

Wynn, Shaw Pitch Triumphs As Chisox Sweep Doublebill

Calendar-thumbers comparing the July pitching records of Early Wynn and Bob Shaw are envisioning a second straight American league pennant for the Chicago White Sox.

The situation is almost similar to last season's surge when Wynn and Shaw each won three games during July and Chicago left the league by a game at the end of the month.

Chicago moved into a 1 1/2 game lead Sunday as the big right handers again chalked up victories No. 3 in July that enabled the White Sox to sweep a doubleheader from Washington, 5-2, and 9-5.

Wynn, tossing a four-hitter in the opener, achieved a personal milestone when he struck out 11 Senator batters to run his lifetime total to 2,000—replacing Bobo Newsom in the 10th spot among the all-time major league strikeout leaders. He won only 28 more to pass the ninth man, Eddie Plank. Minnie Miñoso helped Wynn to his seventh victory of the year when his two-run homer in the third inning broke a 2-2 tie. Billy Gardner homered for Washington.

Sievers Hits 20th
Minoes rapped his 13th of the season in the second game to highlight a four-run, fourth inning that gave Shaw his 19th win. Gerry Staley came to Shaw's aid in the seventh and allowed only two hits the rest of the way. Roy Sievers hit his 20th homer for Chicago and tied Bill Skowron of the Yankees for the AL batting lead at .321.

Triple American League games, the Yankees lost ground as they split a doubleheader with Kansas City, losing the first 5-2 in 11 innings and winning the nightcap, 6-0. Baltimore edged Cleveland, 6-5, and Boston split a twin bill with Detroit, dropping the first, 9-5 as Ted Williams hit his 510th career homer, and taking the second, 4-4.

Los Angeles defeated Milwaukee, 7-5. Chicago again best first place Pittsburgh, 2-1. Sam Jones pitched San Francisco to a 6-2 triumph over Cincinnati and St. Louis took a pair from Philadelphia, 9-2, and 5-3. St. National league game.

Kansas City won the opener from New York when Hector Lopez committed two errors at third base that allowed three unearned runs to score. Marv Throneberry belted a two-run homer for the A's. Mickey Mantle hit his 27th for the Yankees. Ken Johnson gave up one hit in three relief innings to win his third game.

Stengel Celebrates Birthday
The Yankees tagged Bud Daley for three runs in the second inning of the nightcap that started the Kansas City Knuckleballer to his fourth defeat. Bill Skowron hit his 19th homer in the third as Art Ditmar made Casey Stengel's 70th birthday celebration a partial success by winning his ninth game.

Brooks Robinson drove five runs with a grand slam homer and a single as Wes Stock, in relief of Skinny Brown, won his first major league game for Baltimore. Cleveland's Mike De La Hoz hit a three-run homer.

Detroit scored six runs in the second and third innings and then halted Boston's four-run uprising in the ninth to win the first game. Norm Cash smashed his eighth homer and scored four times as the Tigers reached Red Sox pitching for 16 hits. Williams' homer was his 18th of the year and pulled him to within one of Mel Ott, the No. 3 man in the all-time listing. Frank Lary won his 10th game and Frank Sullivan lost his 12th.

Vic Wertz clubbed the Tigers for a pair of three-run homers, his 12th and 13th, in nightcap. Bill Muffett got his first American league hit, good for two runs in the third, and won his third game. Neil Chrissy had four hits for Detroit, including his fifth homer.

Los Angeles overcame a three-run deficit with a five-run first inning of its own to beat the Braves. Doubles by Wally Moon and Bob Lillis were the key blows. The victory was the 10th for Don Drysdale and the 11th in the Dodgers' 18-game home stand. Wes Covington hit a pinch homer for Milwaukee.

Grady Hatton and George Altman each drove in two runs as the Cubs equaled their longest winning streak of the season by beating Pittsburgh two in a row. Don Cardwell worked the first

seven innings for Chicago and picked up his fifth win. Harvey Haddix was charged with his seventh loss.

San Francisco won its fifth straight as Jones, pitching with a broken finger on his glove hand, two-hit the Reds. He allowed a two-run homer by Gus Bell in the first inning and a single by Vada Pinson in the ninth while working his way to his 13th triumph. Jim Marshall had three hits for the Giants.

Bill White hit a homer in each game at St. Louis swept a four-game series from the Phils. White clouted a grand slammer in the opener as the Cards scored six runs in the fifth inning. Kenny Boyer walloped his 21st and Curt Simmons hit his old teammate for his third win.

Stan Musial and Joe Cunningham also chipped in with second game homers off loser Robin Roberts, moving the fourth place Cards within 4 1/2 games of the lead. Rookie Ray Sadecki, breeding help from Lindy McDaniel in the ninth, won his fifth game in 10 decisions.

Dodgers Appear Set For NL Stretch Run

Los Angeles (UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers, with their pitching staff in the best shape of the season and their hitters showing promise, appear set today for a stretch run on another National league pennant.

