Seattle Stockyards Being Torn Down

Seattle—The Union stockyards here are to be demolished. Demolition of the 20-year-old auction barn and facilities began Monday following the sale of the last animal ever to be sold in the Seattle pens.

Fulton Commission company and Barton-Thebo, the two commission houses operating from the Union site, have been forced to move their place of operation. Fulton will go to Snohomish and operate out of the Britton Brothers Auction barn, while Barton-Thebo will set up operations in Allyn.

Removal of the stockyard site was brought about by the sale of the Frye Packing plant to Seattle Packing company. Charlie Frye and his estate had operated the yards since 1920. A new \$600,000 warehouse and distribution center will be erected on the site.

More than 25 million animals passed through the auction barn during its lifetime. More than 750 animals moved on the last day Monday.

Cowboys Start Last Pre-Game Week of Drill

Forest Grove—Coach Tom Landry cut six players, all rookies, Monday as the National Football league Dallas Cowboys began their final week of drills before their 1960 opener.

Landry released quarterback John Talley of North-western university, center Don Berger of Michigan state, wideback Don Black of New Mexico, linebacker Allyn Holland of Montana state, defensive end Jack Mattox of Fresno state and defensive back Leroy Phelps of Oregon.

By cutting Talley, Landry now knows that he will go with an NFL veteran at quarterback when the Cowboys take on the San Francisco 49ers in Seattle Saturday.

Available for duty at the quarterback slot are Eddie Le Baron, pint-sized former Washington Redskins star, and ex-University of Washington All-American Don Heinrich, acquired from New York Giants.

A third signal caller, rookie QB Meredith of Southern Methodist, won't be available to the Cowboys until next week's college all-star game at Chicago.

The Cowboys ran through one drill Monday and viewed films of Saturday's game-time scrimmage.

Ground Gain Leader
To Perform in Game On Multnomah Turf
Portland—Three consecutive years as National Football league ground-gaining leader should be valid reason for calling Jim Brown of the Cleveland Browns the best runner in football today.

Brown and the Browns will be here Sept. 3 for a game with the San Francisco 49ers at Multnomah stadium and local fans can judge for themselves.

With 228 pounds of solid muscle and with a sprinter's speed, Brown's torn rival defenses to shreds since he came into the NFL three years ago from Syracuse, where he was a consensus All-American.

In 1957 he became the first rookie to lead the ground gaining department and set a league record for rushing in one game with 237 yards against the LA Rams.

The next year he led the league again and broke the rushing record for one season with 1527 yards on 257 carries. In the process he also tied the touchdown record with 18.

Last year opponents all stacked their defense against him but Brown still managed to lead the league in rushing for an unprecedented third straight time.

Business Offer Interests Heath
Sacramento, Calif.—Tommy Heath, field and general manager of the Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast league, has indicated that he may retire from baseball next year to go into private business here.

Heath, who has also been manager of the Sacramento PCL team, said he was "interested" in a business proposition but said his loyalties were with Portland for the rest of the season.

Heath said he did not go out looking for business opportunities but they came to him.

Second Major All-Star Tilp To Be Dropped

New York—Major league players were in accord today for staging a second All-Star game next season, but the feeling predominated for a return to the old single game plan beginning in 1962.

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick granted permission Monday for a second "pension-fund game" in 1961 because the 400 odd players on the 16 big league clubs voted its approval by a 6-1 margin.

Frick said, however, that a "new and increased TV contract in 1962" should eliminate the need for a second game.

The players have used the proceeds from the second game to build their multi-million dollar pension fund.

The commissioner made it understood that club owners were heavily against the practice of continuing the two All-Star games.

To make room for the rookies, the Cardinals have sent outfielder John Glerum to Rochester and are asking waivers on catcher Darrell Johnson.

Lake Forest, Ill.—The St. Louis Cardinals put three players on the waiver list today as the Cardinal squad was cut to 50 men, Coach Frank Ivy said. Joe Norred, a rookie line-backer from Alabama and two defensive backs, Burl Owens, of Kent State, and Jim Wagstaff, from Idaho State were cut.

Halffield Proposes Group To Study Economic Moves

Eugene—Gov. Mark Hatfield today proposed a cooperative regional activity group to foster economic development in the western U.S.

He addressed the annual meeting of the Bureau of Business Research directors here.

He told directors from 14 Western states that expansion of investment and attraction of additional investment capital is an area of economic development in which all these states share a common interest and could "profitably work together" for their mutual benefit.

Collect Studies
He suggested that bureaus of business research could carry out a program to collect articles and studies relating to investment prospects and compile them in an annual publication.

One bureau, such as the one at the University of Oregon, could serve as a clearing house for such studies as sources of outside capital, composition of labor force, effectiveness of educational systems, transportation developments and living conditions.

Committee To Meet
Hatfield, newly-appointed chairman of the Western Governors' Committee on Economic Development, said he intends to discuss the project further with the committee.

A meeting of this group, which includes the governors of California, Washington, Alaska and Hawaii, will be held soon, he said.

Navy To Order Largest Subs

Washington—The Navy said today that the latest Polaris missile submarine to be ordered will be the largest undersea craft ever built—7,100 tons—and will be designated the Lafayette class.

Up to now ballistic missile submarines have been named for American patriots, the first being called the George Washington.

The Lafayette class, of which four are now ordered under the current shipbuilding program, is named for the French nobleman who served with Washington in the American Revolution.

The Navy announced that the Lafayette class subs will be 425 feet long, 45 feet longer than the Washington class.

The first of the new subs will be built as recently announced, by Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp., Groton, Conn. It will be named Lafayette. The other three of the class, not yet named, will be built by Electric Boat at Mare Island, Calif., Naval Shipyard, and Portsmouth, N.H., Naval Shipyard.

There now are 14 Polaris missile submarines built or ordered.

There are five of the Washington class, which displace 5,900 tons and are 380 feet long. Two are in commission and the other three will join the fleet next year.

2 Charged With Manipulating Federal Wheat

Portland—Selection of a jury began in U. S. District Court here today to hear the trial of Earl C. Corey of Portland and Lawrence M. Smith of Waterville, Wash., on charges of manipulating government wheat storage.

Both men pleaded innocent last May 16.

Corey denied a charge that he violated a federal conflict of interest statute while director of the Portland regional office of the agriculture department's Commodity Stabilization service.

Corey said he had an estimated \$83,000 profit while a silent partner in a firm headed by Smith. The company accepted wheat storage contracts from the stabilization office.

Smith was indicted on 10 counts, and pleaded innocent to all 11 counts involved in the case. Eight of the counts involved the commission of false documents which indicated he was a sole owner of the firm.
