

ORIOLES EDGE CHICAGO

Yanks Trip Tigers; NL Teams Idle

The Baltimore Orioles are back in contention in the American league race—and they owe their latest resurgence to Mill Pappas, who loves to beat the defending champion White Sox.

Baltimore closed to win three games of first place Chicago Monday night as Pappas beat Al Loudermilk for the third straight time this season.

Pappas, who suffered a sore arm earlier in the season, has consistently strong-armed the White Sox, has an earned-run average of 1.00 for his 27-inning work against Chicago this year.

Gene Woodling, who has batted .313 against Chicago pitcher (1) in this season, delivered the winning run in the seventh inning when his pinch single scored Ron Hansen from second base. Hansen was credited with a double when Minnie Minoso misjudged his fly ball in left field.

Orioles Open Scoring
Baltimore opened the scoring with a run in the first inning on Jackie Brandt's single, a sacrifice and the first of Walt Dropo's two singles in the game. Chicago tied it in the third as Gene Freese, Al Smith and Nellie Fox singled for three of the six hits issued by Pappas over the first four innings.

The Baltimore right hander struck out nine and did not walk a man as he won his ninth game of the season. He now have beaten Chicago in six of seven career decisions.

The New York Yankees moved to within a half game of Chicago by edging the Detroit Tigers, 3-2. Jim Perry five-hit the Washington Senators as the Cleveland Indians won, 3-0, and the Kansas City Athletics took 10 innings to defeat the Boston Red Sox, 8-6, in other American league games.

National League Idle
There were no games scheduled in the National League. Southpaw Luis Arroyo allowed his first two hits in four appearances as the Yankees won a new relief ace while preserving Ralph Terry's fifth victory. He took over in the seventh inning and hurled shutout ball the rest of the way.

The Yankees won the game with a two-run sixth off loser Pete Burnside, with Hector Lopez and John Blanchard contributing key singles. Al Kaline hit his 10th homer of the season for the Tigers and Eddie Yost equalled Pie Traynor's major league record for third basemen by appearing in his 1,364 game.

NCAA Heads To Discuss Recruiting

Denver (UPI)—Results of a survey conducted by member schools on for recruiting of athletes were to be studied here today by representatives of 18 conferences affiliated with the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Some 70 college athletic officials are meeting here in the sixth annual "conference of conferences." The group will study such problems as financial aid to athletes and recruiting of high school and "alien" athletes, and make recommendations to NCAA council which meets here Wednesday.

Like to be discussed today were the question of what to do about widespread recruiting of foreign players in hockey, track and swimming. Denver University, the NCAA hockey champion, recruits most of its players from Canada.

The NCAA at its last legislative session, beat down a ruling which would have restricted the flow of Canadian hockey players in this country.

Other colleges, including a number in the Big Ten, import foreign athletes for track. Suggestions have been made that if foreign athletes have competed in their countries, their years of eligibility at colleges here be restricted accordingly.

Olympic Squad Has Too Much Talent

Pomona, Calif. (UPI)—Larry Snyder, head coach of the U.S. Olympic men's track and field team, has the delightful problem of too much talent on his hands.

Snyder who is Ohio State university coach here, feels that any athlete who feels he cannot do his best in the Rome games starting this month will step aside and give an alternate a chance.

There are numerous alternates on hand in what may be the greatest array of track and field talent ever assembled.

Most prominent alternate is giant Bill Nieder, the Army lieutenant, who has a world shot put record of 35 feet 7 inches up for approval. Nieder placed four in the Olympic trials at Palo Alto, Calif., last month behind young Dallas Long, Parry O'Brien twice Olympic winner, and Dave Davies.

O'Brien Has Sore Hand
Snyder was not speaking specifically of the shot putters when he made his statement on alternates yesterday at a press luncheon. He did note, however, that O'Brien has a sore hand and Davis has a wrist trouble and suggested that Nieder could still make the team.

"If an athlete is out of shape

due to illness or injury," Snyder explained, "the coaches may recommend his replacement with an alternate. Final action, however, is in the hands of the executive committee."

In discussing the possibility of a voluntary withdrawal by a team member, Snyder said, "It would be a fine thing for it to be done if he came to me and said, 'I don't think I can do my best. Give that other fellow a chance.'"

"We coaches want the best," Snyder continued, "and the American public wants the best. I just hope no kid goes out there and isn't ready to do his best."

Cons Replaced
The question of alternates was brought up by sports writers who asked Snyder about Bobby Cons, Culver City, Calif., marathoner. Cons was originally named to the team but the Olympic committee reversed itself last week and made him an alternate. He was replaced by Kelly, Grotton, Conn., school teacher who has the best time of any American marathon runner. Kelly failed to finish in one marathon Olympic qualifying race because of foot blisters and that's why at first he was not named to the team. The committee stipulated that Cons should be taken to Rome—not usually the case with alternates.

Snyder said he personally had nothing to do with the switch but added, "I think Kelly is our best marathoner by 10 or 11 minutes. I personally would like the best man in the event."

The Olympic team is quartered at Cal Poly here and is training at nearby Mt. San Antonio college for two southern California fund-raising meets. The athletes compete Friday night at Long Beach and Aug. 12 at Mt. San Antonio before leaving for Rome on New York.

Atrol Graham Killed In Utah Race Accident

Bonneville Salt Flats, Utah (UPI)—Utah speed racer Atrol Graham will never realize his ambition to become the first American to drive 400 miles an hour.

Graham, 36-year-old Salt Lake City garage man, was killed Monday when his homemade car skidded and flipped over on Bonneville Salt Flats in western Utah.

The Utah driver, operator of a garage in Salt Lake City, had hoped to surpass the world record of 394.19 miles per hour established by England's John Cobb in 1947.

The twisted wreckage of Graham's \$25,000 home-made racer was returned from the salt flats to Salt Lake City today. Although no official cause of the mishap was listed, observers blamed the accident on too much power and acceleration for the weight of the racer.

Graham's pretty wife, Zelinda, was at the finish line, waiting for her husband to complete his first run. She flew with him to the hospital, where normally she is employed as a registered nurse. They have four small children—three girls and a boy.
