

Pressures on Metal-Working Prices Severe

Cleveland, Ohio - UPI - Competitive pressures on metal-working prices, including steel, have been just as severe in recent months as during the 1958 recession, according to Steel magazine.

Blamed most frequently for generating the price pressures are inventory piling, higher labor costs and foreign competition.

Steel service center stocks have continued to rise since the strike while consumer demand contracted. The situation has generated severe price cutting.

There is tough price fighting in some machine tool lines, such as engine lathes. Despite this, the industry expects prices to go up later this year. The probable timing will be the machine tool exposition in Chicago, Sept. 8-10. A guest is that 10 per cent will be a typical boost.

Price Cutting Indicated A survey by the metalworking weekly indicated weakening prices and price cutting on many kinds of components metalworking buy, including fasteners, gears, stampings, castings, forgings, electrical components, motors and bearings.

Most of the sales and purchasing managers said they should know in 30 days how long the price cutting will continue. Inventory piling is about over and a general business upturn is expected in the fourth quarter.

Stock cutting by metal buyers has gone about as far as it will go, the industry magazine quarterly shows. Inventories have been dropping for the last two quarters.

A stabilizing trend, which suggests an upturn in purchases may be near, is appearing. More than 66 per cent of the respondents expect stocks to be at present levels at the first of the year.

Photoelectric Intensifier May Prove Boon

Washington - UPI - A tube that squeezes more brightness out of light is a device scientists a better look around the universe.

The "image tube" called a photoelectric image intensifier, may prove to be as big a boon over conventional astronomical photography as photography was over the human eye, according to the National Science Foundation.

The foundation said the tube is an electronic device that amplifies the signal produced by a unit of light, a photon. This means that faint light is made brighter. And consequently astronomers can now observe bodies in space that before were too dim to be identified.

The tubes have been developed by the Carnegie Institute of Washington. Development was initially paid for by the Carnegie corporation, but more recently by \$385,000 in science foundation grants.

The image tubes have been used in recent investigations into the universe and already have proven they can increase telescope speeds by as much as 30 times. Scientists believe the tubes can increase such speeds 100 times.

A. Lallemand and M. DuChesne of the Paris, France, observatory, aided by the French government, developed an almost identical image tube called an "electronic camera."

The two Frenchmen, along with Merle F. Walker of the Lick observatory, identified a very dense star cluster at the center of the Andromeda galaxy near the ultra-violet region of the universe.

The foundation said that a little was known about this very small and bright light source except that it appeared to be a star.

An analysis of the close inspection provided by the image tube showed that the light was apparently a large, dense cluster of stars, about 24 light years in radius, whirling at high speed, and contained a mass of stars equal to 10 million times the sun's mass.

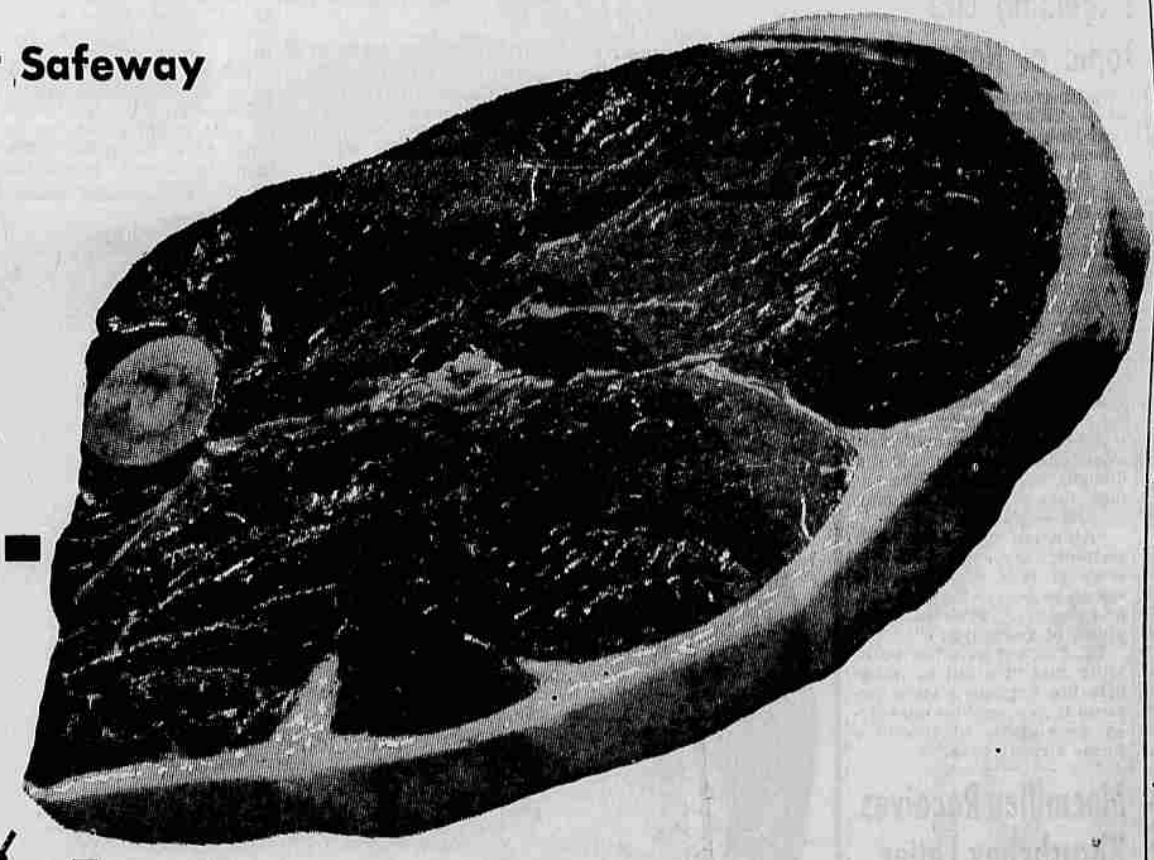
