Dodgers Say 'Beanball' Accusations Result From Red Feud With Arbiters

Los Angeles (UPI)—The Dodgers claimed today that a feud between the Cincinnati ball club and National League umpires was responsible for charges that Los Angeles pitchers were throwing "beanballs."

Vice President Fresno Thompson made the claim in answer to charges by Cincinnati General Manager Gabe Paul to League President Warren Giles that Dodger pitchers were deliberately throwing at his players.

Paul claimed the "planned program of beanball throwing" grew out of the injury May 2 to Dodger pitcher Roger Craig who was spilled at the plate by Cincinnati outfielder Vada Pinson and suffered a fractured collarbone.

The feud continued Thursday night when Pinson spiked Dodger pitcher Larry Sherry as he covered first base for a putout on a grounder in the ninth inning.

"I thought Pinson went out of his way to spike me," Sherry said after the game. "We've got a lot of hard-ball pitchers who can be pretty mean too."

YANKEES REGAIN AMERICAN LEAD

Tony Kubek, Boyer Give NY Punch

The decisive home run punch of the New York Yankees' secondary power hitters may provide the difference in their bid to regain the American league pennant.

In Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris, Bill Skowron and Yogi Berra, Casey Stengel has a recognized front-line unit that leads the major leagues in home runs.

But its so-called second-liners such as Tony Kubek and Cletis Boyer that Stengel must depend upon to keep the Yankees rolling when the big guys falter.

Kubek and Boyer connected in a first game surge against Cleveland Thursday night to give New York a 4-0 victory. The Yankees then completed the sweep of a two-night doubleheader with a 9-2 nightcap triumph that enabled them to take the lead by three percentage points over the Chicago White Sox.

Boston ousted Chicago from first place, 4-2, Steve Barber issued a lone hit to Hank Bauer in the sixth inning as Baltimore beat Kansas City, 5-0, and Washington rallied in the ninth to defeat Detroit, 6-5, in other American league games.

In the National league, San Francisco edged Milwaukee, 3-2, in 10 innings. Philadelphia whipped Chicago, 3-2, and Los Angeles defeated Cincinnati, 3-0, on Frank Howard's grand slam homer.

Kubek's two-run homer in the third inning of the opener, his ninth, provided Whitey Ford with his seventh win of the season. Ford had to depart after five innings because of a stomach disorder and Bobby Shantz mopped up with shut-out relief pitching.

Boyer belted his eighth and Mantle powered his 26th on back to back drives in the sixth inning.

Turley Wins Seventh
Bob Turley also picked up his seventh triumph, although he needed help from Ryne Duren over the last two innings of the nightcap. Mantle, Berra and Bobby Richardson each had two hits as the Yankees extended their winning streak to four games.

Haywood Sullivan's two-run homer broke Chicago's nine-game victory hold over the Red Sox as Tom Brewer received the help of four double plays in recording his seventh win. Billy Pierce lost his sixth game although the White Sox outlast Boston, 10-7.

Barber struck out 10 Kansas City batters in pitching his first major league shutout and winning his first game since May 29. Brooks Robinson and Roy Hansen provided Barber with his sixth success with t.v.-run homers in the first inning. Gene Woodling contributed another in the fifth.

Washington scored three times in the ninth against Detroit, the final run coming across as Frank Bolling allowed Pete Whisenant's grounder to go through his legs for an error with the bases loaded. Harmon Killebrew hit his 10th homer for the Senators and Jim Lemon walloped his 26th to give relief Chuck Stobbs his eighth victory.

Felipe Alou and Juan Marichal, San Francisco's imports from the Dominican Republic, combined to drop Milwaukee two games behind the idle first place Pittsburgh Pirates. Alou's third hit of the game with the bases loaded drove in the winning run and Marichal won his third in a row. He has allowed only three runs since coming up to the Giants.

Bobby Del Greco and Pancho Herrera of the Phils homered for the second straight game against the Cubs and Dallas Green went the route for his second win. Southpaw Dick Ellsworth was tagged with his eighth loss.

MARICHAL GRABS 3RD

San Francisco (UPI)—Mike McCormick is scheduled to pitch for the San Francisco Giants tonight against the Cincinnati Reds, and if he can deliver rookie Juan Marichal, manager Tom Sheehan may be headed for a 10-year contract.

Marichal, the fantastic arrival from the Dominican Republic via Tacoma, hurled his third straight victory Thursday as the Giants knocked off Milwaukee's Braves, 3-2, in 10 innings.

Manager Charlie Dressen of the Braves tried a little psychological warfare as the third inning started by claiming that the 21-year-old right hander kept his rear foot too far to the side of the rubber when starting his delivery. But the umpires rejected the complaint and Marichal went on to strike out six batters and walk only one while going the distance for the third time.

Felipe Alou, his neighbor from the Caribbean, won the game for him in the 10th with a bases loaded single that shortstop Johnny Logan couldn't handle. Joe Amalfitano, who had scorched a double down the third base line off loser Warren Spahn 11-7 to start the rally, came home on the play.

The contest was a sparker throughout. Right fielder Henry Aaron of the Braves made two fine catches off Ed Bressoud and Jim Marshall to keep Spahn alive and Bill Bruton of the same club chipped in with another which did Bob Schmidt out of a hit.

San Francisco's half of the 10th inning started inauspiciously when pinch hitter Jim Davenport looked at a called third strike. But Amalfitano followed with his double close to the bag which third baseman Ed Mathews claimed was foul.

Willie Mays, who had singled across the tying run in the fifth inning, drew an intentional pass and Orlando Cepeda followed with a walk that loaded the bases.
