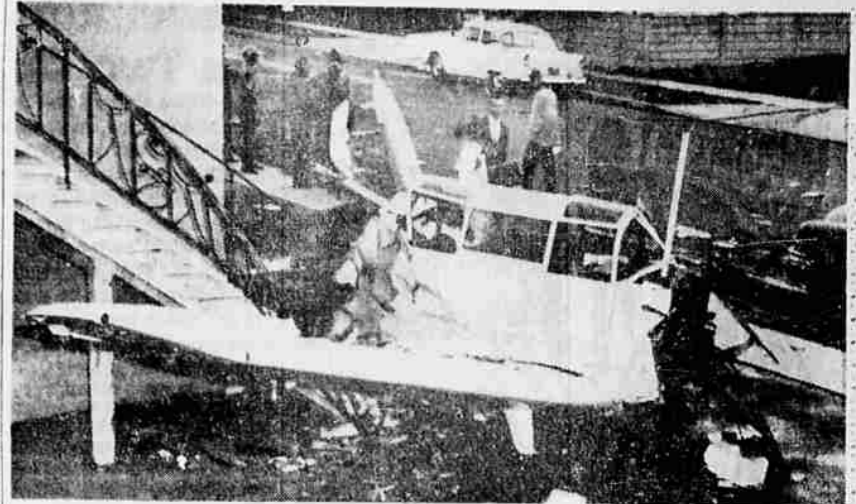

Republicans Shape Congress Strategy

Washington—(UPI)—Republican strategy for the post-convention congressional session shaped up today as a two-way fight to prove the Democrats can't make good on their civil rights plank and to block large election-year spending proposals.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-N. Y.) announced he planned to introduce at the session opening next Monday a bill embodying "every major civil rights pledge in the Republican platform," which, in some ways, are less sweeping than the Democratic civil rights pledges.

And Sen. Styles Bridges (R-N. H.), chairman of the Senate GOP policy committee, served notice that Republicans would do everything they could to "hold in check" any attempt by Democratic presidential nominee John F. Kennedy to push for "give-away legislation."

Torrential Rains Flood Formosa

Taipei—(UPI)—Torrential rains flooded central Formosa's lush rice belt today as Typhoon Shirley headed across the Red China mainland coast.

Formosa provincial police reported 14 bodies had been recovered from swirling brown flood waters or dug from under collapsed houses. Another three persons were missing and more than 120 were injured, including 11 police hurt in day and night-long rescue operations.
