

Kiputh Expects New World Swim Records

Rome—(UPI)—The grand old man of American swimming predicted today that every men's Olympic record will be broken when the Olympic swimming events get underway next week.

Bob Kiputh, longtime swimming coach at Yale and mentor of some of America's finest swim stars, said he felt practically all listed world records would also go by the board.

He made his predictions as American, Russian and Japanese swimmers plunged into another stiff day of training for the game. Only the Australians of the world's major swimming powers have not arrived in Rome.

Swimming has so far held the center of the stage at the Olympics with most of the major track and field stars not yet arrived. Today Kiputh, here in a semi-official capacity as an observer at the swimming events, said he thought the competition would be a three-way Australian-American-Japanese battle.

The Russians, he said, stand little chance except perhaps in the men's breaststroke event. Kiputh picked Australia's John Konrads as a likely winner in the 1500 meters freestyle "provided he reaches his best form in time" and said Mike Troy of the United States appeared a good bet for the butterfly event.

Two platoons of Americans arrived Tuesday to send the U.S. contingent in the Olympic village over the 250 mark. Only the basketball team and the track team have still to arrive.

MHS Players Get Equip. This Week

Equipment will be issued to Medford High school football players for the 1960 season starting tomorrow, according to football coach Fred Spiegelberg.

Women's Golf Coach Orders Youngest U.S. Swimmer to Bed

Rome—(UPI)—Little Donna De Varona of the U.S. Olympic swimming team went to bed at 8:30 Tuesday night, and had orders to stay in bed until 10 in the morning.

Her coach, George Haines, was worried about her. Donna only turned 13 last April and she weighs only 104 pounds.

She is the youngest athlete on the American team, and officials believe that the picture eighth grader from Lafayette, Calif., is the youngest athlete ever sent by the U.S. to any Olympic games.

Donna got a little tired in training Tuesday and coach Haines pointed a stern finger at her.

"Bed at 8:30 tonight, kid," he said, "and that's an order. And don't get up until 10. You're too excited with all this traveling. The walkathon is over. You've seen all the Russians, Italians and Japanese you need to see for a while. Go to bed."

Donna explained that she tires quicker than the other girls because she hasn't caught up with them on weight yet. Most of the girls on the team weigh between 130 and 140 and some weigh a bit more.

The little swimmer explained that she was born beside the ocean in California and has "loved the water all my life." She started her athletic career as a diver, but when she was 11 years old, her coach suggested that she try entering some swimming events, too, "to help me relax," and she has been swimming ever since.

Donna said that she goes to school like any other eighth grader, and trains for swimming after school hours. Last year she got all A's and B's in school. Her favorite subject is math.

Donna is hoping that she won't be too old for the 1964 Olympics. "I think 17 is still pretty young, don't you?" she asked wistfully. "I mean I really want to get a medal before I retire."

However, once she retires, she hopes that the De Varona family will still be represented in the Olympics.

"I have a little sister seven years old who is coming along with leaps and bounds," she said.

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Pittsburgh All But Cinches NL Pennant; Ford Pitches Shutout Win For Yankees

Phillies Bow Twice As Friend, Face Get Wins

A mere 537 paces in their remaining 41 games should be enough to clinch the Pittsburgh Pirates' first National League pennant in 33 years.

The "count down" that will eliminate the Milwaukee Braves, St. Louis Cardinals and Los Angeles Dodgers from the race is on today as a result of the Pirates' 11-2 and 4-3 sweep of the Philadelphia Phillies Tuesday night which vaulted them into a 7 1/2 game lead.

Only 22 victories in their last 41 games, a .537 pace, would give the Pirates 92 wins for the season. That would mean the Braves would have to take 32 of their last 44 games to win, the Cardinals would have to win 30 of their last 40 and the Dodgers would have to cop 33 of 45. That's a .696 pace for the Braves, .750 for the Cardinals and .733 for the Dodgers.

AL Count Down
There's no such "count down" in the American League for a long while, however, where Whitey Ford's 1-0 win over the Baltimore Orioles held the New York Yankees' half-game lead.

The Orioles fell to third but the Chicago White Sox remained hot on the Yankees' trail with their 3-2 win over the Detroit Tigers.

The Braves shaded the Cincinnati Reds, 2-1, the San Francisco Giants dealt the Cardinals a near-mortal blow with a 7-3 triumph and the Dodgers beat the Chicago Cubs, 7-5, in 11 innings in other NL games. The Cleveland Indians scored a 10-inning 4-3 decision over the Kansas City Athletics and the Washington Senators beat the Boston Red Sox, 8-5, in other AL action.

Bob Friend coasted to his 13th victory behind a first-game Pittsburgh attack that included a homer by Bob Skinner, a triple by Roberto Clemente and doubles by Skinner and Bill Mazeroski among 15 hits. The Pirates won the nightcap when Dick Groat, Skinner and Rocky Nelson bunted safely with none out in the eighth and then Robin Roberts broke a 3-3 tie by walking Clemente to force in the decisive run. Elroy Face, who pitched the last two innings, won his seventh game for the Pirates.

