

Red Cross Cooks Meal Under Feigned Disaster Conditions

One day last week volunteers of the Jackson County Red Cross chapter pretended that the area had been struck by disaster. Workers reported at the Red Cross building on Hawthorne ave., designated as disaster relief headquarters, and went into action.

They set up and manned information, registration, transportation and housing desks. A communications center was set up and all outlying Red Cross units contacted by radio and telephone. The warehouse with racks of clothing, beds and facilities for washing clothing, was open and ready for operation. There was a first aid station with equipment and supplies, and registered nurses were in attendance.

The canteen corps went into action and using field-type stoves and other equipment on loan from the Oregon National guard unit, cooked a hot meal for almost 100 persons.

The project started out to be only for the canteen workers, who lacked the training of preparing meals out-of-doors under disaster-simulated conditions. At the last minute, Eugene Thorndike, chairman and Mrs. O. A. Eden, co-chairman of the chapter's disaster committee, decided to make it a full-scale rehearsal.

Following the noon meal, Manville Heisel, chapter chairman, spoke concerning the function of the Red Cross in times of disaster and outlining basic policies as laid down by the American Red Cross.

Since there is confusion in the minds of some concerning the functions of Red Cross as compared to Civil Defense, it was stressed that Civil Defense is concerned with "things," and Red Cross is concerned with "people."

Communications
Communications is one of the most important working units of a disaster-relief team, it was pointed out. Sam Colton is chairman of this committee for the Jackson county chapter, and Dwight Albright heads the radio division. On the committee are Gen. Joseph Hicks and Mrs. Lee Hoag; also on hand to help on the training day were Mrs. Colton, Mrs. Robert Miksche and Mrs. Russel Brown.

The housing chairman is Leonard Mayfield, and his co-chairmen are Lee Ragsdale and Berwick Wood. John Graff heads the clothing committee, with Mr. and Mrs. William Darby as co-chairmen.

Registration Desk
On "disaster day" last week Mrs. Frank Preston, chairman of volunteers for the chapter, and Mrs. Sheridan Scott, her co-chairman, both were on hand and busy. Their assistants, Mrs. Clair Larson, Mrs. Ralph A. McKay and Mrs. Al Stoehr, were manning the registration desk.

Michael Beck heads the chapter's food committee, and Mrs. Grace Fiero is chairman of the canteen corps, with Mrs. Roy V. Rickard as co-chairman. These workers were the busiest of all on rehearsal day, for though no casualties reported to the first aid desk, and no one appeared to seek housing, etc., the canteen men and women did prepare and served a meal.

Clarence Childers and Reuel Rians Jr., of the National Guard unit, helped the women with the gasoline stoves and water heaters. Other women helping with the preparation and serving of food were Mrs. Ralph Bardwell,

Orbiting Jet Expected To Be Ultimate Plane

San Diego, Calif. (Science Service)—The "ultimate airplane" which will fly 17,000 miles an hour or 25 times the speed of sound, has been described here by Alexander Kartveli, a Russian-born aircraft engineer responsible for the development of 14 aircraft types.

Kartveli, now vice president of research and development for Republic Aviation Corporation, told the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences national meeting that the craft would be the last major type before aircraft makers turn most of their attention from aviation to astronautics.

It will be 170 feet long, 33 feet high and have a wingspan of nearly 99 feet. Its front will be a massive series of air ducts to draw huge quantities of air into four hydrogen-burning engines in combination with four ramjets.

It will be capable of taking off from the ground with a substantial military load, accelerating to orbital speed, orbiting around the earth and landing on earth when desired.

Kartveli said design consultants for Republic have already done basic exploratory work on the combustion scheme to power such a craft.

He also presented designs for three generations of planes he believes will come before the "ultimate":

1. A fighter-bomber, capable of verticle take-off, that could fly at 1,500 miles an hour. It could pinpoint bombs on a target from 75,000 feet.
2. A nuclear-ramjet strategic bomber, to be produced between 1970 and 1975, that would fly at 2,800 miles an hour and cruise at 85,000 feet. Its two-man crew would be in a shielded compartment.
3. A 4,980-miles-an-hour bomber, shaped like a great triangle, capable of flight at 120,000 feet. With two ramjet and two turbojet engines, it would have a range of 5,000 miles.
