Automation Threat Key To Future, Kennedy Declares

Washington (Science Service) — The replacement of men by machines is the "challenge" of a new industrial revolution—the revolution of automation. Democratic presidential nominee Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) told Science Service in an exclusive statement.

The advance of automation, said the Senator, is threatening thousands of jobs and entire plants, and is creating fear among workers and their families.

"It is menacing the existence of entire communities," he stated.

The threat of automation, however, can be turned into "the key to a brighter future" if labor and management and Government "work together to ease the inevitable dislocations and hardships which this new industrial revolution will bring."

The Democratic leader indicated that the challenge of technological progress can be met with Federal help and planning which would assure increased productivity by automation while at the same time "providing new jobs and new hope for the victims of industrial advance."

Faith Expressed—Kennedy expressed faith in labor's support for technological advances.

"No one wants to work the old, back-breaking way if there is an easier way to do the job. No worker and no labor leader wants to stand in the way of America's economic growth," Sen. Kennedy said.

Following is the text of Sen. Kennedy's statement:

Today we stand on the threshold of a new industrial revolution—the revolution of automation. This is a revolution bright with the hope of a new prosperity for labor and a new abundance for America—but it is also a revolution which carries the dark menace of industrial dislocation, increasing unemployment, and deepening poverty.

Already entire communities are being manufactured, untouched by human hands. Modern lathes and drills are turning out parts machine to machine, guided only by electrical impulses which make the settings and automatically correct all errors.

Electronic equipment is sorting material as it enters a warehouse and carrying it to human hands to do the proper place for storage. And in the future, as the complexity, the versatility, and the precision of modern technology continue their inevitable advance, thousands of processes and functions now performed by men will be done more cheaply and more efficiently by machine.

X15 Sets World Speed Record at California Base

Edwards Air Force Base, Calif.—The rocket-powered X15 carried test pilot Joe Walker over the California desert at better than three times the speed of sound today to establish a world's air speed record of 2,150 miles an hour.

The successful flight in the needle-nose research craft came after a two-month delay in the X15 space program caused by an engine explosion while ground testing one of the three X-15s.

Walker, 38 National Aeronautics and Space Administration test pilot for 18 years, broke the speed mark set Sept. 27, 1956, of 2,034 m.p.h. by Capt. Milburn Apt. in the X-2A forerunner of the X-15.

X15 was killed during the record flight when the ship disintegrated.

Walker's record flight began over Silver Dry Lake, 110 miles east of this Mojave test base, when Walker gave the order to be dropped from beneath the wing of a B52 bomber "mother ship" at 45,000 feet.

The flight ended when the plane skidded to a stop on its landing skids on Rogers Dry Lake.

Four minutes of the flight were under power, the rest a long glide back to the lake. Walker, who said the plane went as high as 78,000 feet, said he hit maximum speed shortly before his fuel burned out and while he was at 68,000 feet.

Actress Settles Alimony Payments

Los Angeles — Actress Irene Harvey Wednesday accepted a \$10,000 settlement in her suit against ex-husband Allen Jones who she claimed was \$25,000 behind in alimony payments.

Mrs. Harvey, who divorced the singer in 1957 after 21 years of marriage, also will receive 25 per cent of his income under the new settlement worked out in court. Jones now is married to show actress Mary Florio.
