public and labor and management."

Section To Be Discussed

Sections to be discussed deal with employer and employee unfair labor practices such as refusal to bargain collectively and interference, restraint and coercion. It is patterned after federal legislation in the field, he noted.

The meeting Aug. 10 at Eugene will be conducted by a subcommittee of his committee, according to Boivin. The subcommittee has been taking testimony for several months on possible workmen's compensation legislation, including a proposal to increase the number of sources from which employers could secure payment of compensation.

The interim committee was created by the 1959 legislature following repeal of the state's anti-picketing act. Members were charged with the duty of evaluating the

Recreation Needs Under Study by Parks Division

Salem - A comprehensive study of Oregon's state park and non-city outdoor recreation requirements is under way by the state parks and recreation division, according to W. C. Williams, state chief highway engineer.

The study is being undertaken with the aid of a \$15,000 allotment authorized by the state highway commission at its July 7 meeting in Salem.

Need for the study to provide data to guide the parks and recreation division in planning and acquisition of parks has long been known, Williams said in announcing

the study. The state highway commission and the parks advisory committee reached final agreement on the procedures and objectives of the study at a joint meeting of the two groups in Portland in June.

In authorizing the \$15,000 to start the study, the highway commission stressed the necessity for factual information and development of a master plan for Oregon's outdoor recreation, Williams pointed out. The resulting plan will provide the basis for formulating the state's park and recreation policies,

including the acquisition, development and financing of park areas. The plan developed by the study will also assure adequate non-urban outdoor recreational opportunities for a growing population and the increasing numbers of out-of-state visitors, according to the instructions of the highway commission and the parks advisory committee.

The results of this study will permit a useable projection of future park acquisition and development needs, and probable cost, Williams emphasized.
