Special Rural CD Plan Has Two Objectives

The Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, in cooperation with a national advisory council, has developed a special rural civil defense program and is working through OCDM's eight regional headquarters and state and county civil defense offices to make the protective benefits of the program available to every rural family in America.

The two main objectives of the program are to inform rural families about the threat of radioactive fallout and the defenses against it, and to induce them to prepare family fallout shelters and to induce them to prepare to take measures to protect their livestock.

It gives rural communities an opportunity to understand their civil defense needs, responsibilities and capabilities, and to support their county civil defense program.

Recommend To Members

The major national farm organizations support this program and recommend to members of local groups that they incorporate it in their activities. The American Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities has endorsed the program and their extension services are actively aiding in implementing it. The National Association of State and Territorial Civil Defense Directors and the U. S. Civil Defense council support the program. The National Association of County Officials also has endorsed it.

OCDM has shipped kits of program materials to more than 3,000 counties and the program is well under way in most counties. The suggested procedure for development of the program on the county level is for county committees composed of rural leaders to learn the program material and then present it to the public as well as to their own organizations. State-level committees, extension services, high school vocational agriculture teachers, agricultural services and many others are assisting.

The program proposes a series of four public meetings in each area to be attended by rural residents. Presented at Meetings The program material can be presented not only at meetings for the general public but at meetings of farm organizations, service clubs, women's clubs, etc. It contains all of the information rural residents need to know in order to plan and prepare adequate protection against radioactive fallout — for themselves, their livestock and their farms.

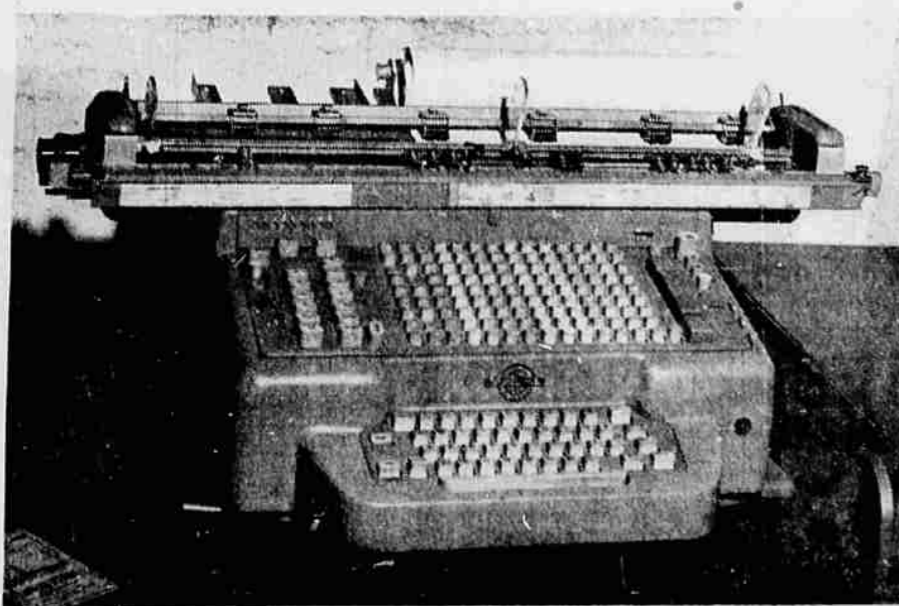
