Klamath Falls (UPI)—Klamath Falls unleashed a 17-hit batting assault against three Beaverton hurlers here Friday night to trounce Beaverton 19-5 and wrap up the Oregon American Legion baseball crown.

The winners combined 17 base hits along with seven Beaverton errors and 12 walks to capture the state crown.

Klamath Falls won the best of five series 3-1.

Pitchers Dig at Lead Of 2 Teams

Ken Boyer and Ron Hansen are a pair of pesky birds undermining the leads of the Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Yankees.

Boyer, a transplanted pitcher now playing third base for the St. Louis Cardinals, hit a three-run homer in the first inning Friday night that enabled the Birds to defeat Pittsburgh, 9-2, and move to within three games of the Pirates in the National league. His three RBIs gave him a total of 77 for the season, making him a good bet to surpass his major league high of 98.

Hansen, a leading candidate for the American league's rookie of the year, belted a ninth inning homer that gave Baltimore a 4-3 triumph over the Boston Red Sox and left the Orioles only five percentage points behind the Yankees.

Homers Hammer

Washington homers hammered the Yankees into 12-7 submission.

St. Louis made it two in a row over the Pirates as Curt Flood chipped in with three hits and Stan Musial, whose homer in the 10th inning beat Pittsburgh on Thursday, drove in two runs with a bases loaded single to highlight a four-run Cardinal rally in the seventh inning.

Hansen's 14th homer of the season gave Baltimore its seventh straight victory, tying the all-time club record. The Oriole fledgling also scored Baltimore's first run when his double preceded Marv Breeding's single in the seventh inning. Jim Gentile tied the score at 3-3 in the eighth with a two-run homer, his 17th.

Bob Allison, Harmon Killebrew and Jim Lemon upended the Yankees with homers in Washington's 13-hit slugfest. Killebrew drove in four runs with three hits, while Lemon capped a five-run seventh inning with a two-run blast.

Glass Slipper Sets New Mark In 'All-Comers'

Veteran dragster skipper Ed Cortapassi, co-owner of the sleek "Glass Slipper" gunned the powerful acceleration machine to a new strip gas record on his initial run in competition yesterday at the "Big Gasser" drag meet, held at the White City drag strip by Southern Oregon Timing association. Action continues today at 7 a.m.

The purple speedster flashed through the electronic clocks at a speed of 147.54 miles per hour to eclipse the old mark of 145.63 mph set last September by Warren Welsh and Bill Butler from Reno, Nev.

Today the Slipper must defend yesterday's mark against all comers including the top-seeded Blanchard-Skeans "A" class gas dragster that is a top threat in any meet.

The torrid entry from Portland is scheduled to be on hand early this morning making an all-out attempt to beat the Slipper's time of yesterday. This carries a \$175 savings bond as the prize.

Should the Blanchard-Skeans' entry perform to schedule it will be a toss-up as to who will emerge top eliminator of the meet. The rosette entry has recorded a top time of 153 mph in competition as compared to the 147.54 recorded yesterday by the sleek entry from Sacramento.

Second-best time recorded in yesterday's competition was a creditable 133.33 mph by the Cole & Wilkinson "B" class gas dragster hailing from Stockton, Calif.

It was reported yesterday evening that the Cole-Wilkinson team has taken off the weight that holds the dragster's front wheels on the ground and wheel stands will be in store for today's competition. Spectators will see an exhibition similar to last May when Dave Skeans of Vancouver, Wash., performed two-wheel maneuvers on nearly every run.

Top local time recorded in the meet thus far is the 123.28 mph set by Barney Metcalf in the Black-Bergman-Metcalf "A" class dragster sponsored by Crosby's Mobile service of Medford.

Local Girl Gets 2 Wins In GP Event

Grants Pass—Medford mermaid Linda Hess churned the water to two first place wins Saturday during the first day of the two-day annual AAU-sanctioned Grants Pass Invitational Swim Meet.

The Medford swim star placed first in the 80-yard breast stroke for girls 15 and 16 years old and first in the 160-yard individual medley.

A total of 424 swimmers are entered in the meet which held 22 events Saturday plus diving contests. Twenty-two more events are scheduled for Sunday plus other diving matches.

At the end of the first day's events Tualatin Hills swim club led with 79 points for the boys and 66 1/2 points for the girls. In girls' events Eugene had 24 points, Medford 21, Lakeview 19, Oregon Dolphins 11, and Roseburg 7.

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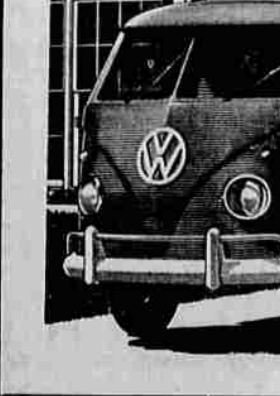
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
