Ashland - Southern Oregon college will kick off the 1960 football season as the opponent of Sacramento State college in the annual Shriner's Myrtle Bowl game in Coos Bay, Oregon on Sept. 17.

Raider coach Al Akins looks to the upcoming season with a tinge of optimism whenever he scans the list of lettermen numbering some two dozen.

Heading the list is Gordy Carrigan, an all-around athlete in any sport. He delighted fans in last year's Myrtle Bowl with three pass receptions for touchdowns as SOC won over Eastern Oregon college. Carrigan capped his successful grid season by being named to the Oregon Collegiate conference all-star squad and the district 2 NAIA dream team.

Looking to Harper

Akins is also looking to rough and tumble Bill Harper, leader of "Harper's Raiders" last year. He is a graduate of Myrtle Point high school and is small by most football standards at 5-8 and 170 pounds. This hasn't bothered Harper as he has proven he can play defense with the best.

Harper, as a sophomore, led an otherwise freshman defensive unit last year. Akins gives much credit to Harper for his leadership of the frosh who saw that there is a definite place for the small man who is willing to play hard and extend himself.
