

One Man Reports for Work in Relief Program, Court Reports

Only one man reported for the work relief program of the three or four scheduled for the first job Thursday and Friday, according to the county court.

Public Welfare Administrator James Pullman said others went to work for themselves. Under this new program those persons receiving general assistance from the Jackson county public welfare commission, are paid a dollar an hour by Jackson county with funds from the welfare commission. Those who do not work are taken off the welfare rolls.

Edward Leach, 1228 Corona ave., Medford, was hired Wednesday by the court as crew foreman. His pay is \$1.50 an hour.

Current project is cleaning and painting the former horticultural station headquarters on Highway 99 near Talent. This will be used as a residence and office by Chris Hagler, county dog control officer.

So far seven other counties have found the "make-work" program successful. Klamath Program

The Klamath county work program started April 18. First project was cleaning garbage, litter and debris from county road rights-of-way. This year-around program will use a maximum of 10 men and a minimum of five men.

In Douglas county such a program started May 1. A crew of 10 to 15 workers were scheduled to work in a 300-acre park 10 miles from Roseburg. If the program proves satisfactory it will be expanded to a county-wide basis next fall.

Medford Council Discusses Use of Truck Music Box

The Medford city council Thursday devoted a large portion of its relatively short meeting to discussion of a law prohibiting music boxes on ice cream trucks.

Gilman's Dairy had requested the city council to permit the dairy to have a music box on one of its trucks making door-to-door ice cream sales.

Vincent Smith, speaking for the company, said the company, without knowledge that it was illegal, operated a music box on one of its trucks for three days last month.

He said, however, that he was informed by the city that a music box violates a city ordinance which prohibits "the use of a loud speaker or a device or apparatus for the purpose of making noise or to permit announcements on any vehicle."

Plays Two Tunes
Smith said the music box, which cost \$124, plays only "Lullaby Baby" and "Mary Had a Little Lamb," without words. The unit is made specifically for ice cream trucks, he said, and is in use in other cities throughout the country.

Councilman Al Bradford was of the opinion that the code "is perhaps a little too severe" on its approach to such devices, and wondered if the code could be amended to permit such music boxes between certain hours of the day.

Finch-Tregoff Trial Appears at Halfway Point

Los Angeles - (UPI) - The second murder trial of Dr. R. Bernard Finch and Carole Tregoff appears to have reached its half-way point today with state defense attorneys in a temporary truce in their bitter courtroom clashes.

Although the retrial was predicted to be longer than the three-month first trial, it closed out its sixth week today in pace with the original hearing which ended in a hung jury.

Pretty Marie Anne Lidholm, 19, the former maid for Finch and his socialite wife, waited to testify again as the defense called back John Patrick Cody for the fifth day of searching cross-examination today.

The prosecution had reached about the same point in presenting its case in six weeks during the first trial, but with one important difference:

The attorneys in the retrial of the couple accused of killing Finch's wife for love and money have subjected prosecution witness Cody to a closer than ever cross-examination.

Cody's testimony has been incriminating to the defense. He claims Finch, 43, and red-haired Carole, 23, paid him \$1,400 to kill Mrs. Finch, but that he backed out of the deal. The state charges the couple then committed the slaying July 18, 1959.

The result of the tough cross-examination of Cody has led to heated exchanges between Finch's attorney, Grant Cooper, and chief prosecutor Clifford Crail.

Spy Conspiracy Charge Affirmed

Washington - (UPI) - The U.S. Court of Military Appeals today affirmed the espionage conspiracy conviction of former M-Sgt. Roy A. Rhodes, 42, Army mechanic once in charge of the U.S. Embassy garage in Moscow.

Rhodes was convicted by an Army court martial at Fort McNair here Feb. 21, 1958. He drew five years at hard labor, a dishonorable discharge and forfeiture of all pay and allowances.

The last address on Rhodes' record is Eatontown, N.J., where his wife was working at the time of the trial.

