Mr. Bullis plans to spend several weeks in the East.

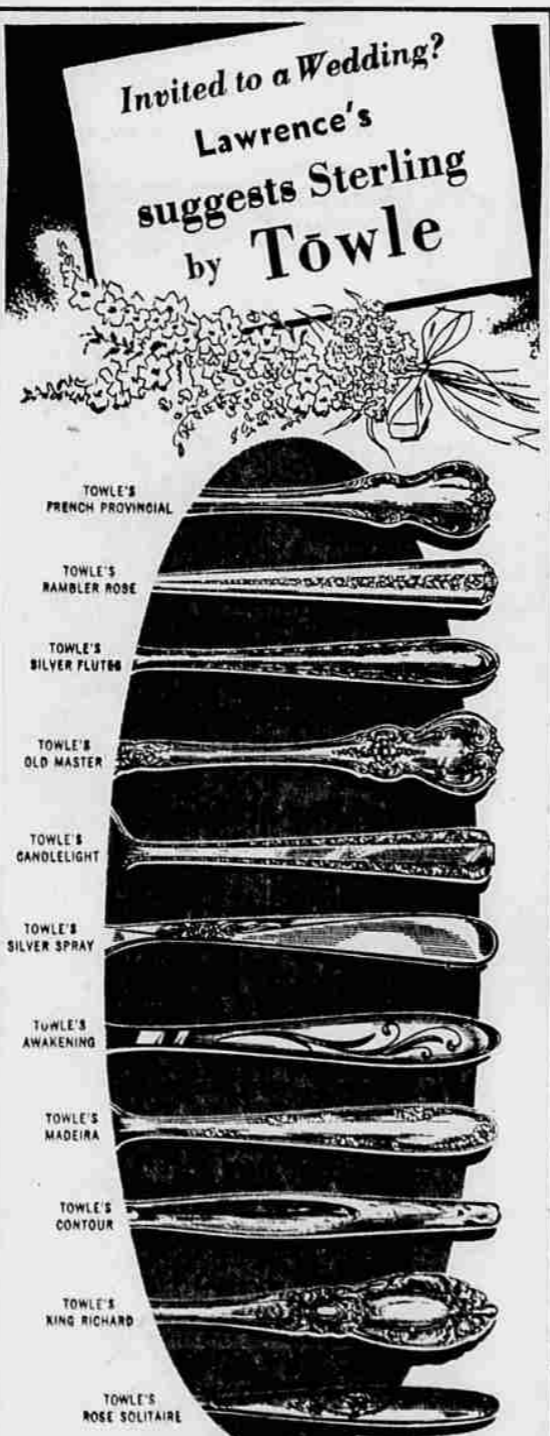
Gardiner Home Scene of Event
