

Canadian Prison Rioters Quelled

Stoney Mountain, Man. — An uneasy quiet prevailed today at the maximum security Stoney Mountain penitentiary following a prison riot in which one inmate was killed and four other convicts and three guards were injured.

More than 150 soldiers, Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers, Winnipeg city police and prison guards quelled the uprising Sunday night with a hail of bullets and tear gas, more than five hours after the rioting broke out during a Sunday afternoon baseball game.

A convict, whose name was withheld pending notification of next-of-kin, was killed by a ricocheting bullet when guards opened fire. The four wounded inmates also were felled by gunfire. The three guards were admitted to the general hospital in Winnipeg. No report on their condition was available early today.

The four injured convicts were treated in the prison infirmary.

An RCMP spokesman said the guards were beaten by rioters wielding baseball bats and sticks.

The rioting lasted for almost three hours after the outbreak before all inmates were back in their cells.

Seven of the ringleaders were in solitary confinement today.

Passengers Panic As Boat Capsizes

Villers-Le-Lac, France — A small excursion boat with 44 tourists aboard rammed into a piling marking the main channel of the Doubs river Sunday, killing seven persons when it capsized.

Another person was listed as missing.

The passengers panicked and began jumping off the deep water side of the boat after the captain pleaded with them to abandon the boat on the shore side where the water was only a foot deep.

Brazzaville, Congo Republic — Another Congo Republic gained its independence today, adding more confusion to Africa's muddled map.

Neither Congo will yield its name and this is sure to cause some mixups in such fields as mail service, map reading, tourism and international diplomacy.

For purposes of easy identification, newsmen have taken to calling this the Congo Republic and the one across the river just the Congo.

Small Copper Tubing Used in Air Conditioning

Englewood, N. J. — A new system using small copper tubing instead of big ducts may produce a boom in central air conditioning of older homes and buildings, inventor Calvin D. McCracken said today.

Only about 2 per cent of the homes in the country have central air conditioning at present.

McCracken is the inventor of an air heating system using the same type copper tubing and of a successful line of solar water heaters. He has been working on his copper tubing air conditioning for a dozen years, started testing it four years ago and put it in production this year as a companion to his jet-heat warm air heating system.

Heated Up Rapidly — Early efforts to use easily installed copper tubing for air conditioning stumbled over the fact that after cold air was pumped through the tubing, it heated up rapidly the minute it was dispersed in the room.

McCracken said he solved this by several procedures. First, he cools the air down to 40 degrees Fahrenheit compared to about 57 degrees in a conventional air-conditioning system.

The cold air then is forced through the tubes at very high velocity, 2,000 cubic feet a minute, and is expelled into the rooms through special aspirating registers. The cold air in effect is forced up to the ceiling and mixes rapidly with the warm air from the room.

Also the two-inch copper tubes are insulated with fiberglass, which eliminates pipe condensation in the walls.

More Cool Air Forced — By this system, which he calls jet-cool, McCracken says he can force more cool air into a house through the two-inch copper tubing than through conventional large sheet metal ducts. Only a dozen years ago, many air conditioning engineers said the copper tubing system couldn't be made to work.

At the 40-degree temperature, the jet-cool system dehumidifies the rooms quite rapidly. The condenser and refrigerating units are separate, the condenser being put outside the house and the refrigerating unit in the basement, a utility room or in the attic.

Installing the copper tubing requires no major carpentry and can be done by two men in a couple of days in most houses.

A complete unit for a seven-room split level house would cost \$1,200 plus installation and financing. If the house already had copper tubing for jet-heat, the cost would be \$900.

Sea Cucumbers as Shark Repellent Research Subject

Washington — The Navy's search for an effective shark repellent is taking it inside the lowly sea cucumber. It all started when someone noticed that the apparently defenseless little animals, similar in size and shape to the garden type cucumber, are seldom bothered by fish or other marine life.

Observers noted that when touched, sea cucumbers regenerate their insides. And, scientists discovered, the animals' digestive system contains a powerful toxin. Called holothurin, it sends some types of fish into fatal convulsions.

The research is one of the many projects being conducted by the Navy's hydrobiology program which studies marine flora and fauna for possible hints and aids to mankind. Of the more publicized studies are those on the intelligence and communicative abilities of porpoises. The mammal also is being studied for a clue as to how it moves through the water so noiselessly — a subject of interest to submarine designers.

The holothurin project, if successful, could lead to increased safety for survivors of shipwrecks and plane crashes, skin divers and others who have little between themselves and toothy marine life.

Dr. Sidney R. Galler, head of the office of Naval Research's biology staff, describes the holothurin as "rather substantial quantities and a small amount will send fish into fatal convulsions."

As an example of the potency of the toxin, he cited an instance when tanks containing sea cucumbers were being converted for use by fish. Although the tanks were thoroughly cleaned, he said, it took a month before it was possible to put fish into the tanks without them dying.

Whether the holothurin is safe to apply on humans is the question still being rigorously examined.

Dr. Galler said it's still too early to tell who will be affected most, "the swimmer or the fish."

One of the primary investigators is Dr. Ross Nigrelli of the New York Zoological Society. Studies on various aspects of the toxin also are being conducted by Dr. Harry Sobotka of New York's Mt. Sinai hospital and Dr. Seymour Friess of the Naval Medical Research Institute. In testing the substance, the investigators noted that holothurin also stopped the growth of tumors in white mice.

Another avenue of research is the apparent relationship of the sea cucumber to the poisonous sea urchin. Researchers hope discovery of the chemical compositions of the poison will help develop antidotes.

In all, Dr. Galler said, the look into the sea cucumber "looks quite promising."

Life Photographer Accused by Russia

Moscow — Life Magazine photographer Carl Mydans has joined the ranks of "undesirable" Americans accused of using their entry into the Soviet Union for anti-Russian activities.

Mydans was charged by the Soviet trade union organ Truth with shooting "miles of film" in the Soviet Union and selecting only those shots which caricature Russian life. Mydans was scheduled to leave today for home after replacement by Howard Sochurek, who also was castigated in the magazine Sunday.

Funeral Rites Held For FDR Granddaughter

Hyde Park, N. Y. — Private funeral services were held here Sunday for Sara Delano Roosevelt, granddaughter of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Burial was at the family cemetery.

Miss Roosevelt, 13, died Friday of a head injury believed suffered in a fall from a horse. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Roosevelt.
