

# Civil Rights Commission Schedules Hearings on Vote Register Complaints of Louisiana Negroes

Washington—UPI—The Civil Rights Commission announced today that it will hold a hearing in Louisiana on complaints of Negroes that they were denied the right to register since the Supreme Court ruled last June that the commission does not have to permit cross examination or confrontation of witnesses at its hearings. A spokesman said the commission decided today to hold hearings on Sept. 27 and 28 at a place still to be determined, and that at least 13, and probably more, parishes will be involved. ## Nixon Takes Presidential Campaign To Far Corners of Hawaiian Islands

Honolulu—UPI—Vice President Richard Nixon beamed his presidential campaigning today into the remotest reaches of this far-flung island state as he backed up his pledge to campaign anywhere and everywhere as the GOP presidential nominee.

Nixon believes that even the smallest state may decide what he sees as a hairline November contest and he is pitching hard for Hawaii's three electoral votes. First in History Already, Nixon is the first presidential nominee to campaign in Hawaii in all of its proud history. He set out today on a schedule that would make him the first nationally elected official to visit more than two of Hawaii's five major islands.

Although some 70 per cent of the people and votes are on the island of Oahu, Nixon scheduled island hopping visits and handshaking tours of such lesser known islands as Kauai and Maui as well as the "big island" of Hawaii, the area hereabouts hardest hit by tidal waves following Chile's earthquake. His schedule today spanned some 300 miles. The vice president arrived Wednesday to the thunderous roars of the islanders. He and his wife had rested only briefly after a tough 21-hour schedule Tuesday, but appeared fresh as they stepped from their DC-7 airliner and were greeted by some 3,000 well-wishers at the airport.

At Nixon's elbow was Sen. Hiram L. Fong (R-Hawaii) and Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton, both of whom accompanied him from Washington. It was Nixon's first visit to the 50th state since it won admission to the nation, but it was his fifth trip to the islands. Nixon told reporters that "the President of the United States must always put the security of America first and obtain intelligence information that will protect us against surprise attack" such as Japan's onslaught against Hawaii which launched America into World War II.

Accuses Kennedy In the evening, the vice president appeared on an hour-long statewide television show where he charged that his Democratic opponent for the presidency has paid the price of allowing the nation's union leaders to dictate his labor platform in order to get their support. He answered questions put to him by Hawaii's newspaper editors. Nixon said it was his contention that "the President of the United States cannot owe his election to any one group or be under the influence of any one segment of the people of the United States."

The vice president was scheduled to wind up his Hawaiian campaigning with a major speech tonight in Honolulu and will leave Friday morning aboard a chartered flight for Seattle, Wash. ## Stock Prices Lower Along Broad Front; Steels Top Losses

New York—UPI—The stock market moved lower along a broad front again today. Steels featured losses of more than 1 in Youngstown Sheet and a small fraction in U. S. Steel. Bethlehem and Republic were firm. Autos changed little from the day before with American Motors and Chrysler unchanged, and General Motors and Ford down a bit. Lionel rose a point. The company is making a bid for a bigger stake in the electronic market and named Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, former head of the Army missile program, as president and director. Procter & Gamble dropped more than a point in the blue chips as did Du Pont. Kress omitted its dividend and the stock dropped more than 1. IBM was among the exceptions, running up more than 3 in a mostly mixed electronics section.

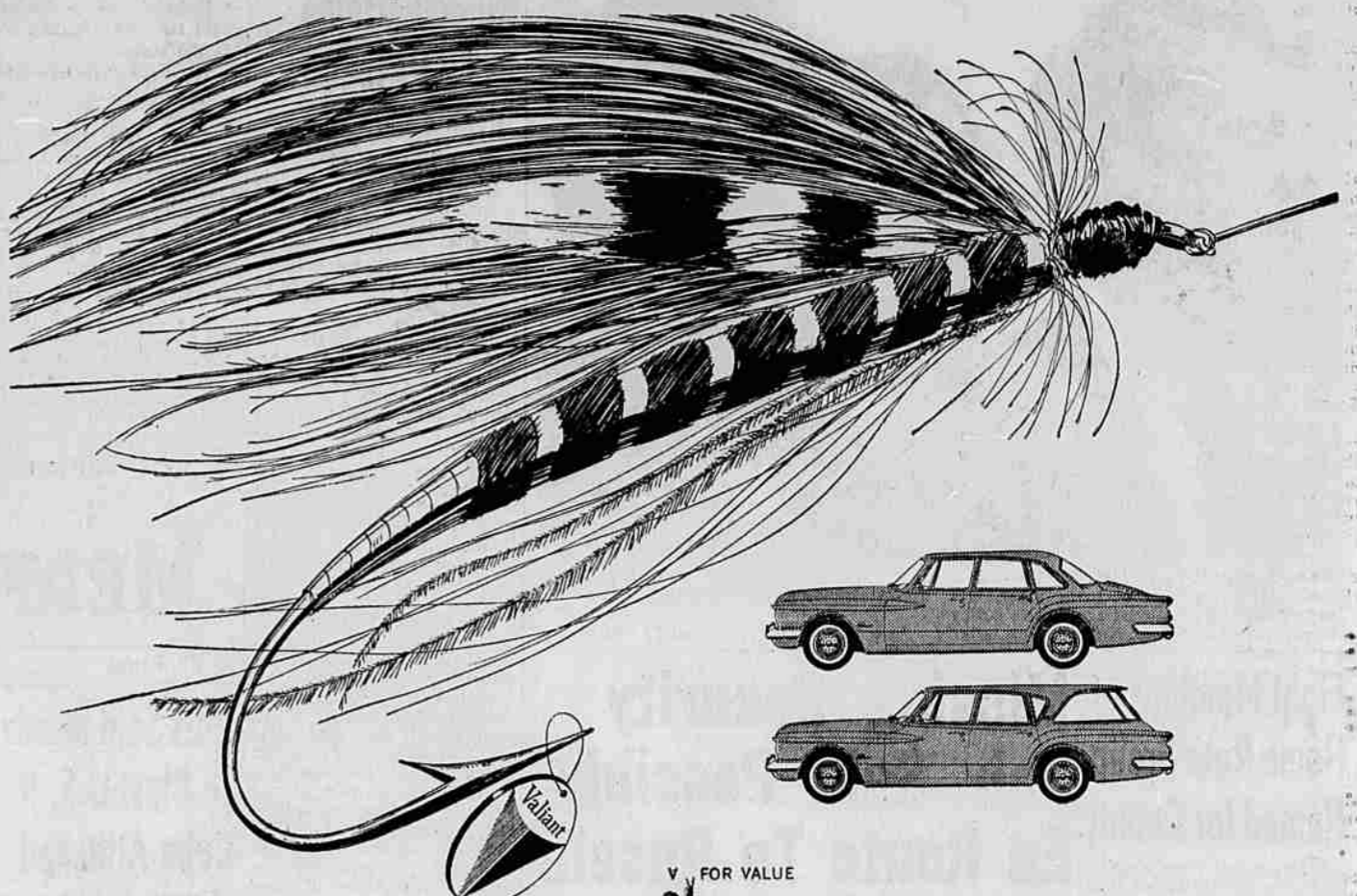
