

### Kennedy Plans To Discuss Campaign Role With Truman

Washington - (UPI) - Democratic presidential nominee John F. Kennedy will confer Aug. 20 or 21 with former President Truman, who once said Kennedy's nomination was "rigged" but who since has agreed to campaign for him.

Kennedy's office announced today that he will fly to Truman's home in Independence, Mo., before the Massachusetts senator attends a farm conference at Des Moines, Iowa.

It will be the first meeting of the two since Truman announced he was boycotting last month's Democratic national convention at Los Angeles because he could not be a party to a "prearranged" convention.

They will complete plans for Truman's campaign role. Meanwhile, GOP National Chairman Thurston B. Morton called Truman's willingness to campaign for Kennedy the "second Missouri compromise."

He referred to the historic-making 1812 agreement to permit slavery in Missouri but limit its spread in the Midwest.

Morton said the Republicans will revive their 1956 "truth squad" to follow Truman and other Democratic speakers around the country and reply to their speeches.

He said the GOP spokesmen would refresh Truman's memory about his pre-convention anti-Kennedy statements.

Kennedy's office said he would see Truman Aug. 20, if the Senate is not meeting that day. If it is, the conference will be held on the following morning, Aug. 21.

### Twining Claimed Planning To Retire

Washington - (UPI) - The White House announced today that Air Force Gen. Nathan F. Twining, midway in his second term as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, is planning to retire.

No date has been set for his retirement, Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said.

Hagerty describes as "not true" a news dispatch which said Twining already has resigned as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and that the President has accepted his resignation.

"For some time, the President and General Twining have been discussing informally the general's retirement after 42 years of service to his country," Hagerty told newsmen. "No date has yet been set for this retirement."

Twining has served about a year of his second two-year term as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

### OFC Explains Death of Fish

Seaside - (UPI) - The Oregon Fish Commission has explained the deaths of countless thousands of anchovies and other fish along the Northern Oregon coast last week.

Commission biologists said an abnormal number of fish, low oxygen, high temperatures and low tides may have caused the mass deaths.

Robert Myers, aquatic biologist in charge of ocean studies at Astoria said the Neawanna river may have been the primary scene of the problem.

### Ontario Has Third Of Canada's People

Ottawa - Almost one-third of Canada's people live in the province of Ontario. This province produces about half the country's manufactured goods and a very large percentage of the world's nickel.

The world's largest nickel refinery is that of the International Nickel company, located in Port Colborne, Ontario.

### Bill Veeck Says White Sox Good Longshot Bet

Chicago - (UPI) - Bill Veeck fired a shot into the Comiskey Park gloom today with a prediction that his Chicago White Sox would win the American League pennant by five games.

The White Sox president forecast a late season surge for his club like that of the 1959 Los Angeles Dodgers and said his team would be an excellent bet "right now" for longshot players who relish long risks.

"We're two and a half games out right now," he said, after Wednesday's 6-0 loss to the New York Yankees. "At this time last season, the Dodgers were six games out and they won the pennant. We can do the same thing."

"The White Sox ought to be about 6 to 1 right now," he said. "Bet 'em if you want to make some money."

### Americas Cup Tourney Opens

Ottawa - (UPI) - The finest amateur golfers of the United States, Mexico and Canada began play in the fifth Americas Cup tournament today amid claims by all three captains that their teams were the "strongest ever."

Despite their claims of improvement, however, Rodrigo Medellin of Mexico and Dunc Milliken of the host Canadian team conceded that the U.S. should maintain its dominance of this classic.

Medellin said flatly that the U.S. team was "far superior" to its two competitors. Asked if he could see the U.S. being beaten after four straight Cup victories, Milliken replied he "just could not commit myself to that."

Bill Hayden III of Huntington Valley, Pa., playing captain of the U.S. team, called his contingent "a very strong" one. He said he was "confident," but refused to come right out and forecast a fifth straight U.S. victory in the biennial event.

Portland - (UPI) - Jack Soelberg, 52, well-known Oregon bowler, died of a heart attack at Emanuel hospital Wednesday night. Soelberg suffered the attack about 6:30 and died at 7 p.m. after being taken to Emanuel hospital.

Philadelphian - (UPI) - Will (The Stilt) Chamberlain, 24, Tuesday changed his mind about quitting professional basketball and signed a three-year contract with the Philadelphia Warriors at a salary in excess of \$60,000 a year.

Eddie Gottlieb, president of the Warriors, announced that Chamberlain had signed a contract at an undisclosed salary.

His earlier decision to quit basketball was dictated, it was understood, by roughhouse tactics on the professional basketball floor.

Perkins, weighing 137 1/2, to Lopes' 135 1/2, was in control throughout the last night's nationally televised struggle and swarmed over his foe for 40 seconds of the seventh round before referee Joey White halted the match.

## Warm Greeting For Patterson

Stockholm - (UPI) - Floyd Patterson, the heavyweight champion who's never been really "accepted" in his own country, is a hero today in the home of the man he conquered.

That was evident Wednesday night when a turnaway crowd of 40,000 Swedish fans gave Patterson a roaring welcome in his first appearance as a European tour. The crowd set a record for Sweden's second largest amusement park and was 15,000 more than Ingemar Johansson attracted 13 months ago when he returned home as his country's first world boxing champion.

Tears of surprise and happiness welled in Patterson's eyes after the rousing welcome and the 25-year-old Negro, who regained the title by knocking out Johansson in five rounds last June 20, told the crowd:

"I have never been received so warmly in my life nor could I have ever dreamed that this would happen to me."

Third man from Reno is Don Watts participating in the Medford races for the first time. He will be gunning a new Cadillac-powered acceleration machine down the White City concrete. In past years Watts has been a top contender on Nevada and northern California drag strips.

Welch has his work cut out for him because his competition is the Glass Slipper, from Sacramento, Calif., and the quick starting Slemons-Blandard entry from Portland. Both these machines are among the finest drag racers on the west coast. All will be gunning to exceed 150 mph through the one-fourth mile speed trials.

In addition to the record-holding entry the Welch-Butler team are bringing their smaller Chevrolet powered entry last seen here during the Memorial day meet in May. This speedster, also re-engineered, has topped 150 mph on the strip.