Ford, working at his own request with two days of rest, pitched a three-hitter for the Yankees who scored the game's only run in the fourth inning on a hit batsman, and singles by Yogi Berra and Johnny Blanchard. Ford allowed only one Baltimore baserunner to reach second base and struck out six in winning his ninth game while Chuck Estrada was the hard luck loser for the Orioles.

Frank Baumann pitched a seven-hitter for the White Sox who scored two unearned runs in the eighth inning on a wild throw by catcher Harry Chitt. Al Kalline doubled home one run and scored the other for Detroit.

Warren Spahn and Hank Aaron combined their talents to win a squeaker for the Braves. Spahn pitched an eight-hitter and struck out five to win his 14th game of the season and the 261st of his career while Aaron homered to tie in the fourth and singled home the winning run in the eighth.

Unbeaten rookie Juan Marichal won his fourth game for the Giants thanks to batterymate Hobe Landrith who drove in three runs and scored two with three doubles and a single. Daryl Spencer had two of St. Louis' four hits, including a homer, but committed three costly errors.

Larry Sherry picked up his 11th victory when Norm Larker doubled to break a 5-5 tie in the 11th inning and then scored an insurance run on Tommy Davis' single. Wally Moon homered in the eighth inning to tie the score for the Dodgers. Don Cardwell was the loser for the Cubs.

Don Newcombe gained credit for the Indians' win when Tito Francona's broken-bat single drove in Johnny Temple with the winning run in the 10th inning. Francona's early two-run homer enabled the Indians to lead until the ninth when Dick Williams tied the score with a homer.

Pitcher Pedro Ramos snapped a 2-2 tie with the Senators with his second homer of the season but he didn't get credit for his ninth win until Hal Woodeshick and Ray Moore relieved in the ninth. Hal Naragon had three hits for the Senators.

U. S. Olympic Basketball Team Needs Improvement

New York—(UPI)—Coach Pete Newell said today the U. S. Olympic basketball team "still needs improvement" although he is confident it will make a good showing in Rome.

The U.S. All-Stars weren't particularly impressive in their final American tune-up Tuesday night even though they defeated the New York Tuck Tapers of the National Industrial Basketball League, 63-79, with the help of Oscar Robertson's 26-point performance.

The Olympians were sluggish throughout most of the first half and then spurred an 11-point lead early in the second half, only to have it dwindle to two points with less than a half minute left.

With the Olympians nursing a narrow 79-77 lead and only 17 seconds remaining, Jerry Lucas of Ohio State and Robertson each connected to insure the victory over the fired-up Tuck Tapers.

"We are all conscious of the fact that we have to improve," Newell said after the game. "The players have done a wonderful job considering they have been together only a few weeks.

"But these boys all have been playing different kinds of offenses. Most of them are in the habit of scoring 27 to 32 points a game. When you put five of them together like that you don't get a total of 100 points as you might automatically imagine.

"They still have to get used to playing as a unit," Newell continued. "I am not a bit critical of them. They've had some obstacles but it's all perfectly understandable when you put together a group of players who come from different teams."

The team will fly to Rome on Thursday and play two practice games in Sweden before it opens Olympic competition.

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Legion Nines Start Bend Tournament

Bend—(UPI)—The West's seven top American Legion junior baseball teams open play here Thursday in a double elimination tournament for a berth in the eight-team Legion finals at Hastings, Neb.

Play opens Thursday afternoon with Las Vegas, Nev., meeting the New Mexico champion at 1 p.m. (p.s.t.) Phoenix, Ariz., winner of the sectional tournament here last year, meets the California champion at 5 p.m.

Salt Lake City will go up against the Oregon champ, Klamath Falls, in the first day's finale at 8 p.m.

Anchorage, Alaska, drew a first round bye.

Play will run through at least next Tuesday, with the possibility of the title game not being held until next Wednesday, Aug. 24.

The sectional tournaments have been eliminated this year. Eight regional tournaments are being held throughout the country to determine entries in the finals at Hastings.

Hyndman Leads Golf Qualifiers

Ottawa—(UPI)—Sixty-four golfers from three nations, led by American veteran Bill Hyndman, got down to real business in the 56th Canadian amateur championship today with two fieldcutting rounds of match play.

The 64 shotmakers, who qualified for the tournament proper by carding 36-hole scores of 156 or better over the tough par 73 Hunt Club layout, began play this morning with the first 32 18-hole matches. By the day's end, only 16 of them will be left.

Hyndman, 44-year-old Walker and Americas Cup player from Huntington Valley, Pa., took medal honors in the qualifying round with a three-under-par 143 for 36 holes.

Mexican national champion Juan Estrada, 23, took second spot with a pair of one-under 72's. In third place at 147 was Bob Wylie of Calgary.
