### Two Guilty in Manipulations

Portland—(UPI)—Earl Corey of Portland and Laurence Smith of Waterville, Wash., were found guilty here Tuesday night in U.S. Federal District court in a government wheat storage manipulation. Corey, former director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Stabilization Service here, was found guilty of two counts of conspiracy and one count of conflict of interest. Smith, operator of a warehouse, was found guilty of eight counts of false statements to the Commodity Stabilization Service here and two counts of conspiracy to defraud the government. A jury of 10 men and two women returned a verdict after deliberating almost eight hours.

Geneva—(UPI)—The United States, Britain and the Soviet Union postponed today's scheduled session of the marathon nuclear test ban conference until Thursday by mutual consent.

## Hoover Denounces Religious Bigotry On 86th Birthday

New York—(UPI)—Herbert Hoover took the occasion of his 86th birthday anniversary today to voice his disgust at religious bigotry and stated it would be "a dreadful idea" to inject in the presidential campaign.

Hoover in 1928 defeated the first Roman Catholic ever to run for the United States presidency, the Democratic candidate, Alfred E. Smith.

This year's Democratic candidate, Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, is the second Catholic in history to seek the presidency. His Republican opponent, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, is, like Hoover, a member of the Society of Friends (Quaker) Church.

**Fire in Voice**  
In a news conference held Tuesday with reporters who requested a birthday interview, Hoover was reminded of the religious sentiment against Smith in that election and asked him how he felt about the issue being raised again in the present campaign.

"There was fire in his voice when he replied: 'I think it's just a dreadful idea. In the 1928 campaign I must have denounced it half a dozen times.'"

# Sen. Byrd Pressured To Support Kennedy-Johnson Ticket

Washington—(UPI)—Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) was reported under heavy pressure today to make a public declaration in support of the Kennedy-Johnson ticket. He has refused to yield so far, although most of the other top drawer Democratic leaders in Virginia have endorsed the national ticket headed by Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts.

## Civil Rights Bid Pushed Despite Senate Rejection

Washington—(UPI)—Republicans pushed ahead today with their drive for new civil rights legislation despite Senate rejection of President Eisenhower's two-pronged rights program.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.), undismayed by Tuesday's administration setback, planned to introduce legislation embodying the civil rights plank of the Republican platform. Javits also said he would back this up with a resolution seeking to change the Senate rules and tighten curbs on filibusters such as those used by Southerners to stall civil rights measures. **Resounding GOP Defeat**  
The New Yorker's move to inject the controversial issue back into the post-convention session of Congress followed a resounding GOP defeat on civil rights. By a 54-28 vote along party lines, the Senate tabled—and thus killed—the President's program which he had recommended in a special message to Congress Monday. Republicans charged the action showed that the Democrats had no intention of living up to campaign promises to enact strong rights laws in support of their own liberal platform plank.

## Navy Radar Ship To Visit Portland

Portland—(UPI)—The USS Intereceptor, a U.S. Navy radar picket ship, is scheduled to visit Portland Aug. 26-30, according to Mayor Terry Schruck.

Lt. Cmdr. G. E. Robinson wrote Mayor Schruck the ship would hold open house during its Portland stop. The ship operates as a seaward extension unit in the North American Air Defense Command, and will be on patrol off the Oregon coast for 30 days following the Portland visit.
