## Kitchen Planner Should Study Major Appliances

New York — Just a boatload of everything but the sink has been upgraded in American kitchens.

The sink, while still an essential, is being moved into a windowless corner.

This is the word from Jacqueline A. Dubetski, a kitchen planning expert who helps the Consolidated Edison company advise housewives on kitchen arrangements and how to use their appliances.

Miss Dubetski said the dish washing machine has reduced the status of the sink and increased the housewife's leisure more than any other single invention.

"It is the most wonderful gadget that anyone ever thought of," she said. "It eliminated the most unpleasant chore in the house."

The dish washer also has revolutionized kitchen arrangements, she said. All housewives used to insist on double sinks, but now that dishwashing is done mechanically, a single sink is enough.

## Field of Home Economics Is One of 'Double Future'

Corvallis—In days gone by, college coeds enrolled in home economics with just an eye on a home and a husband. Today, one eye is still there but the other is fixed on a professional career, an Oregon State college survey indicates.

Just before commencement this year, the 89 home economics graduates from OSC were asked about their future plans.

Only 7 of the 89 listed homemaker as their sole plan for the future. This figure is even more interesting considering that 24 of the 89 women were already married—8 with children—and 20 others were planning to be married during the summer.

The survey points up how home economics has become increasingly a "double future" field, says Dean Miriam G. Scholl. Graduates are not only equipped to be skilled homemakers but professional workers as well. Job opportunities are excellent and varied today, she explained, and the pay is good. Chances for part-time work, along with home-making, are attracting many also.

The home economic degree is also good insurance in case something happens that the woman must work later, Dean Scholl added.

In the OSC survey, 44 of the 89 graduates are prepared to teach home economics in senior and junior high schools. Five have accepted dietetic internships; 10 are go-

## Hash in a Dash

New York — (UPI) — Make beef 'n potato hash in minutes with instant whipped potatoes. Melt 2 tablespoons of butter in a large skillet. Add 1 large onion and 1 green pepper, both chopped. Sauté until tender. Dissolve 2 beef bouillon cubes in 1 1/2 cups of hot water. All with 2 cups of cooked cubed roast beef, to the vegetables. Sprinkle one 4-serving envelope of instant whipped potato flakes over the mixture. Stir gently until the flakes are moistened and cook over medium heat until warm through. Serves 4.

3 cups raisin bran or bran flakes  
1 1/2 cups chopped raisins  
1/4 cup flaked coconut  
1/4 cup chopped dates

1/2 cup malted cereal nuts  
3/4 cup sweetened condensed milk  
1 tablespoon honey  
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Combine all ingredients and mix well. Press into a greased square pan (9x9x2 inches) or shape into small balls. Roll in granulated or confectioner's sugar, if desired. Let dry. Yield: About 4 dozen small balls or 36 to 49 squares. If shaped in pan, cut into squares. Wrap in waxed paper or saran.

## Explorers Club Dinner Fare Told

New York — Men who live adventurously also eat adventurously. Confirmation of this theory appears in the menus of the Explorers Club annual dinner here. Like the members' travels, the bills of fare cover everything from boa constrictors to iguana tails and termite eggs.

This year's hors d'oeuvres included carried boa constrictor garnished with jellied cymbidium orchids, deep dish seal flipper pie, roast macaque monkey, and calves eyes.

Once the explorers and their guests turned the tables by eating piranhas, man-eating fish. They've also feasted on Arctic ptarmigan (a species of grouse), pickled whale skin, golden butterflies, dried yak meat, and wild boar stomachs.

These delicacies are chosen by Dr. Charles I. Stoloff, a New York dentist whose interest in anthropology led to club membership. In an interview, he talked freely of exotic food but declined to describe the flavors. Pressed for a reason, he said:

"I must confess I don't eat all these things. But I watch many men eat them with relish."

Recipes and often the main ingredients for the meals are donated by club members who tasted the dishes first in their native habitat. Seal flippers for the 1960 dinner were contributed by the captain of a U.S. ice cruiser.

Dr. Stoloff is undisturbed by a recent report from Singapore of rising prices there for crocodile and hippopotamus soups.

"We've never served either,

And we have no cost problems, since most of the unusual ingredients are given to us by club members.

Membership rosters include some of the world's most distinguished names. The late president, Theodore Roosevelt, was a founder. Admiral Richard Byrd and Admiral Peary also belonged.

Although Dr. Stoloff does not blanch at the thought of planning for such important guests, he admits to a growing problem.

"It's very hard to get unusual things," he said. "With today's fast transportation, the world is smaller. There are few unexplored areas."

Consequently, each dinner's conclusion raises the same question: How can it be matched next year?
