

Atkinson Files Entry In SO Golf

Rogue Valley Country Club's Southern Oregon Golf tournament, one of the Pacific Northwest's most popular links events, picked up some added prestige last week for its 1960 competition when entries of Bob Atkinson and Mrs. Tom (Margaret) Harrison were received.

Atkinson last June won the Oregon Golf association match play diadem for the third time. Mrs. Harrison was runner-up earlier this month for the Pacific Northwest amateur crown. A three-time winner also, of the Southern Oregon, in 1951, 1952 and 1955, Atkinson plays out of Portland Golf Club. His other state titles were in 1951 and 1958. Mrs. Harrison's club is Waverly of Portland.

The 32nd annual tourney on the Medford course is scheduled Aug. 31 through Sept. 5, Labor Day. Approximately 180 entries are now on hand. Deadline for filing is Aug. 24.

Players will contend for men's, women's and ladies' titles. Champions in 1959 were Bob Prall, Salem; Karl Bennett, Grants Pass; and Miss Betty Martin, Longview, Wash., respectively.

Among most recent entrants are Miss Shirley Siegmund, Eugene, and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Scott, Jim Snider and Dean Child, Portland. Miss Siegmund was medalist in 1955. Mrs. Scott, Eastmoreland, is a perennial contender in the women's meet. Snider, an ex-Medford resident, Columbia-Egwater, and Child, are two-handicappers.

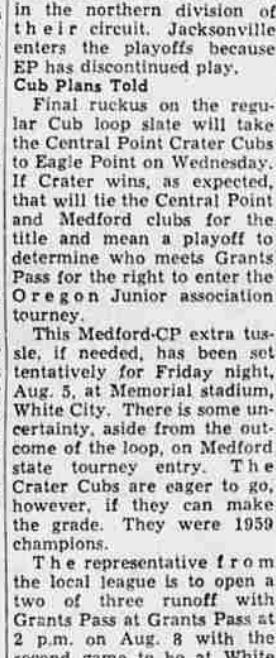
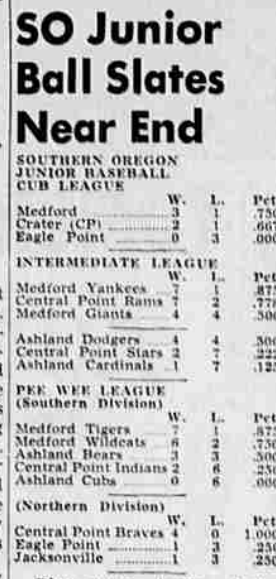

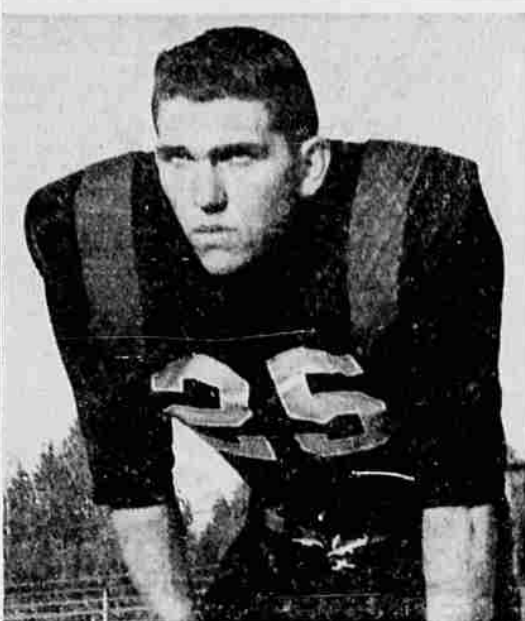

Four players from Medford High school's 1959 Class A-1 championship team are among those who report in Portland today to begin preparations for the Aug. 13 State-Metro Shrine all-star football game. They are Skip Bennett, back; John Frohnmayer, guard; and Jerry Anderson and Lowell Dean, ends. All are 1960 graders of Medford. The four will play for the State team along with 23 other players, including George Moses, Ashland, center.

All five from the two Southern Oregon conference schools have headed the request of their coaches to be in top shape when they report for drills and have been doing conditioning work at their high school fields. Anderson, a letterman in football, basketball and baseball in high school, took part in the all-comers track meet here last Saturday, although he was not a prep participant in the cinder sport.

The Medford athletes will play under the head coach of their own state title team, Fred Spiegelberg, head tutor for the State Shrine contingent.

Four of the five have picked the colleges they will enter this fall. Dean, a basketball and baseball player, as well as griddler, says he hasn't quite decided. He's had some pro baseball offers he's been weighing. The pros have indicated, however, that they wouldn't sign him out of college. Lowell, third team grid All-American, stressed yesterday, "I'd rather go to college."

Anderson, all-state hoopster, previously said he would enroll at University of Oregon and try to make the varsity grade in all three of the sports in which he starred as a prepster. Bennett also plans to go to Oregon and go out for football there. He was a letterman in track, as well as football, at Medford.
