

HOOSIERS PENALIZED BY BIG 10

Chicago - (UPI) - Indiana emerged today as a "non-conference" football member of the Big Ten and a sure loser of an estimated \$85,000 in TV revenue for the 1960 grid campaign.

Such was the effect of Big Ten disciplinary action against the Hoosiers announced Sunday by conference Commissioner Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson, who slapped a one-year probation on the Hoosiers for alleged illegal recruiting of football players.

The action, the severest sentence handed down by the Big Ten since it suspended Iowa for a year in 1929 on similar charges, will end after one year providing Indiana mends its ways and gives "full assurance of adherence to the financial aid regulations of the conference," Wilson said.

During the span, Indiana's football games will not be counted in conference standings, nor will those of its grid opponents. Other sports are not affected by the probation.

JONES BLAZES FOR SF

San Francisco - (UPI) - A tough, 23-game road trip confronted the San Francisco Giants today but they took off on the wings of a five-game winning streak.

Sam Jones, pitching with a genuinely "broke" left finger to go with his chronically "broke" right arm, carved out a masterpiece Sunday with a two-hit, 6-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

His sharp display, which was unhampered by a fractured left finger that he kept outside his glove and in a splint, swept the Giants to their seventh victory in eight games. It also wound up a home stand, which had started in the midst of a five-game losing streak, with a record of 11 wins and eight defeats.

On Saturday, the Giants clipped Cincinnati, 6-1, in the 10th inning on Jim Davenport's clutch single.

Jones lit the Reds to a two-run homer by Gus Bell in the first inning Sunday and a single by Vada Pinson in the ninth. In between he retired 25 consecutive batters and seemed on the verge of hurling a near-perfect game until Pinson cracked a clean hit to center with two out in the ninth.

Jones struck out 10 and issued one pass which Pinson drew before Bell teed off for his long homer.

Three Run Spurge
A three-run spurge in the fifth inning put the Giants ahead for good and routed Bob Purkey, who had mastered them three times this year, with his seventh defeat. Purkey, stung for 10 hits, got the hook after Orlando Cepeda sent Willie Mays hobbling home with a double that broke a 2-2 tie. Mays wrenched his ankle slightly when he fell while en route from second to third on the play. But the injury was pronounced only as slight although Willie later left the game.

Cepeda's hit got rid of Purkey and lefty Claude Steen took over with two on and one out. His wild pitch with pitch let Jim Marshall come in for another run and then an error by rookie third baseman Cliff Cook on Jones' ground allowed Cepeda to score.

The Giants Sunday recalled Willie McCovey, National league Rookie of the Year last season and a flop this one, from Tacoma of the Pacific Coast league.

Also obtained from the Giant farm was Sherman (Roadblock) Jones, right-handed relief pitcher with a 10-0 record and 2.30 earned run average. He has saved another 12 games for the PCL club.

Lithians Nab Pair From Crescent City

Ashtand - Ashtand's Lithians used the home run ball to advantage at Crescent City, Calif., yesterday and defeated the Golden State team, 8 to 7 and 11 to 3 in Rogue Valley league baseball games.

Gridiron Telecasting Slate Told
New York - (UPI) - Syracuse, the nation's No. 1 college football team last year, will be seen twice during the 1960 season on the American Broadcasting company's televised "Game of the Week."

Thomas More, ABC-TV vice president in charge of programming, announced Sunday that Syracuse will appear in a nationally-televised game at the University of Kansas, Oct. 1, and in a regional contest with Army at Yankee Stadium, Nov. 5.

Twenty-seven other top teams will see action on the schedule that opens Saturday, Sept. 17, with Georgia playing at Alabama and closes Dec. 3 with Duke playing at UCLA.

All told, there will be nine games on a nationwide basis - eight on Saturday afternoons and one on Thanksgiving Day between Texas and Texas A & M. On four other Saturday afternoons, the network will present three regional televised games.

Patty Berg Garner Ladies Open Crown

Minneapolis - (UPI) - There is no place like home, and golf great Patty Berg has proved it.

With thousands of her old friends and neighbors watching hopefully, she ended a two-year title drought Sunday by capturing the American Women's Open title with a 72-hole total of 292, eight under par, at Hiawatha golf course.

Patty recorded her last tournament victory in the same open in 1958, the first year it was held.

The crowd broke into wild cheers and old timers, who remembered Patty when she was the teenage queen of Minnesota amateur golf in the 1930s, had moist eyes when she dropped a two-foot putt on the last hole to win the crown by one shot.

It was a brilliant comeback for her to win. She was two strokes off the pace as the last round began.
