Quick-Cooking Tapioca For Fruit, Berry Pies

Fruit and berry pies must be thickened just right for complete pie success, the kind of success our fruits really deserve. Most fruits and berries require a thickener of the juice is not to spread out thinly over plates when pie is cut.

Many prefer quick-cooking tapioca as a pie filling thickener because it protects the bright fruit color; doesn't cloud as some thickeners do. It is time-saving and easy to use because there is no pre-cooking. All you do is mix the quick-cooking tapioca with the sugar and fruit or berries and pour mixture into unbaked pie shell.

Deep Dish Peach Pie

For fresh peach pie, combine 1 1/2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, one-fourth cup granulated sugar, one-half cup brown sugar, one-eighth teaspoon mace, four cups sliced peaches, two tablespoons lemon juice. Turn into 9x9x2 inch baking dish; dot generously with butter. Roll pastry, using your own recipe or a favored mix, into 11 inch square. Cut slits to permit escape of steam and adjust, opening slits with knife. Press pastry to rim of dish. Bake in hot oven, 425 degrees, about 45 minutes. Serve warm.

Berry Pie Delight

For fresh berry pie, use any of the abundant berries or a combination of them. Use a regular pie pan with your usual pastry, cutting slits in top crust as usual.

Combine three tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, three-quarters to one cup sugar, one-fourth teaspoon salt, four cups berries, one tablespoon each lemon juice and butter. Moisten edge of pastry. Cut slits in top crust to permit steam escape and adjust, opening slits with knife. Bake in a hot oven, 425 degrees, about 55 minutes.

Peach Discoloration

When putting up peaches, prevent discoloration by dropping peeled, pitted peach halves in bowl containing four cups water and one tablespoon lemon juice — till needed.

Golden Salad Molds With Cantaloupe Balls

Abundant, sweet tasting mid-summer cantaloupes will mostly be eaten from the halfshell but if you want to please family and friends with a distinctive gelatin-molded salad, this is superlative for both beauty and flavor. Makes seven individual molds for offering with French dressing or dairy sour cream combined with merest hint of curry powder.

- 1 3-ounce package lemon gelatin
- 1 3/4 cups hot water
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 drop mint extract, optional
- 1 medium size grapefruit
- 1 cup mid-summer cantaloupe balls
- 1/2 cup seedless grapes
- Salad greens

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Stir in lemon juice, salt and mint extract. Cool until mixture begins to thicken. Meanwhile, pare and section grapefruit and cut cantaloupe balls using French ball cutter or one-half teaspoon measure. When fruit flavored gelatin is partially thickened, fold in fruits and spoon into individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold onto crisp salad greens. Serve with any desired dressing.

Vegetable Seasonings

Seasonable vegetable abundance encourages experimenting with new tastes, aromas. Season carrots with allspice, basil, bay leaf, chervil, chili powder, dill seed, ginger, mace, marjoram, mint, olive oil, parsley, poppy seed. Season that good corn with cayenne, chili powder, paprika, onion, meat sauce.

Forestry Officials To Be Viewed by Foreign Officials

Portland — Progress in Oregon forestry will go on parade this month for 89 of the world's leading foreign foresters who will tour forest industry tree farms, public timberlands and other forestry points of interest here as a prelude to the fifth World Forestry Congress in Seattle.

The route to the Congress—the biggest gathering of foresters ever held in the world—will begin at Los Angeles Aug. 17 and will lead them on a 1,700-mile trail through the Western Pine, Redwood and Douglas Fir regions of the three Pacific coast states.

In Oregon, forester hosts from timber companies, associations and public agencies will show visitors their techniques of modern multiple-use management, the forestry concept of obtaining maximum benefits from forest land by managing it for water, timber, grazing, recreation and wildlife.

"Many of our foreign visitors are showing sharp interest in the unique American approach to sustained-yield forest management through the forest industry's educational tree farm program," according to Hardy Glascock of Western Forestry and Conservation association, Portland, chairman of the western tour committee. "They are also anxious to see the big trees and the big logging equipment for which western North America is famed."

"They will be even more impressed," he predicted, "by the immense strides that are being made in wise stewardship of the forest resource under this continent's free economy."

The visiting foresters will make an erudite group. Most of them speak two or three languages, some of them four. They are drawn from such widely scattered places as In-

dia, Brazil, England, Italy, Australia, Yugoslavia, the Scandinavian countries, West Germany, Africa — even the Isle of Cyprus.

From the 25 nations represented are several foreigners who head up their countries' forest services. The group also includes several chief foresters from forestry schools. It does not include any Russians—all of them, for some reason, having signed for the tour of U. S. southern states.

Sweden's 23-man delegation is the largest single national group in the western tour. One country with a small land area — Japan — is sending eight men.

In Oregon, the tour group will see mills, timberlands and other points at Brookings, Gold Beach, Coos Bay and North Bend (Aug. 23); Gardiner and Eugene (Aug. 24); Corvallis (Aug. 25); Albany, Salem, Oregon City and Portland (Aug. 26).

Tour director of the Oregon portion of the trip will be Norman Bjorklund of Industrial Forestry association, Portland. Co-directors are R. L. Furniss, Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station, Portland, and J. B. Corlett, Oregon Forest Protection association, Portland.

Fanfani Expected To Win Confidence

Rome—Premier Amintore Fanfani was expected to roll over Communist and Neo-Fascist opposition to win a thumping vote of confidence for his pro-Western government in the Italian Chamber of Deputies today.

Fanfani, called to national leadership for the third time since World War II, already has received overwhelming support from the Senate.

A similar triumph from the deputies, who probably will vote on the confidence issue tonight, would make his middle-of-the-road Christian Democratic government the strongest to reign in the last 12 years.