They play an exhibition game tonight against their St. Paul farm club in the Minneapolis city. Then they get down to the serious business of pennant-chasing Tuesday evening against the league-leading Pittsburgh Pirates.

In their concluding game of the season, the Dodgers whip the second-place Milwaukee Braves, 7-5. This gave them a 2-1 edge against the Braves in the series.

The Dodgers lifted themselves to four games behind the Braves and two behind the Pirates.

The Angelinos have won 14 of their last 18 games, which is a pretty hot pace. This sort of thing makes manager Walter Alton smile. He once remarked that Dodger president Walter O'Malley does not expect him to win every game just two out of three.

Jolly Cholly Dressen, the Braves' manager who likes to needle his former Dodger teammates, had to admit Los Angeles looks like the team to beat.

"They're in a good spot," he said.

Dressen took a stroll on Sunday's Dodger victory. "That was a Christmas gift," he remarked. "We didn't do anything right in that first inning. What's more, our hitters said Drysdale isn't have anything on the ball."

Drysdale had enough on the ball to get his 10th victory of the season against an equal number of defeats.

Boston, Dallas Gain Victories In Exhibitions

The American Football league barged into the sports picture the past week end with the first of its pre-season exhibition games.

The new league, which plans to open shop in eight cities next month, got the jump on its older and established rival—the National Football league—by drawing an estimated 15,000 fans in San Francisco Sunday on a cold and fog-blanketed afternoon after 16,474 fans had turned out in Buffalo, N.Y., Saturday night.

The Boston Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills, 28-7, in Saturday night's exhibition opener at Buffalo and the Dallas Texans turned back the Oakland Raiders 20-13, Sunday at San Francisco.

5 Olympic Records Bettered

Eugene (UPI)—The United States Olympic team, the first to be selected since the three training meets completed, left here for Southern California Sunday.

The U. S. squad capped a week of workouts in preparation for its trip to Rome with its initial training meet here Saturday and, in the process, bettered five Olympic games standards and 10 University of Oregon Hayward field marks.

Alternate Bill Neider, former University of Kansas star, out-distanced the three Olympic team regulars, Parry O'Brien, Dallas Long and Dave Davis, in the shotput with a heave of 63 feet, 11 1/2 inches, and another alternate team member, Henry Wadsworth of Florida, did 15 feet in the pole vault to defeat world's record-holder Don Brag.

Olympic champion Harold Connolly of Los Angeles turned a throw of 213 feet in the hammer throw event. John Thomas of Boston university scored seven feet in the high jump and Al Oerter, a member of the New York Athletic club, had a throw of 107 feet, 4 inches in the discus.

McCovey Bids PCL Farewell

Willie McCovey bade farewell to Pacific Coast league baseball Sunday by pounding out two home runs and a triple in his best hitting performance since joining the Tacoma Giants two weeks ago.

McCovey, elated over being recalled for action with the San Francisco Giants of the National league, paced the PCL Giant club at the plate in its doubleheader win over Vancouver, 5-4 and 7-1. The sometimes-hot, sometimes-cold McCovey will rejoin San Francisco tonight.

Spokane kept its two and one-half game league lead with a pair of victories over San Diego, 13-8 and 2-0. Seattle and Salt Lake split their twinbill, 7-6 and 6-2. The Rainiers took the first and Salt Lake the second. At Sacramento, Portland blanked the Solons, 4-0, in the opener but were nipped in the nightcap, 8-7.

Two of McCovey's big blows came in the first game when he blasted a solo round-tripper and tripled. The Giants' winning rally came in the eighth frame when two runs scored on a double, two singles and a walk. The victors had trailed, 4-3, going into the inning.

The second homer for McCovey was in the fourth stanza of the second game with a mate aboard. The Giants sewed it up in the fifth with five big markers. McCovey's parting shots somewhat overshadowed a stellar performance at the plate by Tacoma centerfielder Matty Alou, who had five hits and four RBIs in the two games.

Two homers by Spokane's Ron Fairly in the first game and a four-hit second game shutout by hurler Ed Rakow kept the Indians atop the league by a healthy margin. Three other sluggers teamed with Fairly in the first game home run department. Ed Sadowski, Tony Roig and Charlie Smith each lifted the pile over the fence in the 13 run outburst.

Willie Davis backed Rakow in the nightcap as he scored both runs and hit three singles.

Four round trippers provided all the action in the first Seattle-Salt Lake game. The Taylor clobbered a three run blow in the fifth and Paul Pettit banged a solo in the sixth for the Rainiers. Harry Bright collected a lone four-bagger in the fifth as Jim Baumer had one good for two in the seventh for the B's.

Four big runs in the bottom of the eighth broke a 2-2 tie in the second game as Tom Parsons posted his eighth victory of the year. The young hurler got by giving up only eight hits. Chick King as Harry Mitchell had three run and solo homers respectively for Salt Lake.

A six-hit shutout win for Harry Byrd of Portland told the story at Sacramento. He struck out two and walked none in the seven-inning opener. Ron Taussig had a homer for the victors in the fourth with none aboard.