The involvement of the mechanic came to light when he testified at the New York espionage trial of a Soviet spy, Col. Rudolf Ivanovich Abel, in 1957. The McNair court martial followed.

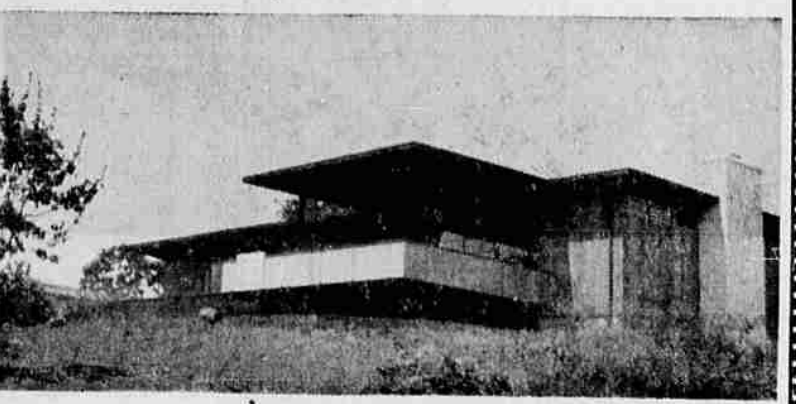

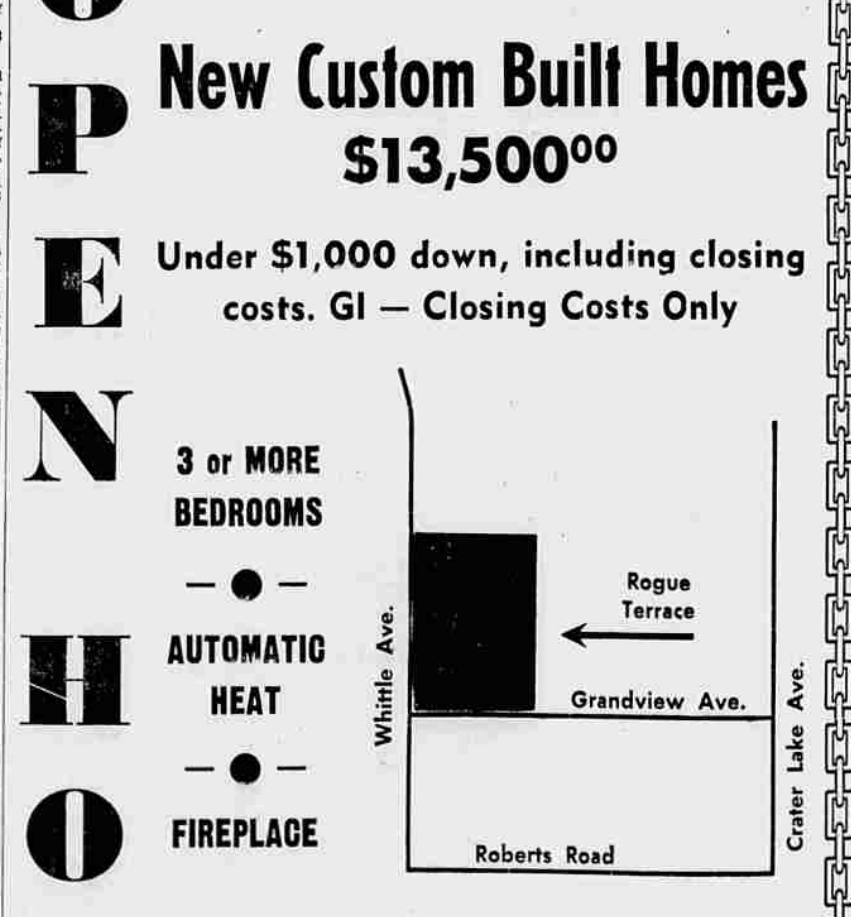
