

CARDINALS RISE TO 2ND IN NATIONAL

Hats Tipped To Veteran Baseballers

They say there's no sentiment in baseball but who can deny a tip of the old chapeau today to vets like Ted Williams, Stan Musial, Curt Simmons and Luis Arroyo?

All four were considered just about washed up when the season started but now Williams has reached another home run milestone, Musial and Simmons are playing major roles in the St. Louis Cardinals' astonishing rise to pennant contention, and Arroyo is the lifesaver of the New York Yankee bullpen.

Here's how the four old pros showed the young 'uns how to do it in Tuesday night's major league action:

—Williams, 41, tied Mel Ott for third place in the all-time home run race when he hit the 511th of his brilliant career in the Boston Red Sox' 6-3 loss to the Cleveland Indians.

—Musial, 39, figured in three runs with two doubles and a sacrifice fly in the first game and Simmons, 31, pitched a five-hitter as the Cardinals whipped the Phillies, 5-4 and 6-0, to move into second place in the National league.

—Arroyo, 33, turned in his sixth straight fine relief job to gain credit for the Yankees' 7-4, eight-inning triumph over the Chicago White Sox. The win boosted the Yankees' American league lead to 1 1/2 games.

Pirates Beat Cubs
The Baltimore Orioles beat the Detroit Tigers, 3-0, and the Kansas City Athletics beat the Washington Senators, 8-3, after a 3-1, 12th-inning loss, in other American league games, while the Pittsburgh Pirates topped the Chicago Cubs, 7-1, and the Los Angeles Dodgers shaded the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2, in other National league action, San Francisco at Cincinnati was rained out.

Williams hit his 10th homer of this season off Jim Perry, who went on to win his 14th game for the Indians. The blow by Williams, who is hitting .305 this year, sailed far over the 380-foot mark in Cleveland stadium and produced a 3-3 tie in the fourth inning. Only Babe Ruth, with 534, hit more homers than Williams, whose heroics were negated by a two-run homer and a run-producing double by Vic Power.

Musial, who lifted his average to .291, doubled and scored in both the sixth and eighth innings to help relief ace Lindy McDaniel raise his record to 9-3. Then Simmons, his second arm case for several years, topped his ex-Philadelphia teammates for the third time to complete the sweep and give the Cardinals four straight victories and 12 in their last 14 games.

Seattle Continues Hot Streak in PCL

Gary Peters of San Diego found this out in Tuesday night's Pacific Coast league play. The Padre righthander held Seattle to four hits, but the Rainiers, notching their fifth in a row, got a pair of unearned runs to take a 2-1 decision.

Jersey City of the International league three weeks ago, shut out the White Sox for 1 1/2 innings to win his first game for the Yankees. The Yankees pushed over three runs in the eighth inning with the aid of errors by Joe Ginsberg and Roy Sievers with the bases filled and the game was called after the White Sox' eighth because of a sudden rainstorm.

Brooks Robinson's three-run fourth-inning homer and Chuck Estrada's four-hit pitching gave the Orioles their fourth straight victory and a 4-0 win in 10 games. It was the 12th win against six losses for Estrada, who handed Frank Lary his 11th defeat.

Harmon Killebrew's two-run 12th-inning homer enabled Ray Moore to win his fourth game for the Senators but the Athletics took the second game as Don Larson, recently recalled from Dallas-Ft. Worth in the American association, won his first big league game since June 13, 1959, with late-inning relief help from Ken Johnson.

Pitches Five-Hitter
Vinegar Bend Mizell pitched a five-hitter to win his ninth game of the season and his eighth for the Pirates since he was obtained from the Cardinals in June. Doubles by Bill Mazerowski and Bob Skinner featured a five-run rally that tagged the Cubs' Moe Drabowsky with his first defeat.

Johnny Podres, aided by Larry Sherry's ninth-inning relief, won his 10th game for the Dodgers with a nine-hit, 10-strikeout performance. Maury Wills' double and Wally Moon's single produced the Dodgers' decisive run in the ninth as Bob Buhl suffered his sixth defeat. Sherry retired dangerous Wes Covington with two out and two on in the ninth to preserve the victory for Los Angeles.

Moon Predicts Pennant Again For LA's Dodgers

Milwaukee, Wis. —(UP)—Outfielder Wally Moon says he believes the World Champion Los Angeles Dodgers will hang the pennant from the Coliseum again this year.

"There's still a third of the season to go, and we're not hopelessly behind like some of those second-division clubs," Moon told newsmen Tuesday before the Dodgers clobbered the Milwaukee Braves 3-2, causing them to drop into third place behind the St. Louis Cardinals.

"When things looked bad for us in the late going last year I insisted we'd win, and I say now that we'll repeat," Moon said. "We don't have the one big slugger like Hank Aaron, a Willie Mays or an Ernie Banks, but our pitching will carry us through."

"There isn't another club in the league that can throw one good pitcher after another at you day after day. Even when our ace gets trampled, we've got pitchers who can make up lost ground," Moon concluded.

Bill Martin Fine Stands

Cincinnati, Ohio —(UP)—Second baseman Billy Martin of the Cincinnati Reds had his "day in court" Tuesday, but his \$500 fine and five-day suspension for slugging Chicago Cubs rookie hurler Jim Brewer last Thursday still stands.

Martin said his principal objection was reached during a one and three-quarter hour meeting Tuesday with National league President Warren Giles here.

He said he wanted to get on record that he did not take a surprise punch at Brewer. Now that he has, Martin said, the matter is closed as far as he is concerned.

Adding lustre to the State offense in recent sessions has been halfback Skip Bennett

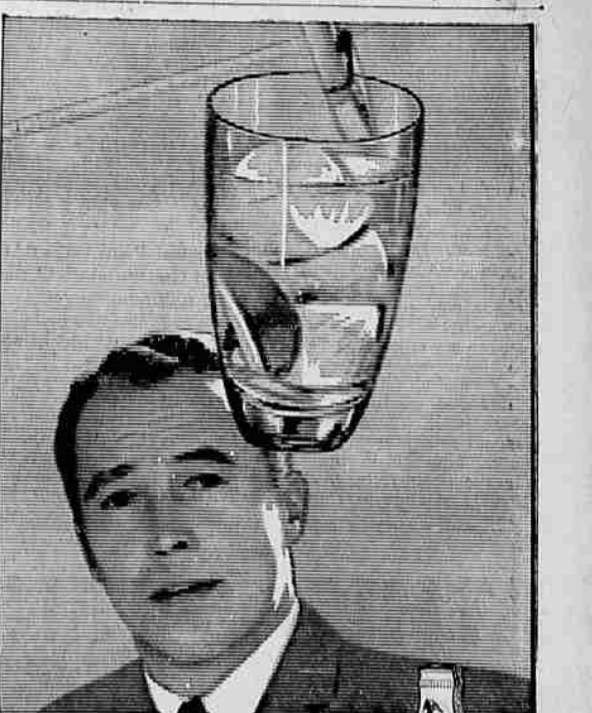
Dog Show Deadline August 21
