Texans Favored Over Oakland In Pro Opener

San Francisco—UPI—The Dallas Texans are favored to whip the Oakland Raiders when the two teams clash in the opening exhibition game of the season today at Kezar Stadium.

A crowd of more than 25,000 is anticipated for the charity game.

OTIS DAVIS TIES OLYMPIC MARK AT EUGENE WORKOUT

U.S. Squad Viewed by 11,500 Fans

Eugene, Ore. (UPI)—America's mighty Olympic games track and field team broke one Olympic mark and tied another Saturday in the first of three training meets before its departure for Rome.

The athletes ran through nearly the entire roster of Olympic events before a capacity crowd of 11,500 fans in this track-crazy university town.

Performances generally were off the competitors' peak marks because of the lack of pressure.

The one Olympic record bettered here was the 15-foot pole vault by Henry Wadsworth of Florida, an alternate on the Olympic team, but this was far off Don Bragg's new world mark of 15-9-3/4 set in the Olympic trials at Stanford four weeks ago.

Bragg, Penns Grove, N. J., was content with 14-6 and finished in a second place tie with Ron Morris, of the Southern California Striders.

Former University of Oregon runner Otis Davis tied the Olympic record of 45.9 seconds in the 400-meter run. Jack Yerman of Woodland, Calif., who won the event at Stanford in 46.3, finished third today in 46.5, three-tenths of a second behind Glenn Davis of Ohio.

Neider Wins Shotput Big Bill Neider of the Army, whose world record heave of 65 feet 7 inches in the shotput is awaiting recognition, won the event after falling to make the team at Stanford when he was suffering from a leg injury.

He tossed the 16-pound ball 63 feet 11-1/4 inches, more than two feet than Olympic champion Parry O'Brien of the Southern California Striders.

Ray Norton, the country's No. 1 sprinter from Santa Clara Valley Youth Village, got his revenge over University of Oregon freshman Harry Jerome, a member of the Canadian Olympic team who beat him in the 100-yard dash at Modesto, Calif., in June.

Norton and Jerome both were timed in 10.4 seconds in the 100 meters, but Norton got the nod from the judges. In the 200 meters, Norton edged Jerome by a tenth of a second, but both were beaten by Stone Johnson of Grambling, La., who was timed in

20.9 seconds. Norton's time was 21 flat. Johnson tied the world record of 20.5 in a preliminary heat at the Stanford trials.

Seven Feet Again John Thomas of Boston University easily won the high jump with a leap of seven feet, the 30th meet in a row in which he has equalled or surpassed that mark.

Present and former University of Oregon stars gave fine showings before the home-folks. Dyrrol Burleson, America's premier middle distance star, loped in easily to win the 150 meters in 3:45.7, nearly three seconds ahead of Ed Moran of the New York Athletic club.

Former Oregon star Bill Dellinger captured the 5,000 meters in 14:14.9, after finishing second at Stanford to Jim Beatty of Charlotte, N. C. Beatty failed to finish.

The team flies to California today for a week's training on the campus of California Poly at Pomona before its second training meet at Long Beach.

Six Berths on U.S. Shooting Team Captured

Fl. Benning, Ga. — Five servicemen and one civilian held berths Saturday on the 1960 United States Olympic trapshooting team with four berths still to be filled.

Two Marines and two soldiers won places on the team Friday. Army Lt. Dan Puckel of Marion, Ind., stationed at Ft. Benning, and Gunner Sgt. James Hill of Portland, Ind., stationed at the Marine Corps recruiting depot, San Diego, Calif., placed one-two in the 50-meter free rifle competition. Puckel had 3,421 hits out of a possible 3,600 and Hill had 3,406.

Marine Capt. William McMillan of Turtlet Creek, Pa., stationed at Quantico, Va., and Sfc. Laurence K. Moseley of Jersey City, N.J., stationed at Ft. Benning, won the rapid fire pistol event. McMillan scored 1,776 hits out of a possible 1,800 and Moseley had 1,657.

The free pistol berths on the team were won last week by Sfc. Nelson H. Lincoln of Flagstaff, Ariz., stationed at Ft. Benning, and John W. Hurst of Los Angeles, a policeman. Lincoln scored 1,668 out of 1,800 shots and Hurst 1,636.

Still to be filled in the competition which continues into next week are two berths each in the 300-meter rifle and the international trapshooting divisions.

Riders Vie For Pursues At Cheyenne

Cheyenne, Wyo. — Top rodeo cowboys started the home stretch of the 64th annual Cheyenne Frontier Days rodeo Saturday, going after second go-round money in the rodeo's fifth and next to last performance.

Two injuries marred the Friday performance. Walt Linderman of Billings, Mont., broke an ankle during the bulldogging, and Bob Bruce of Cheyenne was thrown from a horse and knocked unconscious. Neither was seriously hurt.

Linderman received some solace in the form of \$82 for a third place three-way tie in the first go-round of bareback bronc riding.

More than \$13,000 of the Frontier Days' record of \$79,370 purse was divided up among first go-round winners. Don McLaughlin of Fort Worth, Texas, took the top purse, \$1,138, for winning the calf roping event.

Freckles Brown of Lawton, Okla., got \$790 top money in the bull riding go-round. Bill Harlan of Bueyros, N.M., won \$798 as top steer roper in the first go-round and Bill George of Canada, Texas, the best bulldogger, drew \$787.

Ropers had a rough time during the Friday afternoon performance because of a stiff, 30-mile-an-hour north wind. Sonny Sikes of Mexia, Texas, had the best calf roping time of the afternoon, a 14.9.

Eddie Castel of Federal, Kan., topped steer ropers with 29.3 seconds.

Doyle Cober of Fort Worth had a spectacular 11.3 in bulldogging to lead all competitors so far in that event.

All but four of the brahma bullriders had no time Friday afternoon, and some of the bareback riders, including the great Jim Shoulders, Harry Tompkins of Dublin, Texas, made the top bull ride. J. T. Smith of Iona, Idaho, had the top ride in the bareback bronc event.

Two in Tie for U.S. Women's Open Lead

Minneapolis — Marlene Bauer Hagge rifled a four under par 71 Saturday to tie Mickey Wright for the 54-hole lead in the \$7,500 American Women's Open.

Miss Wright, who led the tourney through the first two rounds, skilled to a two over par 77 for her five under par 220 total.

Scores were generally higher yesterday because of moderately strong cross winds on practically every hole.

Only Mrs. Hagge, who began her golf career at the incredible age of 3 1/2 years, was able to solve a tricky crosswind. She had birdies on the 1st, 6th, 10th, 11th and 16th holes, and slipped over par on the 15th where she three putted.

Patty Berg, a hometown girl who won the first American Women's Open in 1958, fired a one under par 74 at Hiawatha Golf course to edge within two strokes of the co-leaders.

Kathy Cornelius made a strong bid for the lead as she went four under par through the 13th hole, but she had tree and trap trouble on the par four 299-yard 14th hole and took a triple bogey 7. She finished with a 74 for a 54-hole total of 223 which tied her with Betsy Rawls.

Joyce Ziske shot her second straight 74 and was among the leaders with 224.

At even par 225 was Wiffi Smith, who was one shot ahead of Marilyn Smith. Beverly Hanson, defending

champion, shot an 81 which left her far out of contention at 232, 12 strokes off the pace. The tournament winds up with 18 holes today.

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
