Phone Change Is Introduced In Medford Area

The first major home telephone change in a decade was introduced in Medford Aug. 1 with the debut of Pacific Telephone-Northwest's new Princess phone.

Light weight and oval-shaped, the Princess phone is available in five colors—blue, white, pink, turquoise and beige—according to Telephone Manager J. H. Creager. It is a desk-type set that takes up less than two thirds the space occupied by other phones. It saves about two inches in height and a good five inches in depth over its predecessor. Width remains about the same.

Years of Development—Achieving the reduction in size represented about five years of development at Bell Telephone Laboratories. Scientists there worked on the problem with Bell System marketing experts and people from the Henry Dreyfuss design organization.

Besides its compactness, the Princess phone has several other distinguishing features. It is equipped with a light that illuminates the dial when the receiver is raised, instead of on a cradle to the rear of the dial location.

The dial light is also useful as a "night light." A switch at the back of the phone permits the light to glow even when the receiver is in place.

The Princess phone is on display at Pacific Telephone-Northwest's business office.

 Reno — (UPI) — Nevada saluted a native daughter Thursday when Vice President and Mrs. Richard M. Nixon arrived here on the first stop of their 10,000 mile campaign trip.

The daughter of a Nevada hardrock miner, who may become the first lady of the land was given a roaring welcome by 5,000 persons.

The welcome was nonpartisan. Gov. Grant Sawyer and Reno Mayor Bud Baker, both Democrats, were among the Nixon hosts as was Lt. Gov. Rex Bell, former western star and the state's leading Republican. Also on hand was Mayor N. D. Broadbent of Ely, the small town near the Utah border where Mrs. Nixon was born.
