### Kiwanian Dames Plan Swim Party

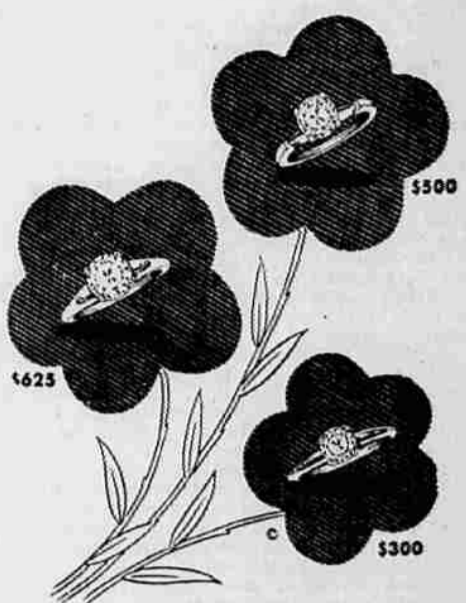

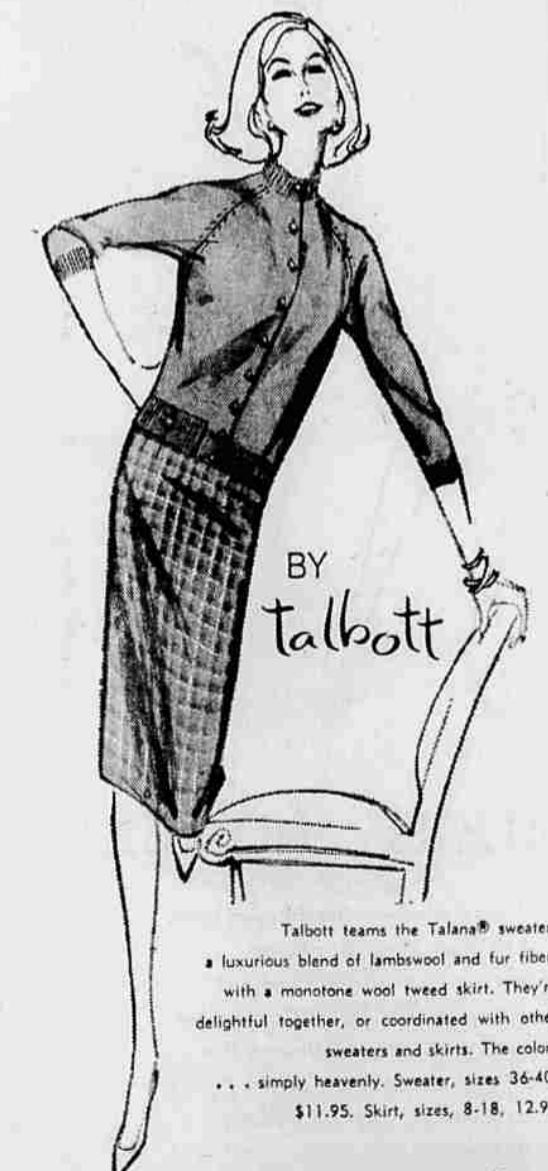
